

#### **MONTHLY PARISH MEETING – DRAFT Minutes**

# Council Councillors met for the Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday the 18<sup>th</sup> of October 2023 at 7.30pm at the Bulkington Village Hall Present: Philip Oakey (Chair), Alison Howard Evans, Julie Anderson-Hill, Andrew Grabham, Carla Haslam, Tamara Reay 2 members of the village: Tim Taylor and Steve Kerslake

**1** Apologies for absence: Alex Breach

#### 2 To Record:

No changes to the Register of Interests were made

No interest in Agenda Items was declared

#### **3** Tamara Reay welcomed questions from the public:

- A member of the village raised that there have been an increase in power cuts recently and asked Tamara to investigate
- Councillors questioned the lack of mention of self builds in the Local plan. The Consultation is on till 22<sup>nd</sup> of November
- Devizes Gateway councillors raised that Devizes Gateway is not on the map as a potential station. \*Tamara has since checked and Devizes Gateway is included in Policy 75\*.
- Tim Taylor reported that he has been pursuing pub signage for 9 months to get brown road signs installed in 3 locations, with no progress. (Worton road sign facing each way, top of Seend Hill and the strand on the Bulkington junction) Tim agreed to send Tamara the latest correspondence so Tamara can see if she can help.

Councillors and villagers questioned what portion of the contract for Stewards is covered by Wiltshire council costs and raised their concerns over the wrapping of Stewards vehicles from white to yellow for just 12 months.

4 Local Police Report: Latest report not published yet

5 Open Forum: Tim Taylor raised that the Defib was used at the weekend and the batteries are low, with pads needing replacement. Philip agreed to investigate the following day and arrange replacements where necessary and ensure the Defib is ready for safe use should it be needed.

Villagers questioned timings for a swing and the spend of funds raised for the Rec Ground before the last Rec Committee was dissolved .

- Proposals for a new swing: 3 quotes between £4700 and £6000 plus vat have been received. Steve Kerslake kindly offered to donate £1000 towards a new swing on the proviso that the order is placed before the end of 2023.

Pathway – The Oakblokes will be returning to re-compact the gravel pathway.

Grass Cutting: Grass is cut it every 2 to 3 weeks and is strimmed every time. Work dates will be included in Invoices.

The Rec Committee have been pushing on with the Tree proposal – visuals expected:

**11 Parish Steward:** Outstanding jobs to be sent to The Clerk prior to next visit. The last scheduled visit took place on the 9<sup>th</sup> of October.

**12 Recruitment:** Our Clerk Hannah has handed in her notice and will be leaving us at the end of the year. We are looking to fill this position, please get in touch if you would like more information. We are also recruiting for one Councillor to join the team, if you would like to put yourself forward, please email our Clerk.

**13 Tree Planting:** In our July meeting, Eden Speller presented some proposals from the Woodland Creation Funding. Discussion and next steps on the below proposals: Acquisition/lease of WC land in Mill Lane (that was earmarked for development) Planting of verge/hedgerow trees to create a 'gateway avenue' into the village Planting of 'parkland trees' in the Rec (can be incorporated in hedge-line and appro-

priate locations in field so not to reduce/impact upon the amenity)

Councillors agreed the need for village support and buy in before planning goes ahead with most of these options. Carla will be leading the "Parkland Trees" option.

## 14 Emergency Team updates:

The Salt bin and other winter supplies need checking before going into Winter. **15 War Memorial and Remembrance day**: Andrew to lay wreath as PC Vice Chair.

**Fence posts:** 3 of the fence posts surrounding the war memorial have rotted and can no longer stand strong or straight. Quotes have been obtained and specialists consulted for the repair or replacement. The posts are octagonal and have been soaked in creosote, a type of wood preservative that can cause some severe skin reactions in humans. They have also been installed upside down, with a sharp tip pointing upwards which would now be regarded less safe than a flat or rounded tip. Creosote is a restricted use pesticide that can only be used in outdoor settings where it does not come in contact with the general public. As the War Memorial is in a public space, where people touch the poles and school children wait for the bus opposite, councillors decided against replacing the poles with like for like replacement.

Quotes for the replacement of 3 posts (leaving them mismatched) and quotes for the replacement for all posts were compared and all councillors present concluded unanimously that it was more cost effective to replace all at once and know that the space is safe, matching and smart ahead of Remembrance Day.

## 16 AOB:

The Bulkington.org.uk website domain name registration has been updated There has been a hold up on the drop curbs that were planned for August 23 - the curbs cover a BT access point so contact has being made with BT to work on a solution.

Newsletter: Julie volunteered to draft the latest edition of the Newsletter, councillors discussed possible topics: Parish Steward, tree planting opportunity and a plea to not play with the rocks on the pathway.

Tim kindly volunteered to print village notifications for events etc. and deliver them alongside Spotlight. Spotlight gets delivered at the end of each month.

Next meeting: 15<sup>th</sup> November 2023 at 7.30pm

December meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> December to be brought forward to 13<sup>th</sup> to avoid pre-Christmas rush.

