For those of us that use the Seend Telephone Exchange for the internet then Open-Reach are promoting an offer to move the Seend Exchange to Ultrafast Full Fibre. Each property and business are offered a voucher to support this scheme up to the value of £4,500 – this voucher is made available via the UK Government Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme.

The project has so far reached 5% of the required target. For the project to be undertaken a 100% funding pledge must be achieved.

Openreach identified Seend exchange as being a strong contender for Full Fibre and is urging local people to take the next step by applying for and pooling together free Government Gigabit Vouchers to help fund the build. The project needs 165 homes and businesses to sign up.

Using the vouchers — which don't cost residents anything, enables Openreach to work with local communities to build a customised, co-funded network. The vouchers can be combined to extend the ultrafast, ultra-reliable network to premises in outlying rural areas which won't be covered by private investment. Dear Autoglym,

Having been presented with one of your company's complete product kits when I purchased my Honda Jazz a couple of years ago, I have to admit it was still pristine, unused and intact – until today.

Our village has a community minibus and each group that uses it takes it in turns to clean it once a month. This month was the turn of the Seend Theatre Club and as a member I volunteered along with some others to clean the Mercedes minibus – inside and out! I decided to unearth my Autoglym kit from the recesses of the cupboard under the stairs and take with me, not thinking it would serve much purpose as all the little bottles looked a bit lightweight to deal with a rufty-tufty minibus! Well, first someone said "has anyone brought any shampoo with them?" I looked in the case of Autoglym goodies and announced that I'd got something called Bodywork Shampoo Conditioner, a few titters went round the group! So a couple of capfuls was added to everyone's buckets and they began to brush down the 'bus from the roof downwards. The roof hadn't been cleaned for some time, it was filthy, bird poo and tree sap and all sorts! As the father sat on a bench and the children played on their bikes, I discovered they had recently moved to Melksham from Egypt, having first fled their home in Damascus, Syria.

Recognising and speaking a few words of Arabic myself, we managed to understand each other a little as the boys helped translate for their father, seeming to have picked up English a lot faster. Finding some common ground between us, we exchanged phone numbers and the rest is history!

Over the past few months we have visited each other's homes and shared food together as well as sharing in our different faith journeys together.

Our friendship began in Lent, for me as a Christian, moved into Ramadan, for them as Muslims, through into Holy Week and Easter and on into Eid. From sharing the breaking of the fast at sunset through Ramadan to enjoying the gift of Easter eggs, we have enjoyed friendship and fun together as well as sharing in our sadness's.

As the old African proverb goes, 'Eat and drink together: talk and laugh together: enjoy life together: but never call it friendship until you have wept together'.

Yesterday, we shared a car journey together as, stepping out of my comfort zone, I drove (in torrential rain!) to Easton in Bristol to shop, so my friend could bulk buy all the familiar foods from home to continue cooking traditional meals for her lovely family.

Sometimes life can take you by surprise, in a good way. Finding common ground, can lead to lasting friendships, if we are willing to move out of the familiar and step out of our comfort zones.

Talking of stepping out, do join us in our **Walks around Wellsprings**, fortnightly in August and September, with one also at the beginning of October (see flyer in magazine) It would be lovely to see you.





There were no declarations of Interest in Agenda Item.

- 3: To Receive a report from Tamara Reay
 - Potholes continue to be a focus for Wiltshire Council resources. If people see a
 pothole on Wiltshire's roads, they should report it using the MyWilts reporting
 system either through the MyWilts smartphone app for Apple or Android
 devices or online at www.wiltshire.gov.uk/mywilts
 - This week there was webinar on the strategy and policy used for fixing potholes by Wiltshire council it can be found here: <u>Pothole webinar YouTube</u>.
 - Police update: there has been an increase in antisocial behavior in Devizes recently additional police are present to help manage this.
 - The Non-emergency police number 101 is experiencing some call delays due to recruitment issues. The police request that reports are made online where possible. Devizes police station number is <u>0845 408 7000</u>.
 - Wiltshire Council now collects small rechargeable electricals. These items should be presented in a supermarket carrier bag by the side of your blue-lidded recycling bin, or blue recycling sack. Individual items should be no larger than a shoe box (so around 30cm x 20 cm or 12" x 8")

10: Recreational Ground:

