



NEWS FROM SEEND PARISH COUNCIL

Electric Vehicle Charging Points (EVCP)

Landowners can apply to Wiltshire Council for grants to facilitate Community Charging Points for electric vehicles. If you wish to make a site available, the first step in applying for the Wiltshire EVCPI grant (up to £2500) is to book a free site assessment from Joju,

Wiltshire Council's EV Charging Infrastructure provider.

Please contact <u>info@joju.co.uk</u> with 'Wiltshire Council EV Charging Project' in the subject line.

Funding to complement the Wiltshire grants for this initiative is not confirmed beyond March 2023, so we recommend getting applications in ASAP.

School Access

The Parish Council with the support of a number of local residents has spent almost a year trying to progress an access path through the school grounds but has faced increased resistance from the Director of Estates & Facilities. The Chairman of the Parish Council has on two occasions written personally to the Director and has not received a reply.

The Parish Council has also written to the Governors and Friends of Seend School (FoSS). However, without formal support of the School Governors and FoSS, the Parish Council is unable to change the decision of the School Authorities and the school grounds will remain closed. This is very disappointing news as the village has lost a valuable and safe access route.

CHURCH NEWS

Christmas is coming, the goose is getting fat; wrong on two counts. Avian flu is causing much anxiety in the Christmas turkey market, and we forget at our peril that before Christmas comes Advent; Advent that wonderful season of watching and waiting. By the time you read this I hope to have attended the Advent Carol service at Salisbury Cathedral; a truly awe inspiring and spectacular start to the season.

Following Advent Sunday we have the 4 weeks of waiting. But not just waiting in an ever increasing panic, but waiting expectantly like Mary, the mother of Jesus. Waiting for the baby to be born. I can remember being an expectant mother in December and rather than buying lots of new things, (although I did that towards the end of the pregnancy) I wanted to clean out my house, make it spotless and ready for the new baby. I remember even cleaning the skirting boards, a task I have never undertaken since. That's what we have to do in Advent. Clean out our inner self, get rid of the cobwebs of deceit and dishonesty.

The first part of Advent is full of wonder, wonder at the night sky and at this dark season of the year we have plenty of time to contemplate it. There is a hymn which begins "bow down you stars". What an amazing thought .There is time to gaze at the silhouettes of the skeletal trees in the moonlight, and time to listen to the forces of nature, and the winds and the storms. We seem to be getting quite a few of those, but not much cold as yet. All these things to ponder before we get swept up in the frenzy of buying that happens before Christmas and then the joy of the day itself.

Every year there seems to be a poignancy however. We have come through Covid so this year should be more sociable, but this year there seems to be so much to worry about financially. Can we afford this or that? And then there is the war in Ukraine. I have had the privilege of meeting my Ukrainian Guest's parents. What a lot they have all been through, but they soldier on.

So what is Christmas all about? What is it that the baby Jesus, and the adult Jesus came to show us? The answer lies in another hymn "Love came down at Christmas, love all lovely, love divine, love was born at Christmas, star and angel gave the sign", and there we have it. So if you have mixed feelings about the festive season, if you are anxious about being on your own or if you are sad that one special person in your life won't be there this year, just remember that little beautiful baby, who reaches out to all of us, with love in his heart for you and for me, and remember too that that love comes from his father our Almighty creator, to you and to me. We are loved, all of us. So come to church sometime over the season. There will be joy, there will be excitement, there will be the magical light from the candles reflected in



Councillor Simon Downey has resigned, the PC team are very grateful for his time on the Parish Council and the support he has given the village and team.

□ PCSO Janet: No report received. Our PCSO contact details are no longer working □ Councillor Tamara Reay: was unable to attend but sent an update via email: Wiltshire Council continues to lead from the front on climate change. Wiltshire Council's Cabinet received an update on its efforts to tackle the climate emergency locally, with a vast range of projects in place. The Wiltshire Climate Strategy was approved in February 2022 and since then the council has published its delivery plans, which set out how it will become carbon neutral by 2030, and the actions it can take either on its own or in partnership with others, to lead the transition to a carbon neutral county. The highlights from the detailed report include: □ 10,000 registrations across Wiltshire and Swindon for solar group buying scheme Solar Together Wiltshire with1,000 of those (from Wiltshire) paying a deposit to confirm installation for solar pv and/or battery storage □ The council has carried out a tender process for provision and replacement of electric vehicle charging points at towns with a population of 10,000 or more.

| □ It will also be rolling out a grant to support town and parish councils to install electric vehicle charging points in their local area. A well-attended webinar was recently held to provide town and parishes more information. □ To encourage active travel, Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plans (LCWIPs) are being developed to improve cycling and walking opportunities throughout the county – working closely with town councils. □ The council's Housing Energy Efficiency Programme will retrofit 5,000 council homes by 2030, with assessment carried out on the first 800. The aim is to reduce the amount of CO² by 15,000 tonnes which in the process will make the properties more energy efficient and help save residents money. □ The £27m Salisbury River Park transformational scheme aims to reduce flood risk |



Damaged Stile in Row Lane: The Chairman agreed to liaise with the Land Owner. **Berhills Lane:** The hedge behind the parking area adjacent to the junction of A365 has overgrown to the extent that vehicles are partially parking on the road. Due to the traffic speed in this vicinity, it is potentially dangerous. Two Councillors agreed to identify the hedge owner and their correspondence address.

