



She will be fondly remembered for her delicious cooking at Seend shop and the many parties she catered for. She loved her beautiful garden and was proud to show off her many colourful displays at the Seend open gardens.

Rosemary had found great happiness when she married Bib (Walter Mayell), also a popular man of Seend and the local builder. They had many happy years together and shared some fabulous holidays, Scotland being a favourite. Together they were a great team helping out in the village at various events. She was a devoted mum to Nick and Kate, plus a much loved Grandma to Abby and Holly, who she lovingly looked after on the days that Kate did her hairdressing in Seend. The girls were taught baking skills from a very young age. Rosemary loved the birds too and was always feeding them mealworms as she loved to watch them feed their young. The squirrels too were also fed a feast of walnuts.

Her funeral took place on the 22nd of September with Derek Frost taking the service, having been a long-term friend of Rosemary and Bib. The family hope to arrange a Memorial Service for Rosemary and Bib (who passed away last year) at a later date for the village to pay their respects.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Wiltshire Council Draft Climate Change Strategy Consultation and Natural Environment Plan: Wiltshire Council has produced two draft strategies relating to climate change and the wider natural environment. Our draft climate strategy which covers seven delivery themes: transport; built environment; waste; green economy; energy generation; natural environment, food and farming; and carbon neutral council. It will help shape the next 5years of the Council's fight against climate change.

At the same time, we will be consulting on "Our Natural Environment Plan" – A Green and Blue Infrastructure (GBI) Strategy for Wiltshire, which looks at the future for Wiltshire's natural environmental assets and how the Council can help protect and enhance them for the benefit of people and biodiversity. From 1st September to 17th October, people can view the draft strategies and attend webinars to find out more and respond through our on-line survey. Full details are available at www.wiltshire.gov.uk/green-economy. A hard copy of each strategy is available to view in every Wiltshire library, including mobile libraries.

Flytipping has been brought to the Parish Council's attention. There have been some recent incidences of garden waste being dumped in the fields around the Parish. Naturally the farmers are extremely upset about these incidences and the risk it presents to livestock. No-one should be dumping green waste or any kind of rubbish in any fields in our Parish or beyond. To all intents and purposes this is flytipping and it is illegal to do so. Flytippers who are caught have been prosecuted and heavily fined.

The Recycling Centres are now back open without the need to book a slot and parishioners can pay for a green bin collection. Anyone who has paid someone to take garden waste away may also be culpable if they have not checked that the contractors they use have the correct licences for waste disposal. Fly tipping can be reported to the police or Wiltshire Council via the Mywiltshire on-line reporting app:

www.wiltshire.gov.uk/mywiltshire-online-reporting or ring 0300 456 0100. If you witness fly-tipping taking place, please report it immediately. Wiltshire Council has a financial reward scheme linked to their We're Targeting Fly-tipping campaign.

Road Closure - Seend Cleeve (Near the Barge) – 11th October for 5 days.

Wiltshire Council has made an Order to close temporarily to all traffic: C226 (Part), Seend; from the location known as The Barge Sewage Pumping Station for approximately 120m in a southerly direction. To enable Davies Groundworks to carry out new sewer connection and associated works.

CHURCH NEWS

The View from my window

I hope you have all had a good summer and I hope you are enjoying a golden October. That is, of course a hope or a dream for at the time of writing that is still to come. I have had a wonderful summer in the UK travelling from the extremes of the north of Scotland, where I swam in the sea with my sister, and the southern-most part, the Isle of Wight. In between I thoroughly enjoyed the drive between the two, particularly the night I spent at a Travelodge in Carlisle; just me and a little feast from M&S next door. (Sorry for the advertising.)

As I write, two of my grandsons are staying with me, one is painting the garden furniture and the other is cutting back a large beech hedge, and so you must all be saying what a lucky lady; indeed I am. We live in a beautiful country with changing seasons, and if we are lucky and indeed we work at them, we can have wonderful relationships with our friends and family. I came across a wonderful quotation from an early Christian writer this week which helps to explain what I mean "Everywhere narrow shafts of light pierce the veil that separates heaven from earth". Think about it. Heaven is closer than you think and sometimes we can be aware of it.

But of course, as I speak and by contrast, the people of Afghanistan are suffering so much; some have been able to escape and some have been left behind and who knows what fate is in store for them. Some have lost families and some have lost homes and the country which they love. Some must be feeling betrayed by the countries which they have helped so much. I think of all the sufferings that Jesus endured, betrayal by his friends was one of the worst. I'm sure that like me you must all be wondering where is God in all this and how does he or she allow this to happen? I can't come up with a glib answer to that, but what I can say is that if we bask in our glorious countryside, how much more does God who created it, and if we weep with the refugees and those who have lost so much, how much more does God! The God I believe in is a compassionate God, full of love for his creation which includes all human beings and indeed animals and plants, and by the way, the Taliban. He never promised that bad things would not happen, but what he did promise was that he would be there with us every step of the way, to give us comfort and courage and hope and love; there for us to hang on to.

