CHRISTIAN AID WEEK MONDAY MAY 10th - SUNDAY MAY 16th

Christian Aid, with 70 years' experience, works to bring an end to poverty in 37 countries, helping people in Africa, Asia and the Middle East as well as Latin America and the Caribbean, addressing the root causes as well as the effects of poverty. They work with 475 local, national & international partner organizations, some are Christian, some Muslim, Jewish or Hindu – some are of no religious persuasion at all. Christian Aid's primary concern is that partners are good at what they do. The work is inspired by Christian values of faith, charity, hope and truth. Put simply 'aid' is what Christian Aid does, 'Christian' is why they do it.

Christian Aid makes the best use of monies collected by allocating funds from a central budget to partners according to need. A close relationship is maintained with partners to learn more about the problems in their areas, to offer support and check that money is spent wisely. Over a quarter of the money collected is spent on emergencies. But the key area is long term development spending nearly half of the income, on projects such as education and health as well as ways to improve people's resilience to shocks and disasters, like stronger houses in earthquake zones. The remainder is divided between campaigning and fundraising. No money is given to governments.

This year funds are concentrated in two main areas. Climate change has a much harsher effect on the poorer countries of the world, especially in Africa where weather, normally prone to extremes has become more so recently. Droughts have become more frequent and longer, while flooding has been more common when it does rain, especially in sub-Saharan Africa. Countries in Asia, such as Bangladesh, have such extensive low lying areas that people living in coastal regions have become

frequently flooded. Covid, a problem in the richer parts of the world, is the other special problem currently. It is true that parts of Africa were less prone to the virus in 2020 but they are catching up. There is little chance of social distancing in the urban slums of India where although they have produced considerable numbers of vaccine doses many seem to have been exported even though there is great need at home. Brazil also is suffering badly from Covid -not helped by a President who does not yet seem to accept that there is a problem.

You may remember that last year the usual House to House collection was cancelled due to Covid. This year it is more or less back to normal. You will find an envelope in the May edition of Spotlight as usual. One of our masked collectors will be round to collect it during the week - May 10th -16th and we hope that you will feel able to contribute as you have in the past. If you are a basic income tax payer please also complete the Gift Aid form, fold it & place in the envelope with your contribution. Please stick down the envelope for better security. This is all a bit of a fiddle but if you complete the form and place it in the envelope with your contribution when you read Spotlight and place it near the front door it is easy for you when the collector calls. If no one collects your envelope for some reason, possibly because you were out when they call please take it to The Shop in the High Street or give it direct to me at Whites Farm, Seend Cleeve, Melksham or or to Liz Futter, Mill Lane, Bulkington whichever is the easier.

A MESSAGE FROM SEEND CLT CHAIR, GEORGE CLARKE

Since I last wrote to Community Land Trust members just before Christmas, we have been waiting with increasing anxiety for the Section 106 agreement to be signed and to date, so far, this has not yet happened. Because it has always seemed that news on this front was just a few days away, I put off writing to you in the hope that I would have something positive to report but this has not yet happened, I apologise for the resulting lack of communication.

It is hard to believe that the planning application was registered 13 months or so ago on the 10th of March last year, shortly afterwards the first lockdown was announced. It took until mid-September before we were told that, subject to the signing of a suitable s.106, the application would be approved. The S.106 is an agreement signed between the various parties that ensures that the development will remain in use for its original purpose, as affordable housing, in one form or another.

It was the responsibility of the legal department at Wiltshire Council to draw up the agreement and, as this is the first CLT in Wiltshire to reach this stage, they were anxious to produce an agreement that could form a template for future schemes in other parishes and one that would not set any unfortunate precedents. The CLT first saw a draft in mid-November, and this was reviewed and commented on by the CLT within a couple of days. A revised version suitable for sending to our solicitors was

not then received by us until the end of January this year and was cleared by our solicitors within a matter of days. At that point three of the four parties to the agreement including the CLT were ready to sign, however since then the fourth party to the agreement have, via their solicitors, raised a number of concerns, which we believe have now been addressed, however we are still waiting for their agreement. As you can appreciate this delay has been exceedingly frustrating but completely beyond our control.

