

#### **NEWS FROM SEEND PARISH COUNCIL**

**Village Post Office and Shop:** The Parish Council would like to ask parishioners to make use of this facility as much as possible. In the current climate and without community support, the village is at risk of losing this valuable asset.

Horse Riders & Mobile Phones: Several horse riders have been seen using their mobile phones whilst riding on public highways within the parish. Whilst it is not illegal to use such devices whilst riding on the public highway, the British Horse Society has publicly stated, "As vulnerable road users, it is vitally important horse riders and carriage drivers adhere to the rules of the Highway Code when riding on the road. Rule 53 states that equestrians should keep both hands on the reins, unless when signalling, so they should not be using mobile phones while riding, unless in an emergency. In addition, riders should always concentrate on their surroundings so they can react quickly to any circumstance." The parish council requests riders concur with this guidance issued by the British Horse Society.

#### **BULKINGTON NEWS**

<u>Parish Meeting – Abbreviated Draft Minutes - pending offical approval at next meeting - held Wednesday the 21<sup>st</sup> of September 2022 at 7.30pm in the Bulkington Village Hall.</u>

Councillors: Amy Powell (Chair), Carla Haslam (dialled in), Andrew Grabham, Alex Breach, Julie Anderson-Hill, Tamara Reay (Our Conservative Representative serving the Devizes Rural West Division)

To Receive a report from PCSO Janet and Tamara Reay

PCSO Janet: No report received

Councillor Tamara Reay:

• The last Area Board's focus was around safety and security, addressing antisocial behaviour in and around Devizes.

- Wiltshire Council committed another 2 million pounds to White Lining (making streets safer by updating the white lines on the streets) and Flood Prevention, including gulley clearing.
- Councillors asked if the White Lining funding may be used to improve pathways in Bulkington at either end of the village where there is no footpath. It was agreed to put in a request via the new CATG system now called LHFIG (New standing for Local Highways footpaths infrastructure group). All concurred that it would be beneficial to encourage safe walking within the village and that it could also help slow cars as the road markings would make it narrower without a physical barrier that would be problematic for deliveries and the farming community.
- Funding Opportunities: Tamara made some suggestions for possible funding opportunities for the Rec Ground Group to pursue: Area Board (up to £5k available to committees rather than Parish Councils following recent change) National Lottery, Wiltshire Community Foundation, Nationwide and Hills recycling

#### **Open Forum:**

- The Erlestoke festival was held on the 1-4<sup>th</sup> of September: some villagers raised concern over possible noise Erlestoke Parish Council worked with the Licensing committee and noise monitoring took place each night. As a result, villagers reported that the noise created was not a problem.
- Dog Fouling: Villager complaint received following a rise in dog Fouling in the village, Councillors agreed that signage could be looked into and posts on social media will raise attention to the matter.
- Stiles and paths: Complaints have been received regarding some of the stiles and footpaths in the village, these have been reported to the relevant field owners. For villagers wishing to report stiles, footpaths or any other issues directly, there is a website called MyWiltshire Online Reporting where anyone can report anything directly to the council. The Council then notify the relevant people to fix the issue and give updates directly the individual who reported it.
- Defibrillator access: There was an incident reported to the Parish Council where villagers were not able to access the village Defibrillator during an emergency. In the Parish Council meeting on the 21<sup>st</sup> of July 2021 it was agreed to leave the Defibrillator unlocked to make it as accessible as possible. This was communicated via Spotlight, and the Meeting Minutes (item 105/21). Councillors agreed that additional signage and reminding the village could help prevent this incident from being repeated in the future.

**Bin contract** – **Ideverde:** It was agreed to sign a new contract for refuse collection for the 6 public bins in Bulkington. The last contract came to an end when the Grass Management company was changed. The collection will be every two weeks, replacing bin bags with new bags and disposing of waste. Sum: £636.87+VAT per annum. Please continue to inform our Clerk Hannah when collections have not gone to plan so she can chase.