So what can we do? If you can, pray about it. If not, listen with your heart as well as your mind. The bible tells us to look after the orphans and the widows, so I think we should open our hearts to the refugee agencies. Keep listening and where we have any influence, use it. Do not pass by on the other side. We all have so much more than those people who have lost everything so we must find a way to share; maybe money, maybe clothes and food, maybe our homes, whatever. If we consider God's good gifts to each of us, we have much to be thankful for. In return we are called to be generous stewards giving back to God in response for what he has done for us. My prayer today is, please God help us to help them.



What could be more perfect than the late summer sunshine? Well, just the sound of laughter as the WI finally met in the Pavilion again

for the September meeting, when we heard an excellent illustrated talk on "The Blood Bikes-Motorcycle Couriers". The concept started in 1962 when Margaret Ryerson and her husband came up with the idea of helping the NHS with deliveries of blood. The original group closed but others emerged culminating in the National Association of Blood Bikes in 2008. They provide a voluntary highly professional rapid response medical service to the NHS. They transport blood, platelets, surgical instruments, donor milk and clinical products across the UK and Ireland. Members were particularly interested to note that they deliver fresh blood to the Air Ambulance at Semington every day. It has been proved that having this resource available at the scene of an accident can help save lives.

Our next meeting is Quiz Night on 13th October. This is an open meeting for members, family and friends. It will be in teams of four. Please bring your own refreshments (including a glass) and nibbles. It is essentially a fun evening with the added bonus you may be able to answer the questions and win a small prize!

Minutes & Matters Arising - New Noticeboard by phone box in Seend Cleeve – not yet installed. **School Grounds Access** – meeting to take place with the Headteacher. Date tbc. **CLT Park Farm** – no date has been given for the start of building work. **Queen's Platinum Jubilee** – plans for how the Parish can celebrate this anniversary to be discussed at the September meeting.

Police Matters – Incidents – 6 Aug – Catalytic converter taken from car outside a house in The Lye.

Fly Tipping is a criminal offence and is occurring in and around Seend. Please take your rubbish to the recycling centre. Do not dump it on other people's property. Fly tipping incurs costs to the landowner to remove it and harms animals. Report fly tipping to police or on www.wiltshire.gov.uk/mywilts-online-reporting or ring 0300

456 0100. If you witness fly-tipping, please report it immediately. Wiltshire Council has a financial reward scheme linked to their We're Targeting Fly-tipping campaign.

Electric Scooters are classified as motor vehicles and are not legal to ride on public places. While e-scooters are legally available to purchase, it is currently against the law to ride a privately owned e-scooter in any public place in the UK including roads, pavements, parks and town centres. The only place a privately owned e-scooter can be used is on private land. Anyone caught using an e-scooter illegally faces a fine, penalty points on your driving licence or even loss of your licence. Offences relating to the standard of driving or speeding also apply and police have the power to seize e-scooters if offences have been committed.

Highways - Bus Shelter – Repair due to take place 9th September. **Metro Count**, The Stocks – The Clerk reported that she had agreed a location with the resident and had now submitted the Traffic Survey Request form. Because of the back log it will be some months before it is carried out. **The Lye Bus shelter** – The light was flickering. The Clerk to contact our electrician. **Rusty Lane** – A letter was sent to the Rights of Way team regarding the poor state of the path, but no response had been received yet. It was suggested that as much of the problem was caused by the blocked drainage ditches that we approach the landowner to see if they would help clear the ditches.

Path Clearance – Seend Ramblers had let the Clerk know that a gang of West Wilts Ramblers had cleared SEEN 26, 27 & 6. With the heavy work being done it is hoped that Seend Ramblers will be now able to keep on top of it.

Neighbourhood Plan – 30 hard copies have been printed. Copies are to be left in the Community Centre, Seend Church, The Brewery and The Three Magpies, and the local libraries. Councillors and the NP Steering Group members to have spare copies to lend out. Mrs A'Bear said that there was a Neighbourhood Plan Toolkit which could be used to evaluate and monitor the effectiveness of the Neighbourhood Plan. She and the Clerk should work out a system of how to assess each new planning application and to record how it was assessed. Mrs A'Bear said that it would also be important to ensure that Wiltshire Council's planning officers were referring to the Neighbourhood Plan when assessing new applications. She had attended an on-line webinar on the new NPPF about the need for ongoing reviews of Neighbourhood Plans to ensure that they met the requirements in the Wiltshire Local Plan. This was still in draft stage and our NP had just been made. There was no need to starting reviewing our NP just yet. Maybe in three years time would be the right time frame. **Planning** – Please refer to full minutes on PC website to see what planning applications have been discussed.

