#### NEWS FROM SEEND PARISH COUNCIL

**CPRE Best Kept Village Competition:** Seend is taking part in the annual **Best Kept Village Competition.** Judging will take place between 15<sup>th</sup> May and 13<sup>th</sup> June. Previously we've been marked down for having 'out of date' posters on our notice board and litter on along some of our pavements. Please could you help where you can to keep our village looking at its best over the coming weeks. Our thanks go to Councillor John Williams who will be overseeing our entry as he has done in previous years. **Bradley Lane - Potential Upgrade:** As part of a wider strategy by Wiltshire Council to improve its footpaths and byways, your Parish Council is considering upgrading the surface of Bradley Lane for the benefit of pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders. The plan is to improve the surface so that its more accessible for everyone and build on the work undertaken in Rusty Lane that will when finished provide a robust connection to the Canal Towpath and Route 4 of the National Cycle Network. Coupled with the closure of the School Grounds to Public Access, Bradley Lane would provide residents with an alternative route via the 'Pinch-Point' in the High Street. The Parish would welcome your comments, thoughts and views regarding the proposed work. **Ragwort:** Once again Ragwort has been seen on land around the village and all land owners are requested to be vigilant. Ragwort is a native plant growing up to a maximum height of a metre with flat clusters of bright yellow daisy-like flowers in summer. There are other plants that look similar so careful identification is important. The flowers are followed by dandelion-like seed heads.

All parts of the plant are poisonous and are a hazard to grazing livestock. Stock do not generally eat the plant in its green state but consume it when dried in feed. The effect is likely to lead to the death of the animal. It is particularly a problem for cattle, horses, ponies and donkeys. However, Ragwort is also very important for wildlife in the UK. It is a major source of nectar for many insects. In many situations ragwort poses no threat to horses and other livestock. It is a natural component of many types of unimproved grassland.

#### **Reporting Ragwort**

Land not controlled by Wiltshire Council: If you are concerned about ragwort adversely affecting your land you should contact the landowner/occupier of the land with the ragwort. If they fail to take action in line with the Government's Code of Practice then you should follow the Government's advice.

## NB Wiltshire Council has no responsibility for the control of ragwort other than on land that it manages.

#### **CHURCH NEWS**

#### Maureen's Ramblings.....

What has the Church of England ever done for me? asked "The Telegraph" a while back. Of course, the church has its struggles and there is a decrease in people seeking God through organised religion. But in the 2021 Census "Christian" remained the most common response to the religion question. 85% of people apparently visit a



church each year - to see beautiful, historic buildings, to worship or to mark a significant event in their lives. When a child goes missing, or floods destroy, it is often the parish church that provides a rallying point. In 2021 605,000 people went to church <u>each week</u> in the UK – making Christianity the largest group activity in the country. Even in these secular days, the church is still the warp and weft of our national life with faith in Jesus Christ deep in the soil of our history (as shown in the recent Coronation).

Sadly, Church weddings and funerals are not as popular as they were even tho' the venues, time freedom and the care from the clergy are good and the costs reasonable. Many people seem to think that the church will not baptise their children or marry or bury them if they are not churchgoers. <u>This is not true</u> All are welcome for these important rites of passage. You just need to ask! William Temple said, "the Church is the only society on earth that exists for the benefit of non-members." Yes!

The church is here for everyone, of any faith or none. Clergy and church buildings are available for the whole community, not just for those who attend church regularly. I have so many stories of the church, mostly without fanfare, seeking to serve and minister where there is need. Sadly, resources don't allow for there to be a priest into every parish. But much of the work is done by faithful, hardworking volunteers who, amazingly, give about 23 million hours every month to work that benefits their local community - youth/children's work, street patrols, bereavement counselling, visiting the elderly, sick and housebound, lunch clubs, etc. Of course, many atheists and agnostics work just as hard, but nobody else has the same national network, or the historic connections with their communities.

You might not go to church, but please be assured that the church is here for you anyway. You don't have to sign up as a member to use the church to celebrate the birth of your child, marry, renew your vows or have a funeral or memorial service for a loved one who has died. You don't have to be a member to discuss what you believe or don't believe or to rant or rave about God. The church exists to serve. The church is here for you. You just need to ask!