#### **Local Council Matters**

Cllr Reay provided the following update:

**Bad Weather/Storm Advice** Parishioners are asked to report any issues regarding blocked gulleys on MyWilts app.

**Wiltshire's Local Plan** The consultation ends on 22 November. A meeting has been arranged on 14 November at 7pm in West Lavington Hall to discuss this. Two Seend councillors will attend. Seend Parish should be treated as whole to include its settlements.

The Wiltshire Local Plan, Rural Housing Requirements 2023 paper has been published explaining the process of distributing the Local Plan's Housing Market Area rural housing requirements to local Service Centre and Large Villages in order to inform Local Plan policies and support neighbourhood planning in Wiltshire.

**Older and Vulnerable Adult Grants** There is grant funding available for projects which support Older and Vulnerable Adults ie. lunch clubs, community transport, memory cafes.

**Community Governance Review** The Electoral Review Committee will meet publicly on 13 December to consider each Review area. For Seend, there is an anomaly involving one property on the A365. Representations can be emailed to CGR@wiltshire.gov.uk. To be discussed at November meeting.

Matters Arising After The Lye Field meeting in November, the Parish Council will

be informed when payment is required for the mower.

**Items for Discussion** There is a Volunteer Tree Warden Scheme. Parish Council will look into this and report back at the November meeting.

# Local Highways & Footpath Infrastructure Group (LHFIG)

**The Bell Crossroads / Bollands Hill** Tamara Reay will arrange a meeting with Wiltshire Highways and Parish Council to review the junction layout and traffic management on Bollands Hill.

At present, police only log accidents which involve injury but it would be appreciated if all accidents could be reported to the Clerk so that a full record is maintained.

**Bradley Lane & Rusty Lane** The wooden posts at the top of Bell Hill have been knocked down. This has been reported.

Tamara Reay reported that a Highways Matters event is scheduled for 26 February 2024, the next Devizes Area Board. A representative from Parish Council will attend.

There is a new Rights of Way officer. Tamara Reay will ensure the works required are one of his priorities. Clerk will contact him to discuss the scale of the proposed work with potential timeframe.

**Speed Watch** Lack of communication and adequate support from the Community Speed Watch team of the Wiltshire police organisation is frustrating the start of the village Speed Watch scheme. Tamara Reay has raised this concern.

**Neighbourhood Plan** The Neighbourhood Plan needs to be updated. Councillors will consider how best to take this forward.

**Planning Applications** The Parish Council raised no objections to the following applications:

- PL/2023/07540 Cleeve House, Trowbridge Road install a ground mounted solar PV/T panel system (50x panels).
- PL/2023/08358 1 Dial Close, Seend Beech Tree fell, grind and replant silver maple, crown lift to 5.2m over the road.

The Parish Council, with the exception of one Councillor, approved the following application with a Condition that screening should be provided to make it less visible from the road:

PL/2023/08407 – Great Thornham Lodge, Trowbridge Road – Proposed general purpose agricultural building for hay, feed and machinery storage.

**Devizes Area Board** The next Area Board meeting is 20 November at 6.30pm. A Highways Matters event at the following Area Board on 26th February 2024. **Items of Correspondence** 

**Church Wall** The Minutes of the last meeting were amended to read that 'legal ownership' of the wall needs resolving before the Parish Council (not Church) contributes towards the rebuild. Clerk has also placed this amendment on Village FB. **Local Rights of Way** Further correspondence has been received regarding the use of the footpaths on private land. Landowners must not block public footpaths. If landowners wish to offer additional public access across their land they can do so but this additional access cannot replace/change the formal right of way. If a landowner wants to change the location/route of a right of way they must contact Wiltshire Council's Rights of Way team, any cost incurred is the responsibility of the landowner.

**Councillor Vacancies** A member of the public attended the meeting with a view to applying to become a Councillor. She was asked to send in her cv/resume and will be invited to a forthcoming meeting.

Finance Bank Reconciliation to end of September 2023, circulated to Councillors, came to: £47,539.84.

**Items of Note** Tamara Reay reported that she is now attending Marston Parish Council meetings. They meet bi-monthly (odd months) so she will aim to join Seend Parish Council on even months but attend both on odd months.

The Spout Lane disabled parking space is being abused and should only be used by disabled drivers. Inconsiderate parking in Spout Lane is also making it difficult for emergency vehicles to access.

The hedges on Bollands Hill, mainly near Wessex Water site, still need to be cut back. All parishioners are asked to cut back their shrubs/hedging for pedestrians' safety.

The post at the top of Inmarsh Lane has been replaced but the sign is still to be positioned.

Wiltshire and Swindon An organisation which provides safe spaces and practical support for young people through tailored mentoring programmes has received a community fund award from the Police and Crime Commissioner.

The Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner (OPCC) is helping to fund groups which engage young people in diversionary activities as a way of tackling anti-social behaviour, exploitation, and serious violence - directly delivering priorities two and three of the Police and Crime Plan.

This week, Police and Crime Commissioner Philip Wilkinson visited a youth club session supported by SMASH after the group was recently awarded funding through the PCC's Community Action Fund, as well as receiving a grant of £497,000 after a successful bid from the OPCC to the latest round of the Home Office's Safer Streets Fund.