#### **Recreational Ground:**

- Playground updates:
  - Goal post to be installed imminently, cost to rec fund of £270 plus vat.
  - There is currently a lot of out of action equipment due to the age of the wood: The zip wire, play house and bridge all need replacing or mending. Past fundraising was for new equipment and accessibility, this year, any funds raised from the bonfire will go towards the maintenance of the Rec ground. The zip wire will be fixed in the new year due to long lead times by the supplier. It was agreed to ensure that any new wooden posts installed are on spikes with plastic caps to help protect from rain and strimming.
  - Picnic tables will arrive shortly, the Rec Ground Committee have selected tables made of recycled materials that come with a guarantee for 25 years. The tables will not be fixed into location so that they can be moved when there are events
  - The ROSPA (health and safety of equipment check) is due back next week
  - It was agreed to sign a new Grass Cutting agreement with Mark Goddard & Sons Landscaping for the maintenance of the grass on the Rec Ground, the bus shelter and the war memorial. The contract is to start March 2023. The contract includes 12-14 cuts over the summer cutting season. £228 per month to cut all the playing field grass, the bus shelter and the war memorial area.
  - For the interim, Mark believes only 2 cuts to be necessary, these will be charged as and when at a lower rate with the large open spaces cut by the Breach family as before and Mark hand cutting the edges for us. This saves us a large monthly sum over winter when the grass doesn't grow as fast.
  - Lastly, the Rec Ground Committee consists of volunteers and is a separate entity to the Parish Council. If you have the time or skill set to assist with the playground maintenance, grant applications, planting or similar, please do get in touch with our Clerk.

**Parish Steward:** Outstanding jobs to be sent to The Clerk prior to next visit. It was agreed to keep the clearing of gullies and cutting of grass on the footpath by rec ground on the Stewards list.

**Road verges:** The clerk received the following communication from Stuart Renfrew from Wiltshire Council:

"We are currently recruiting for a replacement technician for the Devizes Area Board, though I am familiar with Bulkington village. Item 3 below is an unusual request and I would venture that many of the adjacent residents would view any move that brings traffic closer to their property hedges and walls with concern. Additionally, removing

these soil verges would likely increase traffic speeds through the village which would be unwelcome. Lastly, the Steward's only machine capable of scoring the soil banks would be the 'Mosquito' and this is a fairly brutal and indiscriminate tool that would leave a less than desirable finish.

Looking at Streetview and your site photographs, the majority of the highlighted length is natural highway verges with the only evidence of true soil creep being alongside the thatched cottage. That sole specific site might benefit from siding back but, again, I feel the gains would be outweighed by the negatives. With the above in mind, I hope you can ask the Councillors to take a fresh look at this proposal to ensure that they are clear on the pros and cons involved and that their intentions are supported by the High Street residents?"

Councillors pushed for the steward to clear the area manually with shovel and bucket or use the Councils "Mosquito" tool and clear the area afterwards. It was agreed that the short stretch of road opposite the pub would benefit from this clearing particularly as cars park alongside the footpath frequently making the road left for vehicles to pass very narrow.

**Bonfire Night:** Bulkington's Bonfire Night will be on the 5<sup>th</sup> of November: As usual, the running of the event will rely on volunteers for the setup, marshalling, food stalls, ticketing, clear down afterwards etc. If you can volunteer for any of these roles, please do contact our Clerk, Hannah. Councillors Julia, Amy, Andrew, Alex and Carla all volunteered to help at the event but many more will be needed.

- It was discussed that more than one food and drinks stall would help queues, with stalls selling both food and drink so families don't need to queue twice.
- Other stalls were also discussed, such as sweeties, pocket money glow in the dark toys etc. The delivery on the glow in the dark toys is 5-7 days
- Attendees will be asked to bring cash as a card device takes a large percentage of the proceeds.
- Posters have been distributed at Keevil and Seend school, in the bus shelter and the village hall notice board. Book Bag leaflets have been delivered to both schools. The leaflet will also be featured in Spotlight magazine.
- Door drop: Leaflets have been ordered and will arrive Wednesday 28<sup>th</sup>, volunteers needed to deliver around the village

**<u>Dog Fouling</u>**: After many articles circulating last year about farmers worrying about the impact of dog fouling and plastic bag littering on their livestock and police notices, we have seen an increase in dog fouling these last few months. It would be great to remind people again.

<u>Stiles and paths</u>: Complaints have been received regarding some of the stiles and footpaths in the village, for villagers wishing to report stiles, footpaths or any other issues directly, there is a website called MyWiltshire Online Reporting where anyone can report anything directly to the council. The Council then notify the relevant people to fix the issue and give updates directly the individual who reported it. It would be great to show the link in Spotlight and encourage villagers to use it for reporting road sign damage, fly tipping, broken stiles, inaccessible footpaths etc. to allow the council to act on things directly and as quickly as possible.