As of today, you could argue that we are no further forward than we were on the day that we applied for planning permission. There certainly would not have been any reason to call a meeting, even if this had been possible, and indeed until we get some definite news either way, that remains the case. In the event that we are successful in obtaining our planning permission then we will call a meeting to update you on our next steps. Likewise, if we are unsuccessful, we will call a meeting to discuss what should happen. Perhaps my writing to you will now prompt developments and I will be able to report back positively in the near future, I certainly hope so.

It seems we will be returning to a more normal life soon and that at least is a cause for optimism. In the meantime, I wish you all the very best of health.

Elections: Seend Parish Council will not have a contested election on 6th May, as there were only 8 candidates nominated. This means there are 3 councillor vacancies that will be advertised in the next month or so. There will still be County Councillor elections, Police and Crime Commissioner elections and the Seend Neighbourhood Plan Referendum. All on 6th May, so don't forget to vote!

<u>Seend Parish Neighbourhood Plan</u>: A Referendum will be held on the question: Do you want Wiltshire Council to use the Neighbourhood Plan for Seend Parish to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area? The answer to give is Yes or No.

It is important that as many parishioners as possible vote in this Referendum as it is the culmination of many years of hard work put into the preparation of the Plan by the Steering Group. <u>Annual Parish Meeting – 5^{th} May at 7pm (virtual meeting):</u> Contrary to the date given in the April issue, the Annual Parish Meeting has now been set for <u>Wednesday 5^{th} May</u>. The reason behind bringing this forward is that the government is not

extending the legislation allowing for virtual meetings after 7th May. This means that any council/parish meetings after the 7th May are expected to be held in a public place. All parishioners will be welcome to join the meeting. Seend clubs and organisations are invited to give a short report. HAPPY EASTERTIDE FROM YOUR LOCAL CHURCH!

I love Easter, quite possibly even more than Christmas! I love the light, the long-awaited revealing of new life and the message of hope that Easter brings.

The Christian community has been marking and celebrating Easter for over 2,000 years but that doesn't mean that the church hasn't changed and adapted during that time. The basics of everyone being valued and transformed by a loving God, the God that we got to know first-hand through the life of Jesus hasn't changed. That is why some of us gather each Sunday to "Give thanks to the Lord because he is good, because his faithful love endures forever." (1 Chronicles 16:34)

How we 'go about' church though has changed over the years, maybe not quite at the speed of Google or Apple but we do and have changed. We are at a point in history where we are revaluating what we do and how we do it. This is nothing new as we only need to look back to see how the church was involved in establishing the education, legal and health systems in the UK. And more recently we quietly led the way for some of the Covid community support work.

The church is different to almost all other organisations. We have been present in each one of our five villages for a very very long time. Christ Church at Bulkington is 160 years old and Holy Cross at Seend is 570 years old!* This 'perseverance of presence' has placed our Parish Churches at the heart of the English landscape, enabled Christian fellowship and provided a focal point for the spiritual heart for the community.

We would like our churches to be here in another 570 years, but we can only achieve that if we understand your attitude towards your local church building and church community. This understanding will help us to stay relevant to the village community and to better meet your needs in 2021 and on into the future.

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE BULKINGTON PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Report received from:

Councilor Seed: This meeting was Councillor Seed's last Bulkington PC meeting after 12 years of representing us. He would like to thank the current and past members of the PC for a good relationship and the PC wishes him the very best for the future.

PCSO Janet shared the below report via email:

- Dog thefts still ongoing and extra care should be taken when out dog walking and general security for pets around the home. Please report any suspicious activity.
- Rogue Callers unfortunately this type of crime still happens please be careful of employing any trades person that calls uninvited at your home address. Legally you should be provided with a 14 day 'cooling off' period before any work is commenced, do not pay any monies upfront, and all quotes should be written in detail and include the name, address and contact details of the Tradesperson doing the work.

Local Planning Updates:

1) Barn conversion/ Holiday lets planning application at Tynings Farm, 24 Bulkington Drove

Tim Taylor introduced the application and answered questions: The property was purchased in 2016 with planning permission for 4 garages – this was changed into an annex for their parents. They are now seeking planning permission for 3 x 1 bedroom holiday lets in place of the stables in the original planning permission.

