Ralph, Rachel and their son Peter moved away from the village in 1983 but returned to live in Melksham in later years where, amongst other things, he played bowls, umpired in local cricket matches, and did lots of local voluntary work.

His popularity was very evident at Seend Church on 7th April, when his funeral service was attended by a large number of people, many sporting the black and yellow colours of Melksham F.C. and Wolverhampton Wanderers.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK Saturday May 15th. - Saturday May 21st. 2022

Christian Aid, with over 70 years' experience, works to bring an end to poverty in nearly 40 countries, helping people in Africa, Asia and the Middle East as well as Latin America, the Caribbean and parts of Europe by addressing the root causes as well as the effects of poverty. They work with 475 local, national & international partner organizations, some are Christian, some Muslim, Jewish or Hindu – some are of no religious persuasion at all. Christian Aid's primary concern is that partners are good at what they do. The work is inspired by Christian values of faith, charity, hope and truth. Put simply 'aid' is what Christian Aid does, 'Christian' is why they do it. The usual emergencies have continued this year in the poorer countries with increasing demands for medical materials to fight the pandemic. Sadly, the vaccine rollout, so quick in the richer countries, is still very slow in the poorer countries Only 13 per cent of people in low-income countries have been vaccinated, compared with almost 70 per cent in high-income countries according to UN figures in March 2022. The World

Health's Organisation's CO-VAX system to help with procurement of vaccines so they are available to rich and poor alike is not working. Partly, the rich countries are not generous enough, but often poor countries do not have adequate health facilities to care for the COVID sick or to roll out the vaccine,

Christian Aid planned in 2022 to focus on: -

- (a) Testing innovative microcredit models that build resilience to climate-related shocks and stresses so encouraging small businesses that are especially relevant to climate change.
- (b) Developing new models to support women's economic empowerment.

In terms of countries the emphasis was to be on Zimbabwe, but these plans were made before Feb. 24th. Inevitably, once Russia invaded Ukraine the emphasis had to change. By the end of March, the DEC (Disasters Emergency Committee) had already collected £200million - only the 2004 Tsunami produced anything like this sum so fast, and it is still growing. Christian Aid has been allocated 7% of the £200M - most needs to be spent in the first 6 months and is being distributed by 3 partner organisations working in the area. Christian Aid prefers to work with local organisations that are familiar with both places and people. The money is to be spent on emergency help for those displaced people within Ukraine or fleeing to nearby countries and is used for food, shelter, clothing and medicines - sufficient for refugees to survive since the long-term situation is at present unclear. But more monies will be available for reconstruction and other long-term help when the needs are clearer. Important though Ukraine is, Christian Aid still needs to allocate funds to their more traditional work, paying heed to their 2022 plans and developing huge problems especially in Afghanistan, South Sudan and Yemen.

Asking for more money seems hard when you may have probably contributed recently to one of the many Ukraine appeals and are likely to have little to spare due to the sharp rise in the cost of living. But those in the Wellsprings Benefice have always been generous to Christian Aid so I hope you will feel able to support Christian Aid Week once again. As usual, for your convenience, a Christian Aid envelope is inside this May edition of Spotlight; please keep it safely. The collectors will call during the week of 15th – 21st. May. It helps them considerably and is more convenient to you if the donation is ready when they call. I appreciate it is a nuisance but if you pay income tax, please complete the Gift Aid slip too, it increases your amount to Christian Aid by 25% at no extra cost to yourself. Then tear off the slip, place inside the envelope, moisten the strip at the top of the envelope and fold.

If you are on holiday during Christian Aid week or miss your collector for any other reason, please hand your envelope in at the Village Shop in Seend or to Liz Futter, Mill Lane, Bulkington or to me at Whites Farm, Seend Cleeve, whichever is easiest.

SEEND LYE RECREATION FIELD NEWS

The Seend Lye Recreation Field (SLRF) committee has been successful in obtaining significant funding for updating the Irene Usher Memorial Pavilion. Supporters of the Lye Field will know that the much-loved Pavilion has its 50th anniversary in 2023. The Pavilion was built in a time when the cost of energy was of little consideration. The building's systems are now showing their age and running costs are rising. The moment to do something about

this has arrived. The committee plans to invest close to £100,000 through a project named Carbon Challenge 2023. The work will be carried out across two discrete phases with Phase 1 commencing this summer. The aim of the work is to make the building more energy efficient through improving building fabric, insulation and heating and lighting systems. The Suez Communities Trust has kindly agreed to fund Phase 1; Phase 2 funding has yet to be obtained.