#### **September PC meeting**

Attendance - Six Councillors: Apologies Mr Terry James, Mrs Pamela Akerman, Mrs Carol Dickinson, Mrs, Jackie Hamblin, Mr Martin Wiltshire

Cllr Reay provided the following update on local matters

Wiltshire Council Supports Residents with Cost of Living: The Council is taking action to support people across Wiltshire with cost-of-living issues. Assistance has been provided to residents through schemes such as the Household Support Fund (£2.7m to vulnerable households), the Energy Rebate to residents in Council Tax bands A-D and the School Holidays Activity and Food programme. The Council is focused on supporting residents, businesses (including schools) and Wiltshire Council staff. Area Boards are being asked to work with their communities to ensure local support is in place for the most vulnerable, including food banks. The Wiltshire Wellbeing Hub will support residents with financial wellbeing concerns. The 09:30hrs restriction on concessionary fare bus passes has been lifted, thus supporting the elderly and vulnerable to access essential services, and Warm and Safe Wiltshire will continue to offer free and impartial energy advice to reduce fuel poverty.

Strategy for Helping People with Mental Disabilities Enjoy Fulfilled Lives: The Wiltshire Independent Living Strategy maximises the independence, choice and control for people with a mental health condition, learning disability and/or autism spectrum condition by providing the right accommodation and support in the right place at the right time. The strategy will reduce dependence on residential care and ensure people are supported to live independently, with their own tenancy wherever this is possible. This means developing new supported accommodation and providing innovative, flexible care to enable people to live in the community.

£1.3m Extra Funding to Tackle Substance Misuse: The Council has secured additional funding to tackle illicit drug use, including enforcement, diversion, treatment and recovery. Funding is in addition to the core substance misuse services already delivered in Wiltshire. The funding will ensure enhanced focus on improved outcomes for young people and adults substance misuse services - with a particular focus on the transition period to adulthood and criminal justice.

Electric Vehicle Charging Points: Steve Vaux gave an informative presentation on the opportunity to obtain a government grant towards providing community charging points. The scheme known as the On-Street Residential ChargePoint Scheme (ORCS) requires applications to be submitted before 1<sup>st</sup> April 2023. It was suggested the initiative may need to be owned by one of the Parish Councillors. Details of the scheme have been circulated to all Parish Councillors and this topic will be an agenda item at the next parish council meeting. Councillors should consider residential areas which might be suitable for these charging points so that assessments can be requested on the most appropriate at the November meeting.

**Bus Stop at Padfield Porkies:** Wiltshire Highways are considering a potential opportunity to provide an additional bus stop on A365 west of Sells Green to better meet the needs of local residents.

**School Travel Plan:** Cllr Reay has contacted the school to arrange a meeting to complete the Plan.

**Damaged Stile in Row Lane:** The Chairman agreed to liaise with Seend Footpath working Group / Land Owner to resolve this issue.

**Berhills Lane:** The hedge behind the parking area adjacent to the junction of A365 has overgrown to the extent that vehicles are partially parking on the road. Due to the traffic speed in this vicinity, it is potentially causing a danger. The parish council will contact the land owners.

#### **Local Highways & Footpath Infrastructure Group (LHFIG)**

The next LHFIG meeting is scheduled for 4<sup>th</sup> October.

**School Access:** The Parish Council has made two requests to meet with the School Authorities, both have been declined. Despite the meetings being declined, the Parish Council will continue to try and convene a meeting with the School Authorities to review the school's insurance issue with public access and the possibility of a fenced pathway through the school grounds. The Parish Council will also contact Salisbury Diocese who are the owners of the school land. However, without formal support of the School Governors and Friends of Seend School (FoSS) it remains unlikely the Parish Council will change the decision of the School Authorities.

**Inmarsh High Friction Surface:** The Parish Council accepted Wiltshire Highways recommendation not to place additional signage in the vicinity of the crossing as it resides within the 30mph village restriction. Highways also advised that they would not consider deploying mirrors as there are potential liability issues associated with them as they can get dirty / covered in condensation etc. hence there will be periods where they aren't able to serve the purpose intended.

Community Speed Watch: Volunteer training continues.

**Bollands Hill Traffic Survey:** The survey took place on Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> October and the results will be reviewed at the next Parish Council meeting 25<sup>th</sup> October.

**Rusty Lane:** Highways advised the earliest date for resurfacing Rusty Lane will now be early December. Highways are also looking to improve the surface drainage and remove dead trees at the lower end of the lane.