- Carla attended the Devizes Area Board this week and successfully attained a grant for £3k for Rec Ground improvement works. Plans are to use this towards the replacement of some of the equipment being removed like the swing and trim trail.
- Work on the Rec Ground starts on the 26th of June 2023 THE REC GROUND WILL BE CLOSED FOR THE DURATION OF THE WORKS. This work will involve the removal of the swing and the trim trail. This equipment has not passed the safety tests for some time and needs to be removed for the children's safety. The new path and pergola will significantly improve access to the Rec Ground for all.
- Councillors recognize that the swing is a big draw to the park replacement options are being investigated.
- Once the Rec Area is more accessible for all residents, a new gate will be re quired costs for this are around £500.
- A community tidy up event in the rec after the works are completed was discussed.
- Councillors have previously discussed the name: The Bulkington William Breach Playing Field and agreed that the term Recreation Ground can unofficially be used as it opens up the use of the field to all villagers, rather than just those with young children. The planned works for June will further more make this area accessible to all villagers, and an even more valuable asset to the village than it already was.
- 11: Parish Steward: Outstanding jobs to be sent to The Clerk prior to next visit. The Clerk reported that she has not heard back from the Parish Steward regarding his next or last visit.
- A parishioner has reported that the bin at the bottom of Mill lane has not been emptied for quite some time. This has been chased and will be escalated due to lack of replies from Ide Verde.

12: War Memorial request:

- The Parish Council team have been contacted by Mr Rob Gaisford about the Bulkington war memorial since December 2022. Despite the Gaisford family paying for the plaque and the engraved War Memorial in 1920; the names and the rank of R S GIASFORD has been incorrect since installation. Mr Rob Gaisford expects the current precept paying residents to correct the error made in 1920. The War Memorial obtained Grade II listing status is 1968 which prevents unplanned, unauthorised work to be carried out.
- It is Bulkington Parish Council's duty to maintain the monument itself to the Grade II listing's requirements but Bulkington Parish Council does not have a duty or responsibility for the correction of, or omission of, any names or ranks. Therefore the below proposal and any counter proposals will be democratically motioned.
- Former Councillor Powell Proposal: Bulkington Parish Council shall, in the event of the War Memorial requiring such significant restoration work that the engraved plaque requires removing, obtain additional quotes for the costs to replace the existing plaque with a new one with the rank Captain R S Gaisford, rather than replacing the current Grade II listed one. This will be in addition to the mandatory costs to the precept paying residents. The War Memorial Trust have previously confirmed that they will not financially contribute to the change of rank and fundraising for someone who has never lived in Bulkington by local residents will be challenging, therefore it will need to be an additional cost to the precept paying residents in the year the work takes place.
- Councillor Grabham Counter Proposal: Bulkington Parish Council will conduct a democratic vote in the year preceding any significant works to the War Memorial on the increase required in the precept to cover the costs of the correction to the rank of R S GAISFORD, if the democratic vote concludes that the precept will not be increased to cover the additional costs, the family insisting on the correction must fund the works or the original plaque will be reinstated.
- Councillors voted all in favor of Councillor Grabham's Counter Proposal including 2 members of the public.

Wiltshire and Swindon As Wiltshire's Police and Crime Commissioner, I have welcomed some significant changes made by new Chief Constable Catherine Roper in her first four months but I do have to caution more time is needed for sustained performance improvements across all areas.

Some of the measures introduced include:

Greater police visibility – increased community patrols and focus on bringing policing to rural communities with additional mobile police stations.

Increased policing – proactive, intensified policing in communities where necessary and use of all available powers.

Focus on service — ensuring staff are moving from a back-to-basics approach and evolving to drive improvement in the service received by residents.

Putting victims first and at the heart of every police interaction.

Focus on performance – driving slimmed down governance, introducing key roles back into the policing structure, giving greater control to commanders, driving up standards.

Opening Wiltshire Police up to enable more recruitment by dismissing need for mandatory police officer degrees.

Recruiting an experienced chief officer was a conscious decision on my part to drive the improvements Wiltshire Police needed to navigate its way through the Engage process but also so it can deliver the police service residents want – and deserve.

Despite only being in post for nearly four month, CC Roper's vision for Wiltshire Police is coming to fruition.

There has been a defined focus on quality of service, on driving performance, an increased focus on victims and quality of investigations to boost outcome rates. We have seen a determined effort by the Chief to encourage leaders within the Force to take control and drive up standards and for our communities to receive more visible, proactive policing.

Of course, we are both aware the scale of work required cannot be resolved in a short amount of time. There isn't a quick fix to sustained performance improvements across all areas and time is needed. The Chief and I are also acutely aware there will be challenges ahead for some time yet but the important point is: the right steps are being taken.

However, and more importantly, I have always known Wiltshire has many dedicated and hardworking officers, staff and volunteers and now they will be able to focus on what they want – delivering a quality, frontline, policing service which delivers for its communities.

NEWS FROM WILTSHIRE COUNCIL

Help shape the future of Wiltshire

Wiltshire Council is considering the review of the Wiltshire Local Plan. The draft Plan sets out the vision and framework for housing, infrastructure and land for employment growth for the next 15 years. Once adopted, all planning applications will be determined against the Plan, making it the most important place-shaping document for Wiltshire.