Tim and Sam hope this will help support the Pub as a business and provide accommodation for their customers and other visitors to the area such as walkers and sightseers. Tim highlighted that they are not looking to extend Tynings Farm in any other way and purely wish for these additional buildings to be holiday lets.

The original stable blocks passed in planning would have meant frequent comings and goings of numerous different parties so Tim and Sam feel confident this option involves less traffic. In terms of access, the entrance and parking for the holiday lets is to be on the side of the property where the current gate is, this area would be widened and levelled and has been approved by Highways.

Planning includes 1 parking space for each holiday let, with overflow available on Tim and Sam's drive should it be needed. Additional hedging is planned for between the lets and the lane and any waste will be removed as either commercial waste or in extra bins as part of Tynings Farm at the front of the property.

After the discussion there was a vote on which councillors supported the planning – All councillors bar Alex Breach voted in favor. Alex's main concern is the increase in traffic to the village and the lane.

Should the planning for the Holiday lets not be granted, the stable blocks from the original plans will be built.

William Breach Recreational Field - Committee:

The PC Team would like to thank Councillors Alex and Andrew for their work this month tidying up the Recreational Field. Rotting timber and other items that could pose a danger were removed and fixtures like the Playhouse were treated and mended.

Councillor Andrew has been reviewing our grass cutting contracts, it was agreed to continue working with IdVerde – subject to the rubbish bin emptying being included in the contract as it is currently. Costs will be approved in April's PC Meeting. The Committee Bank Account is now fully set up, there is currently £1600 in the account.

SEEND PARISH COUNCIL

NB. The following minutes are a shortened version of the full minutes taken at the Parish Council meeting on 30th March 2021. These have not yet been ratified by the Parish Council and may be subject to change. A full copy of the minutes can be found on our website: www.seendparishcouncil.co.uk

The meeting held on 30th March was attended by 10 Councillors with Mr James in the Chair, Mrs Sue Bond (Clerk), Councillor Jonathon Seed, Mr George Clarke

(Chairman of Seend CL&AT) and a member of the public. Apologies from Mr Paul Manning.

Local Councillor Matters – Councillor Seed said that Wiltshire Council had begun a period of purdah now that the unitary and parish elections had been formally announced. Mrs Heatley asked Councillor Seed what would happen to the £5,000 granted by the Melksham Area Board to Avon Needs Trees now that the land purchase in Seend was not going ahead. Councillor Seed said that the Melksham Area Board had agreed that if Avon Needs Trees found an alternative site within Wiltshire then they can keep the grant. If they can't, then the monies will have to be returned. Mrs Heatley asked that now we are moving to the Devizes Area Board, will our policing and planning be moved as well. Councillor Seed said that the policing will remain the same but when there is a new Crime Commissioner elected there is likely to be a review of how policing is delivered. Planning will stay with the Eastern Area.

Minutes and Matters Arising: The Minutes of the 23rd February were approved. CLT and Park Farm Planning Application - Mr George Clarke, Chairman of the Seend CL&AT had been invited to update the Parish Council on the progress of the Park Farm planning application, particularly on the progress of the S106 agreement and a new Landscape Plan, dated 19th February, that had recently been uploaded onto the planning portal which suggested that there were changes to the revised June 2020 plan that had not been explained to the membership or parishioners. Mr Clarke said that the revisions made in June 2020 to the original March 2020 planning application were as a result of recommendations made by Wessex Water. Concerns were raised that the main sewer goes down the road and goes below the level of the sewage treatment plant and that there is a pump that pumps the water up into the sewage treatment plant and when the pump fails then the sewage has been known to come up under a manhole cover and run down the road. There is a concern that it would flow into the development and possibly flood the lower buildings. In response to feedback from Wessex Water, the architects looked at all possibilities on how to avoid doing anything other than the raising up of the lower properties on the site. But it was deemed that there was no other solution other than to raise up the plots at the bottom end. Architects drew up new plans that included gabion baskets. Gabion baskets are needed to support the raised plot. At lowest point on the plot, in the bottom corner, plot 10, the gabions are about 4 ft high, but the bottom half of the gabion will be dug in. So from road side the gabion wall is only 2 ft above the road. Mr Clarke confirmed that the gabion baskets will be hidden behind the retained boundary hedge. Whilst the hedge is to be restricted to 0.6m in height it will be enough to hide the gabion baskets from view. Mr Clarke confirmed that the cross section of the plans shows the hedge higher than the gabion wall. A Councillor commented that the problem with the plans were that they were so small and difficult to read that some may have mistaken the gabion baskets for a path. Mr Clarke said that the Gabion baskets were marked on both the June 2020 and February 2021 Landscape Plan with the words Gabion basket. The Chairman argued that the old farm hedge may not survive being so short. Mr

