SEEND LYE FIELD & THE IRENE USHER PAVILION

Pavilion Upgrade Phase 1 of the £50K pavilion upgrade has almost been completed. The work carried out included a complete rewiring & overhaul of the pavilion's electrical system, new lighting, new (double glazed) windows and doors along the field side of the pavilion, decorating most of the internal areas as well as some structural work to the exterior of the pavilion and laying a new power cable from the pavilion to the Tack Shed.

The Seend Lye Field Committee would like to thank all of the wonderful Seend and Devizes volunteers who stepped up to help out with the digging of the trench for a new tack shed power cable and the internal redecoration of the Pavilion. Without such a supreme effort and fantastic support, it would have been difficult to ensure that this year Seend Fete would go ahead. Support from the community involved over 400 hours of voluntary work on the Pavilion project alone.

There is a planned Phase 2 project for a further £50K, which will include upgrading the heating, hot water systems and kitchen to make the building more useable and energy efficient going forward.

Seend Fete - 2022 A big thank you to all the volunteers who helped with the Seend Fete this year (including the Devon Devils Andy, Nick and Danny). Your help with collections prior to the fete, setting up the stalls, manning the stalls on the day and clearing up post fete, was just unbelievable. Over 30 breakfasts were provided to volunteers who helped set up on the Saturday morning. A mention also for Richard Walker who volunteered to organise this year's fete, when no one else was prepared to put their hand up. Without Richard coming forward, there would not have been a 2022 Seend Fete, so many thanks Richard.

Initial indications are the fete raised approx. £4K for the Lye Field and this money will go towards the pavilion improvements mentioned above.

Right of Way Dispute The dispute is still ongoing with our next hearing before the Judge on Nov 2nd. Following this hearing, I hope to be able to provide a more thorough update on where we stand and what happens next.

Future of the Lye Field As with so many other organisations within the village, the age profile of the Lye Field Committee is the wrong side of 65. All of the Last of the Summer Wine gang - the people who do so much maintenance work on the pavilion & playground area – are over 70 and some into their 80's.

We are a charity, responsible for the upkeep of the Lye Field and the Irene Usher pavilion. Headed by a group of Trustees but basically run by a committee consisting of a Chair, Secretary, Treasurer and a number of other committee members. After 8 years in the role, I have decided to stand down as Chair of the Lye Field along with Steve Vaux (as Secretary) at next year's AGM. This will leave a big gap that needs filling if the Charity is going to continue. Without a properly constituted committee, the charity cannot continue. This is a shout out to all villagers who want to see this valuable village facility continue and develop for the benefit of everyone (young and old) who live within the Seend Parish.

I realise that many parents with young children already have an incredible demand on their time. (Been there, had 3, got the T shirt) However, maybe there are some couples between 50 & 60, whose kids have gone off to university and are no longer working as unpaid taxi drivers, that would consider giving up 4 evenings a year for quarterly meetings and helping to keep the facility going?

A farewell missive from Adrian Burholt

Curates come and Curates go. And sadly that is what is happening to this curate (curate = trainee vicar). This edition of the Parish Magazine seems like a good opportunity then to reflect on the past two years before I bow out in October.

As civil rights activist Maya Angelou famously said **“People will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel.”**

Well, you made me feel welcomed and supported and you have shown me real patience as I found my way around various aspects of ‘the job’. For that I will always remember you and want to take the opportunity to say thank you.

Over the past two years we have lived through that pandemic that shall not be named and we’ve had more than our fair share of illness and loss across our team. In my first letter that I wrote when I started, I said that I was interested to see what the mystical source of all love (aka God) was up to in the area and seeing how I can join in. Well, there’s been loads of things! We have set up our new group ‘Quest’ that meets every Saturday at 5:15pm to discuss matters of life and faith in a safe, informal and fun setting. Find out more here <https://www.quest4faith.org> and Messy Church, for younger people, is going great guns. We had a crazy soaking wet Harvest Festival, enjoyed Easter around a firepit, have been doing a lot more with our schools and have hosted Bishops from South Africa and South Sudan. All things that I could not have predicted, yet they did and it all turned out to be a lot of fun.

