

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Parish Council Meetings

As the legislation allowing for virtual meetings has not been extended, and with the full easing of lockdown measures from 21st June, we are resuming our monthly PC meetings in public in the upstairs meeting room of the Community Centre. The next meeting is on 29th June at 7.30pm (25th May if your Spotlight reaches you before then). Members of the public are welcome to attend.

Councillor Vacancies

As there were only 8 candidates for Seend Parish Council in the local government elections (6th May), Seend's election was uncontested and therefore all 8 candidates have been become Parish Councillors. They are: Georgina A'Bear, Pam Akerman, Terry James, Anita Heatley, William Lack, Carole Vince, John Williams and Martin Wiltshire.

This means that there are three Councillor vacancies that need to be filled through Co-Option. Anyone who is interested in becoming a Parish Councillor should contact the Clerk. We will be holding a Q&A session half an hour before the 29th June PC meeting. So anyone can come along and find out what being a Councillor is all about. There are also details of the PC's website about role of the Parish Councillor (www.seendparishcouncil.co.uk) or contact the Clerk for more information.

Community Speedwatch

The Parish Council has requested another traffic survey to be undertaken along the High Street (a different location to the previous one in 2019). All traffic surveys are currently on hold because of the pandemic, but once resumed, our request will be on the list. The Parish Council would like to know if there is any interest from parishioners, particularly those living on the High Street, in the setting up of a community speedwatch team of volunteers (similar to the ones seen in Worton and Beanacre). However, this could only be set up if there was a proven issue with speed as shown by the results of a traffic survey. But it would be interesting to gauge in advance what support there would be from parishioners. Please let the Clerk know your thoughts.

THE VIEW FROM MY WINDOW

This weather has been unbelievable, unprecedented in my lifetime; cold, cold, cold; dry, dry; wind, wind, wind; but today as I write its actually very pleasant to be in the garden and I have put up my beansticks; always a good sign, and we look forward to the beautiful summer month of June.

I am reminded of the first line of TS Eliot's "The Coming of the Magi"; "a cold coming we had of it; just the worst time of the year for a journey, and what a journey". Indeed, what a journey, and what a long and eventful winter but hopefully we are beginning to emerge from this dreadful pandemic. So what is it you dare to dream of; what little thing are you harbouring in your heart that you will be able to do? In common with most grandparents I look forward to hugging my grandchildren and by

the time this goes to print that will be possible. I look forward to going to stay with my friends and them to me, and yes of course the pub inside and out, and the theatre and cinema, but in all honesty most particularly being back in church with a full worshipping community. We have missed each other. We have missed being able to sing. I think the clergy have done brilliantly in bringing us all together on zoom and yes we have been able to see each other, but just to be together in our old places of worship; wow!

I expect many of you have asked, "where is God in all this?" and my answer would be he is there weeping with us; he is there in the hospitals and the care homes; he is there with the doctors and nurses and carers. He is there wanting to be back in church with us, and he is there to give us courage and comfort along the way.

When I am puzzled or anxious I try to imagine myself as one of the disciples with Jesus as he walked around Galilee. Did he ever get anxious or puzzled? Did he ever have to experience an epidemic, and did he ever cry out to his father to help him. We know he did in his final days, but I wonder did he do that before then. I expect he did, just as we do. We know he healed many people, not least the little girl who was so ill they thought she was dead. So when we get puzzled or anxious about the future, or sad, I recommend that we simply ask God to help us and to be with us on our journey. Ask for courage and guidance, and if you want to feel really good, come back into church and join us. Come and hear the music, and sing. (hopefully soon). Come and notice the smiles. It will be great.

Parish Steward: Outstanding jobs to be sent to The Clerk prior to next visit. This month our Steward removed the slippery moss from both sides by The Close, fixed

the loose kerb stones between the pub and the village hall, smoothed over some rough tarmac in the road left after water works were done and maintained the grass areas by the benches.

New Website: The website has been successfully built and all information transferred – massive thanks to Amy Powell and Sue Barratt who worked as a fantastic team. Their hard work has saved the Parish the cost of having a website built by a third party

Newsletter update: The Summer edition has a number of suggestions for content, including the possibility of holding a summer fete on 8th August. More discussions to be had on the event planning and organizing before publishing date and event.

Election Year: Expenses are due for submission to prove 0.00 was spent on our local Parish Elections as the number of candidates matched the number of seats. The Clerk will print all forms and submit asap.

Wiltshire Best Kept Village: It was agreed that Bulkington will be entering the competition. This will be a great PR exercise for the village, it will also be a positive community project for everyone to join forces safely after a really tough year. Initial judging starts at the end of May – so any garden tidies, flower planting and reporting of any curb/signage/stile problems would be really helpful so we can have the best chances (and village) possible.