Obviously, the SLRF charity is expected to contribute funds to both refurbishment phases so this year's **Seend Fete and Flower Show** will be super-important in helping with this. CLT Chairman, George Clarke, has now moved from the parish and has retired as chairman and director. The CLT affordable passive housing project will commence in May with the creation of site access points. The build time will be approximately 60 weeks, depending on weather. GEORGE NEWTON OF SEEND

A Brief Account of George Newton's Earliest Surviving Lantern Clocks

Almost 400 years ago in the year 1625 George Newton of Seend who was born around 1605, became the village blacksmith. His father, Richard Newton, had just died leaving George his forge. However, Richard also bequeathed his son a clock and it is possible that George Newton copied his father's gifted clock to become a self-taught clockmaker, making his first lantern clocks in Seend from the mid-1630s and performing all his own engraving to the wonderfully charming dials and frets of his earliest examples. History suggests that George was more than capable. The famous diarist John Aubrey, compiler of 'Brief Lives', wrote about his visit to Seend in 1666: "I went to the smythe, George Newton, an ingeniose man, who from a blacksmith turned clockmaker to fiddlemaker and he assured me that he has melted of this oare* in his forge, which the oare of the Forest of Deane &c. will not doe".

In June 2001 the Antiquarian Horology Society (AHS) published a well-researched and very interesting article about George Newton of Seend. The article was written by the then leading lantern clock expert the Late John Hooper who illustrated what is probably George Newton's earliest known surviving lantern clock and dated it as being made around c1636. John, who was the co-author of the book 'English 30 Hour Clocks'' was a highly respected authority on lantern clocks. His article is an important reference point, showing that George Newton was probably making lantern clocks prior to the English Civil War of 1642-1651.

Another very early Lantern clock by George Newton is shown in this month's Spotlight Online Colour Supplement. It is an impressive 17 inches high and is larger than a standard size lantern clock. It is closely similar to John Hooper's example in every aspect, including the wonderfully charming dial and fret design, their distinctive long arrowhead iron hands and the massive proportions of their heavy-duty brass movement castings including the pillars, plates and crucifix bars which are incredibly over 6mm thick in some areas. Newton has however, engraved this example with a more confident hand and has improved on his spelling, therefore it's probably slightly later and possibly dating between around 1636-1639.

Both examples have the exact same wonderfully charming, heraldic symbols and flowers engraved on their dials and frets which represent countries including the Tudor Rose (England), Thistle (Scotland), Shamrock (Ireland) and Fleur-de-lis (France). Interestingly, these same Heraldic flowers are also present on the Coat of Arms of the Kingdom of England from 1603 to 1649 used by King James I and Charles I and suggest to me that George Newton was a very proud and patriotic Englishman.

George Newton was a Church warden of the Church of the Holy Cross at Seend from April 1664. He died in 1681. Only four lantern clocks have come to light that were made by George Newton of Seend. I think that you will agree that he was an incredibly gifted individual!

CHURCH NEWS

The View from my Window.

May! At last; one of my favourite months.

At the time of writing the frosts have gone (I do hope this turns out to be prophetic and that my wisteria will have survived and provided the usual sumptuous handfuls of hanging bunches). Easter will have come and gone with all the frenetic activities in the churches, and now we can settle down to a

peaceful quiet time and look forward to a glorious summer.

I hope you all enjoyed the Easter festivities and that whether people of faith or not, you were able to share in the general feeling of goodwill that always accompanies Easter. There is a lovely Easter hymn which says, "Now the green blade rises from the buried grain" and as we look around, we can indeed see so many fields which are no longer brown and plain but green and bursting with the new life that comes with Spring. The hymn goes on to say, "Love is

come again like wheat that springs up green" and that of course is the Easter message, personified in the man Jesus who came to this planet over 2000 years ago, and who loved and suffered and died, and yet like the seed and the wheat, grew again. In his case after three days; in the case of the wheat, a season; both miracles when you think about it.

So, I began to wonder why is wheat like love? Wheat, like love, lies dormant sometimes doesn't it, and then it grows and flourishes. First just a few blades of what feels like tender shoots of grass, and then the whole field is covered with a greenish tinge and then the glory of a field of wheat like waves on the sea; and then of course as it ripens, golden in the sunshine. "Fair waved the golden corn", another lovely hymn. Love can be like that, I think. But it can suffer from stormy weather just as wheat can, and it can get a bit bruised and damaged on its way to full ripening. I'm sure many of us have experienced stormy times in our relationships. Jesus, who personified love, grew and flourished, and he too was bruised and damaged and hurt, not least by his disciples, but his fruition was in his demonstration to the whole of mankind that love conquers all, even death. Love lives on.

Of course, the horrors of the war in Ukraine make us question so many things. How can it be that people can fight and bomb and kill and destroy? Where is our loving God in all this? Where is Jesus in all this suffering? And yet, the Ukranians hold on to their faith and cry out to the God of their fathers. I think the answer lies in the tremendous outpouring of love and generosity that has been evident from so many people in so many countries. I am reminded of all the £20 notes given at a recent coffee morning; I am reminded of all the concerts and meetings that have been taking place in our little villages, and I am reminded of all those people who are willing to open their homes to refugees, and all those people willing to help in whatever way they can. That is about love and empathy and sharing in suffering. That's what Jesus taught us in his journey to the cross and that's what he taught us when like the wheat he rose again. I believe that good triumphs over evil. I believe that this war will stop. Along with millions of others across the world I pray every day for peace, but I also believe that we human beings have a choice. We individually and collectively can choose peace. We cannot blame God for our choices. He has given us freewill. We are not robots, but he did give us his son, the perfect human being who showed us and taught us and walked beside us and continues to do so. Why, because the essence of God is love, and if we allow it, so is ours, and that I believe is everlasting.