#### 2 To Record:

Changes to the Register of Interests Declaration of Interest in Agenda Items

**3 To Receive a report** from Tamara Reay:

- Devizes Gateway station update: Following an Entry Feasibility Study completed in March 2023 – a comprehensive assessment by Network Rail – it was determined that stopping existing trains at a new station will mean disrupting the existing line. As a result, a Wiltshire wide Rail Strategy has been called into action; looking to improve the connectivity at Westbury station and how Devizes Gateway can fit within that. The options for serving Devizes are to stop fast trains going to Plymouth and Exeter or reinstate through services to Bedwin. These plans will coincide with HS2, a line in construction which comes into London near Paddington Station in London. Timings wise, the idea is to reach a decision in one year's time and delivery in 2029.
- <u>Potholes</u>: Wiltshire council was awarded £23million to pay for highways maintenance and a further £3.6 million from the pothole funding. There are currently a lot of potholes to address, please assist the Council where you can in reporting potholes on the myWiltshire app online so that these can be fixed.
- <u>Local businesses</u>: Wiltshire Council are concentrating on working more with Wilshire based businesses, there are workshops planned on how to do business with Wiltshire council, the next workshop is on the 27<sup>th</sup> of April in Corsham from 10-12 at the Digital Mansion. More information can be found on the Wiltshire Council website.

#### 4 Local Police Report:

- The local police have offered to attend Annual Meetings where requested.
- Burglary is showing as abnormally high for this area, with 6 offences over the course of March. This is against a backdrop of 28 offences in Melksham in total.
- One individual has been arrested and is being charged with 10 offences so far
- The Team are continuing to conduct secondary investigation into other offences which have been reported.
- The Police are delivering free property marking equipment to Victims, as well as other initiatives such as Tack Stamping.
- Bulkington will remain on the Police priority list in terms of patrols and the previous burglaries are still being investigated.
- 5 Open Forum:
- Defib electricity costs: The Parish Council contributions for the electricity running the village Defibrillator, housed at The Well pub, have increased from £30 annually to £60 from 2024, due the cost of electricity.

**9 Newsletter:** Printed and due to be distributed by Councillors alongside 2 leaflets

#### 10 Recreational Ground:

- Update: Pathway and Pergola works to commence 26<sup>th</sup> of June 2023. **Please note that the Rec Ground will need to be closed for the duration of the works to keep children safe.** This work will involve the removal of the swing and the trim trail. This equipment has not passed the safety tests for some time and needs to be removed for the children's safety. The new path and pergola will significantly improve access to the Rec Ground for all.
- The Trim trail was installed before the Queen's Golden Jubilee (which was in 2002) and the swings and several other items were salvaged and second hand at this time also. Furthermore, most of this equipment has wooden stakes in the ground to support the equipment, due to the wetness of the field, these are decaying and declining fast.
- Work will commence on fixing the wooden bridge once the weather is drier, costs are approved and the work is booked.
- The Rec Committee have submitted an Area Board Grant application for £3K to replace some of the equipment being removed in the June works. If the application is successful; the £3k will be added to the existing £2.5k the rec committee have in the account and will be used for replacing the removed trim trail with new, safe equipment. Swings are significantly more expensive and some fundraising will be required before this can be purchased. Any volunteers for fundraising please contact Carla Haslam or our Clerk Hannah with any ideas.

Both the Oak Bloke works and the equipment replacement works mentioned above will be funded through Rec Ground funds and grants.

**11 Parish Steward:** Outstanding jobs to be sent to The Clerk prior to next visit. Clerk and Julie to meet Matt Perrot on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of May at 12:30 at the rec ground to discuss clearing the verges currently spilling into the road.

**12 LHFIG requests:** Update on the 3 Village requests for dropped curbs and white road markings: These requests were discussed at the April LHFIG meeting. The dropped curbs are due to be completed in Autumn 2023, the cost to the village for this project will be 25% of the estimated 3K (£600). White lines works will be revisited in the future, the dropped curbs were prioritised at LHFIG were not able to proceed with all three tasks.

**13 Summer party:** Bulkington will be holding a village event on the 13<sup>th</sup> of May – between noon and 4pm. Villagers are invited to attend, bringing picnics, blankets, flags, bunting etc. Team games like tug of war, rounders, three-legged race and so on will be played throughout the afternoon. This event will no longer be a ticketed event.

**14 Best Kept Village Competition:** Bulkington has entered this year's competition, judging for the first (District) round will take place from 15<sup>th</sup> May to 13<sup>th</sup> June. Now is a great time to spruce up front gardens and tidy the village up ahead of the summer and the judging.

**15 Recruitment:** We are currently recruiting for one Councillor to join the team, if you would like to put yourself forward, please email our Clerk, Hannah.

**16 Bus shelter Bike Rack:** A metal rack was purchased by the Parish Council and has now been installed.

#### 17 War memorial amend:

The Clerk has been in correspondence with a family member of an individual mentioned on the war memorial. He wishes to change the rank of the individual and have the monument updated.

Councillors agreed they need a proof of records for the individual's ranking and that the village does not have the funds to cover an update to the War Memorial. If the individual wishes to go ahead with the change, and can prove the rank, the works will need to be funded by grants obtained by the individual or through fundraising, also by the individual. #### Seend Cleeve Sewage Spill

Wessex Water advised their recent survey of the sewage pipe in the vicinity of the pumping station has recorded some ingress of tree roots into the pipe. Steps will be taken to rectify this.