Stiles: The fifth and last of the reported unsafe stiles has now been fixed, in preparation of the Best Kept Village competition, we would really appreciate villagers feeding back any broken stiles or access problems to the walks around the village as these will all cost valuable points in the Best Kept Village Competition.

Speeding in the village: Councillor Carla raised the topic of speeding within the village – especially upon entering and leaving the village at both ends. It was agreed to report the faded speed restriction sign to the Highways team of the council and to request that the speed restriction sign next to 1 Bulkington is moved further away in keeping with guidelines to allow people enough time to slow before entering the village safely.

Next meeting – It was decided to hold May's ordinary meeting alongside our AGM in the Bulkington Village Hall. Clerk to book and arrange.

Bob Pelham initially started the company as Wonky Toys Ltd in 1947 and it was later changed to Pelham Puppets. The original puppets were made from re-cycled materials such as parachutes and old buttons. The heads came from coconut shells and the bodies from old ammunition cases and they were all hand painted. The demise of the company in the 1990s was largely due to the rise of electronic games. Today the puppets are highly collectable.

The next meeting on 9th June (by Zoom) will be a talk on "Wiltshire: A journey through time" by Nicholas Baxter. The provisional programme for the remainder of 2021/2022 will be dependent on Covid rules at the time. Details will be published at a later date.

SEEND PARISH COUNCIL

NB. The following minutes are a shortened version of the full minutes taken at the Parish Council meeting on 27th April 2021. These have not yet been ratified by the Parish Council and may be subject to change. A full copy of the minutes can be found on our website: www.seendparishcouncil.co.uk

The meeting held on 27th April was attended by 10 Councillors with Mr James in the Chair, Mrs Sue Bond (Clerk), Councillor Jonathon Seed, and 4 members of the public. There was one apology.



<u>Local Councillor Matters</u> – Councillor Seed said that there was not much to report from Wiltshire Council. He said that this would be his last Parish Council meeting attendance at Seend as he is standing down at this election after 12 years of being a County Councillor for our ward. He said that it had been a privilege to represent the parish. There had been a lot of ups and downs. He wished the Parish Council well for the future. The Chairman thanked him on behalf of the Parish Council for all the support he had given to the Parish.

Minutes & Matters Arising: Minutes of the meeting held 30th March were approved. Highways - Highway Improvement Request - The Bell Councillor Seed said that he was very disappointed with the response from Highways regarding the Parish Council's request to improve protection at the former pub to prevent further damage from vehicles involved in traffic accidents. The PC was supporting the owner's request. Councillor Seed said that it probably needed a County Councillor to intervene and make further representation to Highways on behalf of the owner and the Parish Council, whether that is him before he stands down as a councillor or for the new County Councillor, whoever that may be, after the elections. Speeding in High Street – It was reported that there was still a lot of concern about speeding traffic along the High Street. This had been raised by parishioners many times, and was the main issue raised by those who had completed a traffic survey undertaken by a policeman on the Community Police Team. Councillor Seed was asked for advice as to what the Parish Council could do, as previous metro counts in 2012, 2016 and 2019, had suggested that there was no proven speed issue. Unless speeding was proven through the results of a metro count, the Parish Council could not install a SID or undertake a community speedwatch. Councillor Seed suggested that it might be worth requesting another metro count but at a different location further east along the High Street. He believed that SIDS do make a difference in combating speeding. There were discussions as to where the best location might be. A site visit was arranged and the precise location will be given to Councillor Seed so he could make the request to Highways. All Councillors agreed that a Traffic Survey Request be submitted for an agreed location that was different to the one undertaken in 2019. Bus Shelter at top of Bollands Hill - Mr Williams raised the issue of the damaged bus shelter at the top of Bollands Hill asking what can be done about it. This had been damaged in July 2017 following a road accident. At the time, Wiltshire Council said that they had no funding to repair or replace the bus shelter. The Clerk had checked whether this was still the policy and got confirmation that it was. She also got a rough costing for a replacement shelter which would be in the region of £4,000-£6,000. It may be possible to apply for an Area Board Grant. The Councillors discussed whether it could be repaired instead. It was agreed that in the first instance this should be investigated. **Spout Lane** – The Clerk reported that Highways maintenance team had updated her on some drainage issues in Spout Lane. Further investigations will be undertaken by highways to see how the issue can be fixed. Row Lane – the Chairman reported that there were

investigations being undertaken by Wessex Water into the water that is seeping onto the road at the top end of the lane.

Police Matters

- 4th April around 7pm incident in Bradley Lane where a parishioner was shouted at aggressively and in a threatening manner.
- 17th April male was arrested after providing a positive drug test while driving a vehicle in Sells Green.
- 20th April— a vehicle was seized for having no insurance on the A361 in Seend. Driver was reported for driving whilst disqualified.