Bradley Lane: The Clerk to chase Wiltshire Highways for a response to the previous letter requesting part of the existing Bridleway between Rusty Lane and Spiderweb Paddock to be upgraded to a cycle path.

Dog Waste Bins: A request can be made via the Local Area Board for a Bin. It was not clear if after installation, the council would undertake waste collection as some other bins have had to be serviced by volunteers and other organisations. The Clerk to write to Wiltshire Council to establish if they would empty the new bins.

School Access: The Parish Council has spent almost a year trying to progress an access path through the school grounds but has faced increased resistance from the Director of Estates & Facilities. The Chairman of the Parish Council has written personally to him twice and has not received a reply, which is very disappointing. The Parish Council has also written to the Governors and FOSS.

Community Speed Watch: Two further volunteers agreed to undertake the necessary training bringing the total number of trained volunteers to six.

Local Highways & Footpath Infrastructure Group (LHFIG): As a result of the LHFIG meeting 4th October it was agreed the road and supporting infrastructure improvements for 'The Stocks' will now proceed. To facilitate the work, the Parish Council approved a budget of £3,500.

The next LHFIG meeting is scheduled for 17th January 2023 and the infrastructure improvement request for The Bell Crossroads and Bollands Hill will be an agenda item. The Parish council agreed in principle to fund 50% of the improvement costs up to a maximum of £5,000. A firm proposal will be presented to the Parish Council following 17th January meeting before a firm commitment is made.

Planning Applications:

PL/2022/07454 - The Appleyard, Spout Lane, Seend - Erection of a dwelling, (resubmission of PL/2021/08918)

It was noted the landscape character will not be adversely affected and there are no heritage assets in the immediate vicinity that would be affected.

However, more detail is needed with regards to the discharge of surface water from the site. The Parish Council approved this application with the condition that visibility splays at the entrance into Spout Lane meet Highways criteria.

PL/2022/07574 - Land adjoining Bell Inn, Bell Hill - Erection of one self-build dwelling with associated landscaping. The site was an overflow car park for the Bell Inn, so access is established although now shared with The Bell development and needs to be clarified. The Parish Council approved this application with a condition no vehicles associated with the site construction are parked on the public highway.

Sandridge Solar Community Benefit Payment: Two Councillors to meet with the manager of The Three Magnies to finalise the location of the Rike racks. Sandridge

Sandridge Solar Community Benefit Payment: Two Councillors to meet with the manager of The Three Magpies to finalise the location of the Bike racks. Sandridge Solar advised the new annual base value for Seend Parish Council will be £1,014.94. The payment is expected in November 2022.

Community Tree Planting Scheme: The Council discussed two items of correspondence from a local parishioner and agreed it would in principle support the ideas proposed, but could not commit to providing administrative or financial support towards the purchase of the land. However, the Council may consider helping to procure trees on land after it has been officially designated for the planting of trees.

Pothole, Meadow View, Seend Cleeve: A large pothole has formed adjacent to Meadow View at the bend in Seend Cleeve. Clerk to report the matter to Highways.

Parish Steward: The Clerk to request the Parish Steward to undertake:

Check and where necessary clear the gullies in Row Lane.
 Cut back the overgrowth and clean the 30mph signs adjacent to the junction of Pelch Lane and Perry's Lane.
 Clean the Community Speedwatch sign on A361 Seend Village 30mph Sign on the eastern entrance to the village from Seend Fork.

Clerk Training: The PC agreed to fund the ILCA training costs (£120.00). Allotments: All allotment holders indicated they wish to retain their plots for the coming year and their payments received. The annual cutting of the Allotment hedges has commenced.

Items of Note:

Community First: The Community First AGM had been well supported and a number of awards were given. The organisation offers a number of training courses including a minibus driver's course. Community First is looking to raise £30k towards a new minibus.

Community Land Trust: The additional high-level scaffolding due for installation at the beginning of October will now be erected in November.

Precept Meeting: The Precept meeting took place on 15th November.

Devizes Area Board: The next Area Board meeting is on 5th December.