The single most important thing I’ve learned over the past two years is that whether people come to church on a Sunday or not, whether someone says they have a faith or not, whether a person used to be religious and now doesn’t feel they are; that people are (in the main) kind, decent and caring towards one another. We only need to look to the community support schemes to see that in action. I personally can’t believe that this loving attitude towards others, including strangers, is the product of some random set of helium molecules lining up in an improbably lucky way (like 1 chance in 10 with 70 zeros after it). I remain convinced that there is a source to that love, a thing that I call God, or a divine fountain if you like, that keeps on pouring out love in the midst of situations where love is often most absent (our response to Ukrainian refugees is but one example). So, whatever your relationship with religion or faith (they are not the same things by the way), keep tapping into the source of love through quiet time, meditation or prayer and, until we meet again, keep on doing all the amazing good that you are doing!

NEWS FROM SEEND PARISH COUNCIL

RAGWORT – STILL A PROBLEM

Over the summer Ragwort has been spotted on land around Seend and unless controlled could become a problem for the village.

Ragwort is a native plant growing up to a maximum height of a metre with flat clusters of bright yellow daisy-like flowers in summer. There are other plants that look similar so careful identification is important. The flowers are followed by dandelion-like seed heads. These seeds can be dispersed by the wind over a wide area.

It's a problem as all parts of the plant are poisonous and are a hazard to grazing livestock. It is particularly a problem for cattle, horses, ponies and donkeys and if ingested is likely to lead to the death of the animal. It is a natural component of many types of unimproved grassland. However, it is necessary to prevent its spread where there is a high risk of poisoning livestock or near fields used for the production of animal feed.

For these reasons landowners are requested to be vigilant and remove plants from their land. **Please note that all parts of the plant are toxic and protective gloves must be worn when handling the plant.**

After much negotiation the first birds were brought over from Russia, with stock later coming from Spain. The success of this project owes much to the dedication and determination of like minded people over many years, together with a great deal of co-operation from local farmers in the area. Members were interested to learn that Cotswold Wildlife Park participates in the scheme by hatching Bustard eggs when required. Numbers of these amazing birds have been steadily rising and there are around 100 now living on the arable fields on the Plain. Looking ahead to our next meeting on October 12th October Chris Downham will once again test our knowledge in our Annual Quiz. It is open to everyone and promises, as always, to be a very enjoyable evening. Nibbles and cake will be provided but please bring your own drinks!.

SEEND PARISH COUNCIL

August PC meeting

Attendance - 10 Councillors: Apologies Pam Akerman, Cllr Tamara Reay

School Travel Plan It was noted that Cllr Reay still needs to meet with the school to finalise the School Travel Plan

Inmarsh High Friction Surface The new surface has been installed by Wiltshire Highways

Queens Jubilee Canopy The Clerk has finalised a list of 340 trees to be purchased and the application has been accepted by the Woodland Trust.

Police Matters The Parish Council has been advised that following the retirement of PCSO Janet Gould, it is unlikely that the Parish Council will receive a tailored police report for Seend. It was therefore agreed this item will be removed from future agendas and covered in 'Items of Note' when any relevant information comes to hand.

School Access The Parish council received 29 letters from Parishioners supporting the reopening of the school grounds. The Ramblers Path Team advised if a path has been used by the public, without interruption, for 20 years, a right of way could come into existence. However, this requires unhindered access 24hrs/day, 7 days/week. During term time the school grounds are closed to the public, hence this would count as an interruption so, the claim would most likely fail.

It was agreed the Parish Council would contact the White Horse Federation to try and convene meeting with the School's Director of Estates and Facilities, the School Governors, Friends of Seend School (FoSS), Church Authorities and interested Parishioners to see if a resolution could be found.

Rusty Lane The resurfacing of Rusty Lane has not commenced and the Clerk has been requested to contact Highways to establish the reason for the delay and when the village can expect the work to be undertaken.

Community Speed Watch Mr John Williams advised that two volunteers had completed their training and arrangements were being made for the remaining volunteers.