Local Council Matters – Local Cycling & Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWHIP)

Cllr Reay described the aim of LCWHIP which is to identify best walking and cycling routes within the local area. Also involved are the Air Quality and Sustainable Transport Group, Cycle Friendly Devizes and Bishops Cannings Parish Council as they have a significant amount of new development bordering their Parish. It was suggested that Rusty Lane could make a beneficial cycleway linking the village to the Canal and SUSTRANS Route 4. This was discussed under agenda item 2022/44 – Highways and Rights of Way.

<u>Minutes & Matters Arising:</u> Minutes of the meeting held on 22nd February were approved <u>Police Matters</u>: Whilst there have been no reported crimes this month, the following incidents have been recorded.

<u>Rights of Way – Rusty Lane</u>: The Rights of Way Warden advised that WC had not managed to identify a scheme which will generate enough 'Planings' to do the work required. Georgina A'Bear stated that Rusty Lane is a crucial route between the village and canal and the Parish Council has earmarked £4,000 towards the cost. The existing drainage issue also needs to be addressed to ensure a new surface is not subject to water erosion. Cllr Reay agreed to liaise with the Rights of Way team to address both the drainage and resurfacing of the lane.

NEWS FROM WILTSHIRE COUNCIL

Wiltshire Welcomes Ukrainian refugees

I'm very pleased that a number of local families are opening up their homes to Ukrainian families, and across the county over 200 households have offered safe homes for people fleeing from the war-torn country. Wiltshire Council is putting in additional staffing to provide checks and support the growing number of Ukrainian refugees who are due to settle in Wiltshire under the government's Homes for Ukraine scheme, including accommodation and welfare and suitability checks. The government has given local authorities a key role in helping refugees settle. The council is putting in place caseworkers and working on payment mechanisms for sponsors and emergency support for new arrivals. Officers are working alongside partners to provide sufficient school places, as well as working closely with the NHS, Department for Work and Pensions and town and parish councils.

The government is issuing visas for Ukrainian refugees. The latest government advice is the checks which local authorities are asked to carry out can wait until the guest has arrived as the Home Office will undertake their own checks prior to arrival to speed up the process. Wiltshire Council will continue to carry out the required checks and the team will be in touch with sponsors to arrange them, but these should not delay the issue of the guests' visas. Schools are working together with the council to continue education for young refugees. There will also be support for early years and post-16 young people. Voluntary groups and charities, are helping to co-ordinate responses and developing ways to ensure when families arrive they have the support they need and feel truly welcome.

At the end of the Easter term more than £11,000 was raised by school children across the county after the Wiltshire Youth Council invited schools to join in a non-uniform day on Friday 1st April. The council encouraged pupils to wear blue and yellow for a minimum of £1 to raise funds for the Disasters Emergency Committee's Ukraine Appeal.

NATURE NOTES

Decline of Species

Spotted any hirundinidae so far this spring? One swallow does not make a summer! Over the course of this century these species have declined dramatically in many of their traditional nesting environments. Please ensure that their sites are protected and respected. Who can recall when they last heard a nightingale singing? Its beautiful song is but a distant memory. When did any village property not have a spotted flycatcher nest in the creeper adorning its walls? Its aerial acrobatics were mesmerising. On one's walks have you heard the skylark and watched its graceful climb into the sky singing so melodiously, and then its spectacular glide back to the ground? Or a tree pipit for that matter. With so many trees being felled traditional songsters such as the mistle and song thrushes, blackbird, robin and others are losing their perches from which to deliver their inspiring songs to brighten our days. Trees are also important roosting sites. Dawn choruses are a thing of the past in some areas. And more of our resident birds become a statistic on the BTO Red List, 67 alone in 2020. With the continuing development of farmland, green spaces and woods for housing and industry one is experiencing the new takeover of our gardens and feeding stations by the corvid family – crows, rooks, jackdaws and magpies. This decline of our bird population is reflected in the various annual birdwatches. One of the only successes is the marauding magpie, which can now be seen quartering hedgerows, copses, gardens etc in their search for nesting birds in order to steal eggs and fledglings for food for their own progeny. Crows, too, are murderous in their slaughter of nesting birds, with the result that some species cannot maintain their numbers, let alone increase them. This decline in our bird population is also reflected in our finest pollinators. The UK has approximately 250 different species of bee. Who has seen a Tawny Mining Bee or a Cuckoo Bumble Bee? Please don't kill wasps, let them be, they do so much good in nature. More about bees in next month's column. Finally, some children have never heard a cuckoo or can name what it is. This species, too, is a declining migrant to the British Isles. However, you can follow a tagged cuckoo named 'Ellis' on the BTO website: click on BTO Cuckoo Tracking Follow Cuckoos on Migration. Also, a reminder about the dangers of using slug pellets in your garden, If you look on the web for slug treatments which are not harmful to pets or wildlife, you will find some options which do the trick. One such is Sluggo, which is widely available. Please restrict the use of chemical sprays, e.g. for green and blackfly, which kill so many of the dietary requirements of small birds such as tit species, which eventually could bring about the death of these birds.