Licences: A company trading as 'Magic Waste Solutions based in Corsham has applied for a licence to use Old Station Yard, Station Road, Seend as an operating centre for three goods vehicles.

Finance: Bank Reconciliation to end of September 2022 - £44,725.22 **Date of next meeting:** 24th January 2023. Meetings commence at 7pm A full copy of the minutes is available on the Parish Council Website.



Wiltshire and Swindon POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER

PHILIP WILKINSON'S COLUMN Policing has been under the microscope in the last year and I don't see this scrutiny letting up any time soon – and neither should it. The public want their police force to keep them safe, protect vulnerable people, put victims first, catch the criminals responsible, produce quality investigations and lock the bad ones up. Wiltshire Police has had its fair share of criticism. It has received a poor PEEL inspection report and is currently in 'special measures'. I can reassure you progress is being made and my scrutiny of that performance is ongoing. We have had some solid successes too. You told me road safety and speeding was a key concern. I have committed investment into the roads policing unit, increasing the number of officers and cars by 20%. We also tripled the capacity of the speed enforcement team, with extra police staff and state-of-the-art cameras. With this joined up approach, there are more traffic officers on our streets and there has been an increase of 42% of the number of people caught speeding and given tickets. There is still more to do but our roads will become safer as the deterrent of speeding tickets and prosecution starts to bite. The rural crime team has also doubled since I committed investment in the team and in extra equipment. I was also pleased with the force's commitment to visit all victims of home burglary – let me know if this doesn't happen and I will act. We are also in the process of recruiting the next Chief Constable of Wiltshire Police and I hope to have them confirmed in post by mid-January. We look forward to welcoming them to the county. In the meantime, our current Chief will carry on implementing the improvements needed to satisfy HM Inspectors and provide stability so

Please also make sure you take part in my survey, taking place in December and January, which will ask you about your confidence levels in Wiltshire Police and about the policing precept for 2023/24. It is important we capture as many people's thoughts as possible and you will find this on my website from mid-December.

the force can continue making Wiltshire safer for all.

Wiltshire's Restorative Justice team have been rewarded after being named the "Police Support Volunteer Team of the Year" at the annual South West Citizens in Policing Awards in Poole. Volunteers and staff from the service were joined at the awards ceremony by Deputy Police and Crime Commissioner Russell Holland, Chief Constable Kier Pritchard and Assistant Chief Constable Dave Minty. The team at Restorative Together has been funded by the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner in Wiltshire for the past six years and the scheme is managed by Victim Services manager, Julia Gay.

Restorative Justice brings those harmed by crime or conflict together with those responsible. It offers victims of crime a level of resolution and possible closure and can help the harmer to recognise and understand how their behaviour affects others. The Restorative Justice facilitators are all volunteers who are highly trained to work with those harmed and their harmers to help all parties move on in a positive way. NURTURE NATURE

The higher than normal seasonal daily temperatures (in excess of 12 degrees C -



Armistice Day was the warmest on record) in many parts of the British Isles have had a knock on effect for Nature, affecting birds, mammals and plants. Some plants are flowering out of season, which is confusing the circadian rhythms of birds, mammals and insects. Some birds are even starting to build nests, bees are buzzing in unexpected blossoms, bats should be dormant but are taking the odd nocturnal flight, hedgehogs should be hibernating but are making nocturnal foraging sorties. The unseasonal weather is also influencing the behaviour of winter migrants, and fewer have been seen so far this year. This should change as the weather gets colder. However, birds, and especially seabirds, have been greatly affected by avian flu and coastal colonies have been badly depleted. So, please keep feeders and birdbaths clean. This is also the time of year when rats arrive seeking their winter quarters, so it is wise to take feeders down before dusk, and empty bird baths – rats are highly intelligent and are good climbers.

The Holly and the Ivy when they are both full grown....' yes, Christmas is nigh, but please leave as much berry bearing holly and ivy as both provide valuable pop-up cafes with sustenance for birds and, in the case of ivy, insects too as the weather cools down. Lastly, at the end of a momentous year which saw the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee, what about planting a native tree for the Queen's Green Canopy. Happy Wassailing!

BITS AND BOBS

Boiler use tip. Do you have a conventional hot water storage tank which can be heated either by an immersion heater or by an oil fired boiler and you are on an economy 7 (dual rate) meter? If so, this may be of interest.

When the electricity prices were raised on October 1st this year I found that while the day rate had risen the night rate had actually fallen. So I did the sums and came up with the following costs to heat a tank of water (based on Octopus standard tariff): Using boiler - 64p Using immersion heater on day time electricity - 83p Using immersion heater on night time electricity - 28p. So now, with the aid of a timer, we use the immersion heater overnight supplemented with occasional top up with the boiler during the day as required.