<u>Dog Thefts</u>. Following the national survey in March, dog thefts in Wiltshire remain low and below the national average. A new Dog Watch scheme has been set up by Wiltshire Police. To sign up, go to www.wiltsmessaging.co.uk which alerts you to lots of things happening in our community, and select Dog Watch to receive relevant information. You can also report dog thefts by calling 101 or the Dog Warden on 0300 456 0100. You can also report stolen and found dogs on Doglost.co.uk. Don't forget to notify your microchip database provider and be wary of RSPCA imposters wearing uniform. Ask for ID to confirm if genuine.

Neighbourhood Plan - The Neighbourhood Plan was going to Referendum on 6th May and it was hoped that the Parish would support it with a Yes vote. There had been a lot of talk on Facebook about the Neighbourhood Plan and what the referendum meant. There was a need for a concise explanation. Mrs A'Bear said it was a Plan for the parish. After numerous consultation events engaging with the community, the ideas put forward were used to create an evidence based document to formulate the Neighbourhood Plan. It is a positive planning document that identifies areas that the community most valued and which needed to be protected from development. Once the Neighbourhood Plan is approved by referendum it becomes a statutory document that must be referred to when Wiltshire Council is looking at any planning applications. Councillor Seed praised the work of the Steering Committee which he said exemplified the right way of creating a Neighbourhood Plan. He regularly recommended his other parishes to look at Seend as a model to follow. He reiterated that once it has the support of the Referendum, it then has planning weight and can be used to steer where the parish wants development to take place and protect the areas where development would not be welcome.

<u>Planning Matters</u> – no new planning applications

<u>Correspondence:</u> Email from clerk of Melksham Without PC. BRAG applied for some Area Board funding for new seats, which was match funded by Melksham Without Parish Council, and so they will be installing some replacement and new benches along the bridleway from Locking Close, Bowerhill.

<u>Financial Matters</u> – Bank reconciliation to end of March £ 25,574.88

<u>Date of Next Meetings</u> - The next Parish Council meetings are 25th May and 29th

June.

NURTURE NATURE

A reminder that pesticides have a strong adverse impact for birds and mammals, especially slug pellets - NEMASLUG is a safe bio alternative.

The Red List or status of birds and especially of song birds have oft been stated in this mag and learned research articles. Red Listed species have become considerably scarcer over the last decade according to the BTO and other scientific researchers. Here are three examples of the rapid decline over the period 1967 to 2018:

- Nightingale numbers are down by 93%. This summer migrant with its beautiful, haunting, glorious song is nowhere to be seen in its traditional sites in Wiltshire and Gloucestershire thus far this year.
- Tree Sparrow a 96% decline and the common house sparrow is also noticeably declining in numbers.
- Turtle Dove numbers have dropped significantly by 98%. Much of this decline is due to turtle dove shooting clubs in Mediterranean countries, especially on Malta, where these lovely birds with their soothing cooing are shot on migration both ways, in spring to the UK, and on their return in the autumn. The slaughter of this beautiful species is against EU wildlife legislation, but the EU is turning, and has always turned a blind eye to this criminal activity, as it does to the liming and netting of many migrant species in the southern Mediterranean countries and islands, Cyprus especially. One would be sickened to see the appalling photos of limed birds, such as the Ortolan Bunting, hanging slowly dying and then dead from branches, and caught in mist nets just to provide a few grams of a 'delicacy' in expensive Mediterranean restaurants drowned in liquor and eaten whole by so called gourmets....

Just about everything in the Nurture Nature notes can be found on the internet. We recommend that every reader of this article/magazine, should look at a recent documentary shown on Netflix entitled Seaspiracy. You will need a strong stomach, the guts to see this true documentary through to the end, and you will probably never wish to support the fishing industry by eating any species of fish, crustaceans or even sea mammals ever again.

Most fishing around the world is now controlled by brutal criminal gangster and drug mafia gangs, leading to the extinction of species faster than those on land, the destruction of the sea bed – remember the seas and oceans make up seven tenths of our planet, Earth – to cruel human exploitation and slavery. If you allow children to watch it, and from a certain age they probably should, adults should sit with them. Perhaps parents should preview it. It is nearly an hour and a half long.

Reminder, it was little known until recently that the Duke of Edinburgh was a great conservationist, so if you have not already done so, or hopefully planned so to do, plant in your garden something in his memory – (depending on the size of your garden or border of course) – a tree, a bush, a single, not double flower (friendly for insects

and especially for bees), perhaps even a water feature, a great attraction for all forms of wildlife, in memory of him to help conserve and nurture nature.

The inclement weather and northerly winds might have contributed to fewer migrants arriving, and hopefully numbers might pick up. Please refer to May's Spotlight for information on House Martins, Swallows and Swifts and how to help them.