The organisation runs several strands of mentoring programmes to build resilience, motivation, and self-confidence, develop skills to enter into education, training, or employment, and promote wellbeing in a holistic space.

SMASH will now use the extra funding to contribute towards a new detached youth work project that will take their mentoring expertise onto the streets.

Mr Wilkinson said: "Groups like SMASH that provide support, guidance, and activities for the young people of Wiltshire play a crucial role in developing well rounded, respectful, young members of society – which in turn reduces crime and creates safer spaces for all.

"Unfortunately, we know there is a link between more deprived areas and crime levels, so detached youth projects like this are great for focusing on the areas that need it most.

"My office will continue to invest in these, and other similar services to show our commitment to supporting young people and creating opportunities for them to thrive in their communities."

SMASH's new detached youth work project will run alongside their existing mentoring service and youth club sessions.

Amy Cox, Detached Youth Work Mentor at SMASH said: "We are incredibly excited to be able to continue our street based mentoring project, as we will be able to meet young people in their own settings, on their turf.

"We have spent the last couple of months writing policies and procedures and in meetings with the police, local youth activity providers, children's services and Youth Justice to create a suitable offer for young people focusing on the right areas and with the right information and support.

"Through meeting young people on the streets, we are creating safe activities and giving them safe adults to engage with, build relationships with, as well as offer help, support and signposting."

#### **NURTURE NATURE**

With the recently named storms making headlines and the connection with changing climate patterns reminding one of looking back to other eras, e.g. the Ice Ages of the Pleistocene eras, a long time passing (2.58 million years to 11,700 years ago) with repeated periods of glaciations! In the last Ice Age Dogger Bank in the North Sea connected the British Isles to



mainland Europe – one could walk from the East Coast of the British Isles to Scandinavia. The coming of the Ice Age wiped out the dinosaurs of the Jurassic Period, the point being that the earth and the world as we know it could be changing into another 'Age'.

Loss of coastal areas is not new, e.g. in the thirteenth century Dunwich on the East Coast was lost to the sea in 1286 in a massive storm. Again, along the East coast an enormous storm surge with strong winds and high tides overnight, the North Sea rose by 5 metres and the death toll was 326. Many readers will remember that night of 31<sup>st</sup> January 1953. In the Netherlands the death toll was 2551, and 30,000 animals were drowned. One hopes that readers will not be alarmed by the above, but it is a fact of life on this planet that big changes do periodically take place. Maybe changes are now taking place accelerated by environmental factors worldwide, such changes, of course, have a knock-on effect for nature.

At a time of Remembrance in November one recalls Marlene Dietrich singing 'where have all the young men gone?' a song popular with both sides in WWII. One could extend the comparison to 'where have all the songbirds gone?'. Certainly garden birds have all but disappeared in many people's gardens. For the first time in living memory some readers have reported that there are no resident blackbirds. In a recent David Attenborough TV programme he said that over the last sixty years the British Isles has lost 38 million birds. On Countryfile the current series has so far been interesting and informative, scientists have reported that our seasons have changed in length by three weeks, spring especially coming earlier. It is noticeable this autumn that leaves have stayed on deciduous trees for longer. Many spring and summer bird migrant numbers are down, some collapsed like the nightingales, a 90% loss in the last fifty years, there are no more returning to Hampstead Heath (and Berkeley Square?!) and their traditional nesting sites on Salisbury Plain for instance – conservationists now believe that invasive muntjac deer eating the scrub have contributed to their demise.

If readers wish to hear a nightingale listen to Beatrice Harrison and her cello duet with a nightingale recorded in 1924, a beautiful duet available on the internet and old 78 records. Knapp in Kent is an excellent place to hear nightingales, it's an area of former agricultural land which has been allowed to revert to scrub natu-

rally. Hopefully we shall see and hear our winter migrants from Scandinavia – field-fares, redwings, thrushes including blackbirds – yes, some do migrate – and if one is lucky in a severe winter, waxwings too.

Happy Christmas to all our readers, and please remember to give our Christmas bird, the robin redbreast, a special treat.

## WASSAIL

The word "wassail" is derived from Anglo-Saxon "wes Hal" or "be of good health". To wassail someone was to drink their health and prosperity. Often a wassail bowl was passed round with toasts and singing. People would sometimes carry the bowl from house to house singing to the health of the inmates.

In fruit growing districts it was common to wassail orchards to protect the trees from evil and to ensure a plentiful crop in the new year.

Celebrated traditionally on Old Twelfth Nights Eve, Ceremonies were performed which included singing, pouring cider on tree roots, placing cider soaked cake or toast in the branches, firing shotguns into the top branches and banging tin trays. The latter to drive away evil spirits and to arouse the sleeping trees.

Old apple tree we wassail thee and hope that thou will bear That we may have apples and cider for next year. Hat-fulls, cap-fulls Three bushel bag-fulls, and little heaps under the stair. Hip-hip, hurrah


Helping hands are needed on the tills and behind the scenes, sorting donations in many of the charity's shops, including Chippenham, Devizes, Salisbury, and Warminster.