**Bradley Lane Bridleway (SEEN6):** Wiltshire Highways have been asked to provide guidance as to how part of the existing Bridleway from Rusty Lane to Spiderweb Paddock can be upgraded to a cycle path.

#### **Planning Matters**

**PL/2022/06119** - New House Farm, Seend - Improvement of farm and house access off the A365 and creation of farm and residential access track with closure of existing access.

**Resolution:** The parish Council approved with the following comments:

The Parish Council noted Highway's concern regarding the excessively large splay/apron. However, there are large splays/aprons elsewhere within the parish. This is a working farm and the new entrance would be on non-productive land. If the owners enlarged the existing entrance as suggested, they would have to give up some of their garden / play area. The owners want to make it a safer place for their children

and wish to separate off the agricultural vehicular access so vehicles can manoeuvre away from the house and front door. This appears not to have been acknowledged as a consideration. To extend the existing entrance would not alleviate the safety of the children or pedestrians as agricultural vehicles and HGVs would continue to travel close to the front of the house.

**PL/2022/06445 & PL/2022/06765** (Listed building consent) – Seend Head House, - Conversion, repairs and upgrade to single storey outbuilding from garden stores to home office

**Resolution:** The Parish Council approved this application with a Condition that the outbuilding remains ancillary to the main house. As the building is Grade 2 listed – renovating the outbuilding would make it safer and improve its visual appearance. It would bring a new use (studio) to a redundant building whilst both improving and enhancing its safety and sustainability without detracting from the historical aspect of the main house or character and appearance of the location.

PL/2022/06821 – Wyatts Leaze, Trowbridge Road, - Proposed garage/storage

**Resolution:** The Parish Council approved this application with the Condition that the garage remains ancillary to the main house.

**PL/2022/06853** - Rew Farm, Trowbridge Road, Seend Cleeve, Seend, - Notification for Prior Approval under Class Q for a Proposed Conversion of Agricultural Building into 2 New Dwellings.

**Resolution:** The Parish Council approved this application noting the Public Protection comments.

**PL/2022/07010** - Parking Area Dial Close, Seend, Melksham, SN12 6NP - T1 Cherry & T2 Sycamore - Dead wood and crown thin, Crown raise to 3m of footpath 5m of road

**Resolution:** The Parish Council approved this application

**Tree Maintenance – Dial Close:** The Parish Steward has cut back the lower branches overhanging the road entrance and the Clerk has raised a request to Wiltshire Highways to tend the larger overhanging limbs. The tree work adjacent to the School Boundary has been scheduled for Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> November.

**Bike Racks:** A new bike rack has been installed between the Community Centre parking area and Tennis Courts. Two Bike Racks have been installed adjacent to the Play Area in the Lye Field. The remaining racks are due to be installed adjacent to the Telephone Box next to the Three Magpies Pub in Sells Green.

**Seend Cleeve Telephone Box:** The Parish Council was advised that Mr and Mrs Bond have cleaned and painted the telephone Box in Seend Cleeve. All the Parish Councillors expressed their appreciation of the work undertaken.

Parish Steward: The following work has been requested

- Overhanging Tree on SEEN49 Cut the lower limbs of the overhanging tree on this bridleway.
- Give Way Sign at the junction of Bollands Hill and Bell Cross Roads to be straightened and adjacent overgrowth trimmed.
- Litter pick of the hedge adjacent to Layby on A361 west of Seend Fork

**Annual Precept Meeting:** The Precept meeting has been rescheduled and will now take place on **Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> November** at 7pm in the Kennet Room at the Community Centre (Only members of the Precept committee are required to attend).

Community Land Trust Development Site – Seend Cleeve: The new development in Seend Cleeve will be called Hook Hollow in recognition of the people who provided the land. The landowner has given consent.

It was noted additional scaffolding will be deployed on site from 10<sup>th</sup> October. This scaffolding will be approximately 2 meters higher than the actual new building structure and will support a temporary cover to ensure the work area below is kept dry.

The CLT AGM will take place on 27<sup>th</sup> October in The Pavilion.