Clarke said that the existing hedge has not been well maintained and therefore if there are any problems with the hedge, new planting will be carried out to improve it. So whether it is existing or new, there will be a hedge to screen the gabion baskets. Asked why there was a landscape plan dated February 2021 if it was the June plans that were being used. Mr Clarke said that the June plan was the latest plan, and the plan in February 2021 was to clarify the landscape finishes. Raised Plot – Mr Clarke confirmed that the site was only going to be raised at the bottom end. There was a lot of concern about the amount of soil that would need to be brought into the site by large lorries and the impact this would have on the Barge bridge, the road and for residents. He was asked if the calculations had been done to work out how many lorry loads of soil would be needed to raise the plot. He said they had not. Mr Clarke said that with any development, quite often more soil is dug out in preparation for foundations, etc. The architect said if he had to guess, there would probably be enough soil coming out from the building further up the site that would be adequate to fill the site at the bottom. So in this instance, this soil would not need to be taken away, but would be used to help raise the site at bottom end. There would not be much soil needed to be brought in. The bottom end has to be made up 4ft from the bottom of the ditch. The level plot needs to be 2ft and 18" above the road. He felt that there had been exaggerated claims about the amount of soil needed to be brought in. The Chairman, said that it would have been good if this information had been made available to the parish to alleviate such concerns. Mr Clarke said that question was answered in June and that the plans show it.

Section 106 agreement – Mr Clarke explained that the first draft agreement was prepared by Wiltshire Council solicitors, but not received until mid November. There were a number of errors in the first draft that needed to be corrected. The revised version was not sent until end of January. Further amendments needed to be made and a version that the CLT were happy with received in mid February. There are four signatories to the agreement: Wiltshire Council, White Horse Housing Association, the landowners and Seend CL&AT. The S106 agreement restricts the development to affordable housing only and for the self-build plot not to be occupied until the affordable houses are built. Mr Clarke believed that the signing of the agreement was currently being held up by the solicitors of the landowners who were querying a number of points. Mr Clarke had said that he would only come back with news once all parties had signed the S106 agreement. When it will be signed is outside the CL&AT's control. Once signed by all parties formal planning permission will be granted. Mrs Heatley asked how soon building would begin once the application was approved. Councillor Seed said that was entirely up to the builders who had up to three years from when planning is approved to begin work. A Councillor asked if the parish would be able to see the final plans with all the changes. Mr Clarke said that the June plans were the final plans and they had not been changed since. These were available to see on-line or in paper form at Wiltshire Council. The Chairman brought the discussions to a close, by saying that had the CL&AT communicated the details of these plans better to its members and Seend Cleeve residents, then it would have

alleviated some of the concerns and prevented misinformation spreading. Mr Clarke was thanked for coming to the meeting.

Police Matters - Incidents:

- Overnight on 9th March small amounts of money taken from cars in Seend Cleeve.
- 12th March Sells Green male in a van pulled into a business and dropped off a male and female who went into the showroom in an attempt to distract employees. The male then drove round the back of the yard and proceeded to urinate against some property before all were asked to leave.
- 15th March RTC at The Bell crossroads causing one vehicle to become wedged into the barrier of the property. No injuries were caused.
- 27th March unknown suspects caused damage to six tractor tyres and a slurry trailer. Incident under investigation.

All dog owners should remain alert as there have been reports of dognapping. Also remain alert and do not do business on the door step with cold callers. There are various scams going around which are getting more sophisticated. Fraudsters are taking advantage of the NHS COVID-19 vaccination programme sending emails, text messages or phone calls with offers to "jump the queue" in return for payment or confidential details. There is no charge for the COVID-19 vaccination and the NHS is adhering rigidly to the government's order or priority list, so any such messages asking for money is fraudulent. If you are a victim of any scams, please report it.