It also identifies sites for housing and employment development until 2038. There is good news in that following further work to assess the number of homes needed, the number of planned homes in the Plan has been significantly reduced from its last iteration by almost 9000. When the Plan was consulted on in 2021, it proposed 45,630 homes over 20 years to 2036, but the updated Plan proposes 36,740 homes, of which over 21,900 homes have already been built or are committed.

A number of important policies are included in the draft plan:

40% of all new housing on developments of 10 homes or more to be affordable.

Greater flexibility for rural exception sites to make it easier to provide affordable housing in villages where there is clearly identified demand.

New developments will have to meet zero carbon standards, including energy generation such as solar panels.

20% biodiversity net gain for all new developments, compared to the 10% legal requirement.

All new developments must also have cycling and walking connections.

Most of the housing development is planned to be in the major urban centres in the county, with Devizes needing to plan for only an additional 40 homes, when existing completions and commitments are taken into account. Potterne, Seend and Worton are considered to be large villages in the housing plan and some development will ensure that these communities can continue to thrive and meet local housing needs.

This Local Plan is about providing for a choice of high-quality designed housing, including affordable homes, in the most sustainable locations; maximising development on brown field sites; supporting town centres; and providing high quality new public open spaces.

Keevil School welcomes surprising new staff member, Mr Moose

Children at Keevil Primary School couldn't believe their luck when they met their latest teaching assistant this month. A huge, hairy dog named Mr Moose.

The school has recruited the help of Mr Moose, a registered therapy dog who is trained to quietly listen to the schoolchildren read.

Mr Moose, a gigantic Irish Wolf-Hound, has been helping the children overcome any nervousness when reading aloud by visiting each classroom and patiently listening to pupils read their story books.

Early research suggests that listening dogs can help improve reading performance in children, and Keevil head teacher Lindsey Hermon says their initial observations reflect those conclusions.

"It's clear to see that the children read more confidently to Mr Moose. Pupils not only love reading to him, they appear to put aside any shyness or self-consciousness that may be holding back their reading performance."

"It is amazing to see not only their enthusiasm, but also the focus the children possess when reading to Mr Moose."

Mr Moose, and his volunteer owner Emily, were organised via Therapy Dogs Nationwide (<u>TDN.ORG.UK</u>), a registered charity that specialises in assessing and training would-be therapy dogs, and matching them up with suitable placements. Therapy dogs and their owners also make visits to local hospitals, hospices, care homes, and other establishments.

This week Keevil School was thrilled to receive a set of outstanding Sats results for 2023, and Mrs Hermon believes their innovative approach to developing 'the whole child' has really helped the children thrive.

"Together with other teaching initiatives, we expect Mr Moose to strengthen the children's learning achievements even further this year. It's tremendous seeing the children thriving and becoming more confident. However, it's fair to say that we also simply love having Mr Moose at the school and seeing the pure delight on the children's faces".

NURTURE NATURE

Peregrines are the fastest birds on the planet when they perform their incredible diving 'stoops', 198 mph according to the BTO website. But another bird, the swift,



is the speediest bird in level flight. Peregrines use urban environment as the high buildings attract them being the modern equivalent for clifftop sites, with safe nesting situations and plentiful prey. (See Salisbury Cathedral website for camera viewing.) Now is a good time to watch their young honing their hunting skills. So if you have peregrines nesting nearby do remember to listen and look out for the falcon fledglings. Earlier editions of these articles give similar information about speeds for swifts.

Probably due to poor nesting conditions because of inclement weather earlier in the year some garden birds are having late broods. There is a shortage of food for nestlings as the insect hatchings were also adversely affected by the weather. Providing live mealworms (from local pet shops) will help fledglings to survive. There is an interesting discussion about the world shortage of insects and loss of habitats currently on Al Jazeera TV (Channel 235). Hedgehog hoglets born in May and June can now be seen in some gardens at dusk and they, too, also enjoy a snack of live mealworms as a supplement to their diet of slugs, snails and fallen fruit. Please try to leave them wild spaces and plenty of cover such as fallen leaves, dry grasses and straw (available from pet shops) for them to domesticate. One neighbour who hadn't seen a hedgehog in her garden for at least five years now has three hoglets which visit in the gloaming for their supper of live mealworms, after which they set off in different directions to forage. They are the gardeners' best friends as they will keep your veg patches clear of slugs and snails and other pests, so they deserve nurturing. Autumn is not too far away and one thinks of the wonderful sight of starling murmurations. An eminent physicist, Giorgio Parisi, (Nobel 2021 Prize winner) has called his recently published book 'In a Flight of Starlings', he writes "Ideas are often like murmurations – they start moving in one direction and end up in another", thus great discoveries are often passed by to be discovered later by others. The book's title is based on the physicist's work in trying to compute the starlings' flight patterns where each bird is aware of its neighbours' movements and the comparisons have helped to increase his own wisdom as applied to Physics.