Finance: Bank Reconciliation to end of July 2022 - £34,908.68

#### **NURTURE NATURE NOVEMBER**

John Keats, 1795 – 1821, died in Rome of TB -



one of the great Romantic Poets, and many readers will be acquainted with his seasonal poem 'Ode to Autumn': 'Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness...' At this time of year the intricate and beautiful webs spun by countless spiders are wonders to behold, especially when glistening with dew drops like tiny jewels. Please try not to disturb them. If the light is good take photos of them and maybe use these as screensavers on your phones, if lucky with a spider on them. Please, also, if you are cleaning the house try not to vacuum them up. Spiders are an integral and necessary part of our environment. They will help to keep your windows and other areas clear of pests. We have no dangerous spiders in the British Isles. Another seasonal reminder for Guy Fawkes Day, 5<sup>th</sup> November – as well as remembering this historic event of 1605 please remember to check your bonfires before firing them for any hibernating hedgehogs. This treasured friend of gardeners is fast declining, year on year.

Due to man's destructive interference with nature down the ages there are countless declining species of all kinds. However the current dearth of birds in our gardens and green spaces is more to do with seasonal change. Birds 'decamp' from our gardens to gorge on the plentiful harvest in the countryside – seeds, fruits and late hatching insects. Once the weather gets colder and they days become shorter they will return to our bird tables and berried garden shrubs, holly ivy etc.

Many seasonal summer migrants have departed for warmer climes, but you might still catch a glimpse of the odd one or two, a wheatear, a swallow, a house martin maybe. One can follow the autumn migrations on the BTO's Bird Track website, and you can also put your own sightings on there. Now is the time to watch out for wintering migrants, such as redwings and fieldfares which fly to the British Isles from Iceland, Scandinavia, Finland and Russia to escape their colder climes. Redwings are particularly nomadic. Leave fallen fruit on your lawn or any part of your garden for

them. Should the weather be particularly severe in Scandinavia especially, you might be lucky enough to have the strikingly beautiful waxwings feasting on your rose hips.

Consider planting flowers to bloom for each month of the year, this month is particularly good for cyclamen. These little plants are adaptable and hardy and thrive in shady areas, around trees and in rockeries. They come in many shades of pinks, reds and purples with white too, and are often scented. During the winter months try to leave plants unpruned if possible, until springtime. The coming months are the right time to plant many trees, shrubs and bare root roses.

So, make a promise to Nature this Autumn and Winter, plant seasonal bulbs and flowering shrubs, build homes for hedgehogs, erect nest boxes, promise a future for your local wildlife as the Wildlife Organisations have asked us to, also increase natural food sources and conserve habitats, plus erect bird tables and feeders. Encourage children to make your garden a safe haven for wildlife. We must give nature a helping hand, make bug hotels, dig ponds, plant for bees, birds, bats and make your piece of the environment a safe space for wildlife. Go to it!

Wiltshire and Swindon



Every burglary victim knows the impact is deeper than simply having your possessions taken. Burglary violates a safe space and you expect the police to respond appropriately when you report it. Sadly, that expected police service when you are a home burglary victim has been severely lacking in recent years. This is consistent

across the UK - not just in here in Wiltshire. That is why I am pleased Wiltshire Police have now pledged to attend every home burglary. It's a leap in the right direction.

The force is already providing this in 88.7% of cases but this extra effort should help to increase victim satisfaction, preserve evidence sooner with increased prosecutions. Residents tell me they want police officers to do the basics right: good, quality investigations which result in locking the bad people up, protect the vulnerable and care about victims.

Wiltshire Police's home burglary further action taken figures, where a suspect is identified, charged or cautioned, is currently at 3.9% on a rolling 12 month average. This isn't good enough and I have been clear in letting our Chief Constable know this – and he agrees. By improving how officers deal with home burglary victims should not only increase those figures but also, and more importantly, will positively impact on the public's confidence and trust in the policing service they receive. I will be directly scrutinising this commitment and challenging them to show that effective, quality, investigations are taking place.

I have also asked senior officers to explore if it is operationally possible to extend this commitment to all non-dwelling burglaries, like rural outbuildings and sheds. As ever, this will be a delicate balance but aiming to provide the policing service our communities want is vital.

Wiltshire's fight against illegal hare coursing is being helped by new specialist equipment which makes it easier to spot criminals. The cruel bloodsport where bets

are placed on dogs to see which one will chase and catch a wild hare first, is usually streamed online to audiences of thousands across the world. Criminals gambling on the events have been shown to have links to activities such as major drugs operations and modern day slavery.

As part of these pursuits, violent threats are made towards landowners and tenants as well as damage costing thousands of pounds being caused to crops and property. Now, the team has been kitted up with thermal imaging drones and telescopes to make spotting them a lot easier.