Neighbourhood Plan All Councillors had been circulated with Referendum version of the Neighbourhood Plan. Mrs A'Bear reported that the Seend Parish Neighbourhood Plan will go to Referendum on 6th May. Two observers from the SPNP steering Group will be invited to witness the count which is likely to take place on 9th May. Details of how this will happen will be more forthcoming nearer the election date. For the SPNP to be approved, it needs the vote of 50% of the people.

Highways

<u>CATG</u> – The Chairman attended the March CATG meeting. Most of the Highway Improvement Requests had been carried out. There was just one outstanding: the request for a visible high friction surface to be painted on the road between Spout Lane and Inmarsh Lane where there are two dropped kerbs. The CATG notes: *Officers have conducted a site visit and consider this to be more of an issue for outbound drivers as they approach from the s-bend near Spout Lane. The crossing point is more visible to drivers heading in the opposite direction. An estimate to provide a pedestrian crossing warning sign with new post would be in the region of £600, inclusive of temporary traffic management. In light of boundary changes, to recommend funding to Devizes Area Board. To recommend to Area Board that this Issue be closed (to Melksham CATG). Highways to ensure handover. His recommendation would be to have warning signs rather than the high friction surface. A Councillor suggested that there should be a warning sign on both sides of the crossing point.*

Bell Hill Crossroads – Request for crash barriers at the former Bell pub. Councillors had been circulated with a letter from the current owner of the former Bell pub who has requested stronger crash barriers to protect the property from cars hitting the building. The letter gave details of the number of crashes in recent years which have damaged the property including the most recent on 15th March which hit the railings at the front of the building. For highways to consider this request, it must have the support of the Parish Council. Councillors asked Councillor Seed for advice on how to deal with this request. He said that the request needed to be balanced between the need to protect the building alongside the need for road safety. He suggested there may be an alternative to a crash barrier such as bollards to protect the building. Councillors were sympathetic to the owners concerns, but there were some worries that more robust crash barriers, similar to those at Baldham bends may obscure visibility at the top of the hill. One Councillor asked about highways responsibility for the safety of neighbouring properties and whether as an A-road, wasn't it Highways responsibility to sort out, not the Parish Council. The barriers at Baldham Bends were installed by Wiltshire Council without input from the Parish Council. Councillor Seed recommended that in the first instance, the Parish Council support the request by submitting a Highways Improvement Request to the Devizes CATG, but that in it we ask for the problem to be assessed and for Highways to come up with some suggested solutions to which the Parish Council could have some input so that it doesn't put something in that is out of keeping with the village. Resolution: The Chairman proposed that the Parish Council submits a Highway Improvement Request to the Devizes CATG as outlined above. All Councillors in favour.

Planning Matters

Wiltshire Council new Planning IT system The Clerk reported that Wiltshire Council had a new IT system for the management of planning applications. Mrs A'Bear and the Clerk expressed concern about the functionality of it compared with the old system. Mrs A'Bear asked Councillor Seed if it was worth passing on these concerns to Wiltshire Council or to wait awhile until any teething problems are ironed out. Councillor Seed it was always useful for parish council to pass on feedback.

<u>Application Ref: 21/02382/TCA - Site Location:</u> 17 Dial Close, Seend, SN12 6NP Proposal:- H1 - Trim hedges (as pictured) to control size and re-establish shape. H2 - Reduce section of Laurel hedge (as pictured) in height by approximately one third, approximately to the height of the neighbours gutter. H3 - Remove section of Laurel hedge which comes out towards Hawthorn tree (see picture) to as close to ground level as possible. Retain section which runs along the boundary. T4 - Crown reduce Hawthorn tree by approximately 1.5m.

Resolution: All Councillors voted in favour.

<u>Application Ref: 21/02524/TCA</u> Site Location: 1 Somerset Close, Seend SN12 6QH Proposal: Cherry tree - feel because it is too close to the boundary and is pushing over the fence which is our neighbours' responsibility. They now wish to replace the fence

and the tree is in the way. This tree will be replaced with a smaller but semi mature ornamental tree planted further away from the fence line and to maintain screening. Resolution: All Councillors voted in favour.