Bollands Hill Traffic Survey The Clerk has created a survey form and a date needs to be arranged. Highways have advised that it should take place over a 12-hour period from 7am – 7pm between Tuesday and Thursday during school term time.

The council approved this application subject to a new tree being planted, being in a conservation area.

PL/2022/05955 - 2 HIGH STREET, SEEND, MELKSHAM, SN12 6NR - T1 - Holly tree – fell

As the closing date for this application was before the Parish Council Meeting, this application was reviewed and approved by the Planning Sub Committee.

Dial Close - Tree Maintenance Wiltshire Highways dispute the trees that border the School Grounds are on land managed by them. To expedite a resolution, the Parish Council requested quotes for an assessment of the work required on the trees that border the school grounds.

It has been identified that the two trees on the east side of the entrance to Dial Close are within the area of land managed by Wiltshire Highways. Highways have accepted responsibility and the Parish Steward has been asked to carry out an assessment and associated works. If necessary, the Parish Steward will enlist support from the appropriate Highways support groups.

Sandridge Solar Community Benefit Payment Mr John Williams confirmed delivery of the new racks and is making arrangements for their installation at the Lye and The Three Magpies. The Clerk was asked to contact Highways to seek permission to install one of the cycle racks adjacent to the east bound bus (Devizes) bus stop in Sells Green.

Salt Spreader The Council viewed a second-hand salt spreader. However, it was in poor condition and not appropriate for the council's needs. It was agreed the Parish Council will continue to use the existing spreader for the coming season and review again next spring.

Allotment Rent Review The Parish Council agreed allotment rents would remain at the current rate until 30th September 2023.

The next allotment rent review will take place in September 2023. The Clerk will write to the Allotment Holders.

Parish Steward The Clerk to chase Highways again for cutting of hedges and verges in Row Lane and also ask the Parish Steward to see if some of the easier work could be undertaken on her next visit.

The Clerk to request the Parish Steward trim the hedges adjacent to Lock Cottage where the Tow Path emerges onto the bottom of Bollands Hill.

Defibrillator Update Each of our 3 village Defibrillators requires a software update that can only be undertaken by the Original Equipment Manufacturer (OEM). The OEM will loan the Parish Council temporary Defibrillators and undertake the software update at no charge. The Defibrillators are located in the Telephone Box adjacent to the Three Magpies Public House at Sells Green, The entrance to the Irene Usher Memorial Pavilion and in front of the Brewery Inn, Seend Cleeve.

A LIFETIME OF SERVICE AND DUTY

It could not have been more appropriate that the last public photograph of Queen Elizabeth II was taken two days before her death and was of her undertaking official duties. Indeed, she was performing perhaps her single most important duty: inviting a Prime Minister to form a government. Duty may be regarded as defining her reign. Outgoing and incoming Prime Ministers having to make round trips to Balmoral from Westminster in this second week of September 2022 was an indication both of continuity – Liz Truss is the Queen’s fifteenth premier; the first was Winston Churchill – and change: in 1974 she flew from Australia to be in Buckingham Palace in time to receive the Prime Minister.

That it was always known this moment would come, has done little to diminish its impact for many of us. Along with Wiltshire Council colleagues, officers, and members of the public, I attended the Wiltshire Proclamation on the steps of old County Hall in Trowbridge on Sunday 11 September, and I was struck by the historical significance of the occasion. Following a minute's silence HM Lord-Lieutenant of Wiltshire, Mrs Sarah Rose Troughton introduced the event by saying, “This is a unique occasion. We are witnessing part of the fabric of our history dating back to the Middle Ages, to a time when this form of communication was the only official way that people heard such news.” As I stood there my mind was taken on a kaleidoscopic journey through time, pre social media and 24-hour news, to the proclamations for Queen Elizabeth in 1952 and George VI in 1936, and earlier to the days when a stagecoach from London would have brought news of a new monarch to the people of Wiltshire.

Monarchs are accidental, are creations of circumstance, but some more than others. Initially she had no expectation of serving. One of the many remarkable aspects of the Queen’s reign is that it came about, only because in 1936 her uncle, Edward VIII, declined to make the sacrifices required by his station, and abdicated. George VI passed the spirit of service to his daughter, and I am sure that many of us will have reflected on the speech which the then Princess Elizabeth gave from Cape Town on her 21st birthday when she promised, “that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong”.