Finance – Bank Reconciliation to end of July 2021 - £31,498.86

Items for Note - Spout Lane Canal Bridge – It was reported that there had seen a surveyor taking a 3D scan of the bridge so that it can be regularly checked for movement. **Re-dedication of the War Memorial**: Mrs Heatley said that the date had been changed to 2nd December. It was for invited guests only. It was hoped that a new

plaque would be erected to mark the occasion, possibly funded by the Solar Farm Community Benefit payment.

NEWS FROM TAMARA REAY

Residents may have heard about Ash Dieback and/or seen tree felling across the county over the last few months and I thought it would be helpful to explain a little more about this disease and actions which need to be taken. It is estimated that there are over 100,000 Ash trees growing beside Wiltshire's roads, and an equal or even greater number on the 6,000km of public rights of way in the county, as well as around 140,000 Ash trees on council owned land. Nationwide it is anticipated that 90% of woodland trees and 50% of trees outside woodlands will be affected.

Ash Dieback is already widespread in Wiltshire and poses serious safety, practical, environmental and financial risks. Once infected trees decline quickly, often dying within two growing seasons. The trees rapidly lose timber strength and integrity and are prone to structural failure, leading to branches and trees falling, increasing the risk of death or injury to persons and damage to property. The Council is working to monitor and remove unsafe Ash trees, prioritising trees on the highway, rights of way and in public spaces. The cost to the Council of removing trees over the next ten years likely to be at least £10 million and could be significantly more. Alongside this, it is strongly advised that all landowners should take steps to identify, monitor and remove infected Ash trees on their land. I know that many residents and communities will be keen to explore opportunities to replace any trees which are removed, and Wiltshire Council has produced a Community Environmental Toolkit which contains useful information, including funding opportunities for community groups.

Finally, a reminder that the Wiltshire Council Climate Strategy is now open for public consultation until 17th October. It covers seven themes: transport; built environment; waste; green economy; energy generation, storage and distribution; natural environment, food and farming; and carbon neutral council. At the same time, we are also consulting on Our Natural Environment Plan which looks at the future for Wiltshire's natural environmental assets and how the council can help protect and enhance them for the benefit of people and biodiversity. NURTURE NATURE

"Hedgerows must grow by 40% to hit zero targets", the Government has indicated in a report of 6th September. So let's conserve and preserve hedges by bulking them up. Remove any dead plants, replace with new and give them a good mulch in order to increase their biodiversity value and longer life, which will help to conserve the existing wildlife – birds, mammals, insects and fauna and flora in general, and promulgate species in order to keep their numbers up to a sustainable level. Try to avoid sacrificing a living hedge for wooden fences, which often change aspects from rural to suburban. Should fences be required, cut 13cm by 13cm spaces at the bottom of them to allow the travels of hedgehogs – another fast declining species – in their search for food, especially at night. Hedgehogs travel long distances and are good friends to gardeners because they eat slugs and snails. Try not to use chemical pesticides which hedgehogs could gain access to, as if they eat such substances they will die unpleasant deaths. Slug pellets are a definite no-no. There are eco friendly pesticides should you have to protect your veg patches, etc. Brands such as Slug Gone - there are a good range available which won't harm pets or wildlife, just ask at any of the outlets you usually use. You will be well rewarded, just by taking sensible measures and by being aware of the danger ever present to garden wildlife, which should lead to an increase in species numbers over time. Also bats as well as birds follow hedge and tree lines to feed on the abundant insects that breed and thrive in them. There are bats in our villages, of different sizes and species, but they too are declining, especially over the last two decades. At dusk we can see big, medium and small bats searching around the trees and hedges for insects. Maybe there is someone resident in the village (a bat ecologist/batologist/whatever?) who could write an article on our local bats in this mag. As climate patterns change – usually for the worse – our native trees are becoming more and more prone to disease and dying. There is currently a nation-wide felling of our native ash trees due to die back. Should one have to fell trees, please try to plant others to replace them. There are species suitable for all sizes of garden. Should you be lucky enough to have a large garden or estate, a copse or spinney, you will have the space to plant trees for posterity - or to celebrate a national event or to remember a relation or national figure, such as the late Duke of Edinburgh, who was a great conservationist. Perhaps 9/11 or military personnel and civilians who lost lives in Afghanistan could be considered. It's worth remembering

that an English oak is host to nearly 400 insect species, making it an excellent choice for environmental sustainability and carbon capture. (A conker tree only hosts 4 species of insect). Ask the children to do Environmental Impact Assessments (EIAs) for future planning of gardens and local areas. There are many more things we can do to make our gardens more hospitable for humans and for wildlife – Go to it!