<u>Tree Matters</u> – <u>Avon Needs Trees</u> – The Clerk read out a letter from the Chairman of Avon Needs Trees confirming that they have pulled out of the purchase of the land between Rusty Lane and Bollands Hill.

Tree pruning in the nesting season - The Clerk reported that she had received an email from a resident who expressed concerns that he had seen tree pruning and felling taking place inside the nesting season (1st March to 1st August) and wanted the parish council to investigate what the rule was. The Clerk contacted Wiltshire Council's tree warden. His response is as follows: "There is nothing in any legislation stating that no hedges or trees can be cut during the nesting season. As long as the hedge or tree has been properly checked for ACTIVE nests, then the works can be undertaken. It's quite easy to see if any trees have nesting birds but domestic hedges are a little different. So, if the tree surgeon or owner has thoroughly checked the hedge and there are NO nesting birds within it, then the trimming works can go ahead. A dangerous tree that has been assessed and categorised as dangerous can be removed even with a nest in it. The tree contractor should try and move the nest to the nearest tree prior to any works starting." Investigation by Mrs A'Bear and the Clerk confirmed that the tree felling in Inmarsh Lane was because the trees were diseased with ash dieback. It was for the same reason that trees were felled along the A361 near the Lamb on the Strand in February.

<u>Correspondence</u>: Final year film degree students will be filming around Seend as part of their final year project themed "Best kept Village". They will be contacting individual householders for permission where they wish to do filming, but wanting to check with the Parish Council first. Mr Lack suggested they be told about the Seend Open Gardens which is due to take place on 12th/13th July. Great British Spring Clean – 28th May to 13th June: They are asking "Litter Heroes" across the country to get outside and get active and help with mission to clean up a million miles of UK streets, coastlines, parks, footpaths and neighbourhoods.

Financial Matters – Bank reconciliation to end of January £ 26,817.56

2nd Noticeboard for Seend Cleeve The Clerk reported that there was still £465 remaining unspent from the 2020 Solar Farm Community payment, and suggested that a second noticeboard be purchased for Seend Cleeve, to replace the one by the phone box. The full cost would be £634 ex VAT. This would mean that both noticeboards in Seend Cleeve will be replaced with new man-made timber ones which will be long-lasting. All Councillors voted in favour.

<u>Date of Next Meetings</u> - The next Parish Council meetings are 27th April and 25th May.

WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR NEWS FROM JONATHON SEED

Dear Seend and Bulkington Residents,

BITS AND BOBS

NATURE NOTES

As the summer visitors are now arriving it seems appropriate to repeat the following:

<u>House Martins</u>: These lovely migrant birds fly from Africa to nest in the British Isles, many in our area. They spend a long time making their mud nests under the eaves of houses. Please be tolerant of their building habits. The birds become distressed if all their hard work is destroyed. If house martins cannot raise their broods, yet another species will be endangered.

<u>Swallows</u>: These beautiful birds always return to their old nest sites, so please ensure access to them. If, for reasons of security, access has to be shut, swallows will fly through small openings in order to reach their traditional nesting sites. It has already been reported in the media that returning swallows are already 25% down on previous years. Try erecting artificial nest boxes to attract them to nest as traditional sites are fast disappearing.

<u>Swifts</u>: Their nesting sites are fast disappearing, due to development and property maintenance. They require an access tunnel of at least 18" long with a small entrance hole; please don't block them off. Swifts are believed to spend as much as nine months to a year on the wing, and they are known to nap whilst flying. Swift sightings can be reported to Bradford-on-Avon Swift Group at climatechampions@gmail.com, or www.swift-conservation.org.

These birds are all protected species. It is an offence to disturb or destroy their nest sites and environments.

Should you require any advice about these birds, or how to obtain artificial nesting boxes, and how to erect them, contact Wiltshire Wildlife Trust on 01380 725670.

The Woodland Trust site is a good one to consult for advice and maybe information for grants. Let's increase the foliage area in this Parish to help our birds, insects, mammals and flora. Dedicate a wild patch in your garden and create piles of dead wood. Let's 'Plant for Life' during this recovery year from the great pandemic.