Nature Notes

Nurture Nature



In December 2020 our new King, Charles III, then the Prince of Wales, stated ‘Humans should remember they are part of Nature, and stop exploiting it, to avert environmental and climate catastrophe’. Our King was well influenced by his father, the late Duke of Edinburgh, who was a well renowned conservationist world-wide, and he said, before he died aged 99 last year, that in his life time the world’s population had tripled in size (in round terms from 3 billion to 9 billion people). An enormous increase over a relatively short period, in the life of the planet, that is. Rachel Carson, in her 1962 book ‘Silent Spring’, has been credited with starting the global environmental movement.

Nature is in crisis worldwide - but we can be lifelines for species on the brink of extinction. An example of this is the Fatu Hiva Monarch, a large black flycatcher resident on a tiny French Polynesian island in the Pacific. Just eighteen birds remain, and only four are females. Only forty years ago this bird was abundant in the island’s native forests. But in the 1990s the population plummeted due to man’s intrusions, with the introduction of black rats – often diseased – and cats – which went feral. The SOP (Save Our Planet) Manu (‘Birdlife’ in French Polynesia) has saved this superb species from extinction by controlling the predator rats and cats and protecting nests.

Current books on the environment are Annie Proulx’s ‘Fen, Bog and Swamp’, a stimulating book about the importance of such areas for carbon sequestering peat land - and its destruction worldwide. So, we must stop draining the bogs! Some good news from our East Anglia fens is that restoration and flooding projects have heralded the wild trumpeting of cranes again, birds that are symbols of regeneration and peace. However, spare a thought for the wildlife of Ukraine, where Putin’s war crimes of bombing and shelling of civilian areas and infrastructure are wreaking untold damage and destruction to wildlife. Finally, closer to home, we can improve our own environment by making space for wild life and understanding the value of green spaces, not only in rural areas but in urban spaces too. We can all play our part by helping to conserve our own spaces and areas. With Autumn approaching many feel it is time to cut hedges, lop trees, trim shrubs and generally remove what we consider to be untidy foliage. Before embarking on your big seasonal tidy up, try sitting outside on warm evenings just before dusk, and note where your garden birds are flying into their roosts. Try to leave plenty of foliage and berry bearing limbs for winter food, as the sustenance and shelter thus provided give vital protection against both inclement weather and predators. And a reminder to get that pond dug this year, which you’ve been meaning to get around to for years! You’ll be staggered by the increase of wild life you’ve never had before, if you do!

Lastly, as I write this on a lovely early sunny morn with the bees gathering nectar from the flowers of our *Abelia grandiflora*, why not consider planting such a shrub, or a winter flowering honeysuckle too - in memory of her late Majesty? Note that only single, or bell shaped flowers allow bees access to their nectar, not double ones.

I've now been 'in the job' of PCC for a year, and if there is one thing that's been made abundantly clear to me, it's that your confidence in policing is not where I want it to be.

Whilst there are clearly some exceptional individual officers, overall, there have been gaps in the service you receive. In the past year, I have made practical steps to address them, such as the purchasing of effective technology such as drones and ensuring more officers are deployed to the rural crime team. The damage done by crimes such as hare coursing, criminal damage and theft have a massive impact on the rural community and history shows that at times of recession, farms become targets.

I regularly speak to farmers and I'm all too aware of the reasons why you feel that reporting crime is not worthwhile. In my Police and Crime Plan, I've committed to ensure Wiltshire Police takes these crimes seriously and deals with them effectively. This is why I've taken steps to ensure the rural crime team has the capabilities and staffing it needs.

As part of this commitment, Wiltshire Police has introduced online crime reporting specifically for rural crime. The form takes about ten minutes and is picked up by the same people who answer 101 calls.

It's vital that to build up an overall picture and identify patterns of criminal activity, all crime is reported, no matter how small it may seem.

As this has only recently been introduced, I welcome your feedback about how the system is working. It's only through working together that we can stop these crimes from happening and make Wiltshire a safer place to live and work.