#### **Items for Discussion from Members of the Parish** None

#### Local Highways & Footpath Infrastructure Group (LHFIG)

#### Seend Cleeve Northern Extension of 30mph speed limit

The extension of the existing 30mph speed limit needs to be implemented before new residents arrive. Tamara Reay advised that Highways were reviewing the requirement and requested details of the funding provision for this extension.

#### **Bollands Hill Freight Assessment and Priority Mechanism (FAPM)**

LHFIG agreed this item should remain on their Agenda. Concern was raised regarding the road width below the junction with Pelch Lane. LHFIG stated that the minimum width for central white lines to be applied was 5.5m. The actual road width at this location is 4.8m. The Clerk to advise LHFIG of the Council's findings.

Much of the HGV traffic using Bollands Hill also passes through Worton. Tamara Reay advised that options to limit HGV traffic travelling through Worton are to be discussed at their Annual Parish Meeting 15<sup>th</sup> May. If possible, the Clerk to attend with Tamara Reay **The Stocks Advanced Direction Signage (ADS)** 

# LHFIG are scheduling the deployment of the additional signage. Although a firm date has not been forthcoming, the Parish Council believes the deployment will be completed within the next three months.

#### **Broad Lane**

Concerns were raised regarding the general state of the lane and verges adjacent to Cherry Tree Farm. The verges need to be cleared of farm machinery and other related items. Potholes along part of the lane also need to be filled. The Clerk to report the potholes on MyWilts App and task the Parish Steward to visit the lane to fill some of the smaller potholes and report any that are beyond the capability of the Parish Steward.

#### **Bradley Lane**

The Clerk advised Wiltshire Council Rights of Way and Countryside Team that their quote to upgrade the surface of Bradley Lane was acceptable and details of the land owners had been provided.

#### **Rusty Lane**

The new surface does not reach the Canal at the lower end of Rusty Lane. The Clerk has written to the Rights of Way and Countryside Team.

#### High Sided Vehicles, High Street Seend

A vehicle collided with the roof of a listed building at the Pinch Point on A361, Seend High Street. The matter has been reported to LHFIG who subsequently advised the Parish Council consider the implementation of Shuttle Working Traffic Lights at this point. Although there will be some 'downside' with such an installation, there are significant advantages if this was implemented, not only protecting adjacent property but also being able to potentially widen the existing pedestrian footway and reduce vehicle speeds in this vicinity. Councillors indicated they were willing to consider this option.

#### Speedwatch

The issue of 'hands-on' as opposed to 'online' Speedwatch training was raised with LHFIG. We were advised that John Derryman (PCC) may be able to assist.

The next LHFIG meeting is 4<sup>th</sup> July 2023. The Chairman and Clerk to attend.

#### WILTSHIRE COUNCIL NEWS

**Spotlight on Children's Services**. Could you make a difference to a child's life? Wiltshire Council has a duty to give the County's children the best start in life as it is fundamental in improving their long-term life chances and gives them the best opportunity to live full and healthy lives. Children and families are at the heart of Wiltshire Council and a key part of the 10 year Business Plan.

Led by Laura Mayes, Councillor for Bromham, Rowde and Roundway and Deputy Leader, the Council has worked relentlessly to improve Children's Services and now delivers consistently "Good" services that ensure the needs of families and children are met. This is reflected in the 2019 Ofsted inspection which rated Children's Services "Good" across the board. The Council has a comprehensive Early Help Offer which aims to give support as soon as families need it – with several special programmes designed to help to prevent family break down and reduce the number of families requiring support from Statutory Services.

In 2023/24 Wiltshire Council is budgeted to spend £62.7m on Children's Services and whilst care numbers are stable – the Council is responsible for more care experienced young people until they are 25 years old. In addition, the complexity of cases has increased, and it can be hard to find the right provision, so sometimes there is a requirement for high-cost placements.

Wiltshire Council is focused on finding local foster carers for local young people so that young people can stay within the local area, as well as making sure siblings find a home where they can stay together. The number of children coming into care continues to rise which means more foster carers are needed – since 2020 70 new foster carers have been recruited but another 30 are needed.

Fostering for Wiltshire Council means all money is spent on frontline services and the child is more likely to be able to stay close to their school, friends and family networks. The council recently increased its fostering rates - they range from £380 to £710 a week per child, depending on people's skills and experience.

Foster carers need to be over 21 years of age, have a spare bedroom, time to care for a child and a willingness to care and seek to understand young people who have experienced trauma and loss.

#### NURTURE NATURE



How lovely the roadsides and hedges look with foaming cow parsley on the verges and all the hawthorn blossom out in the hedges, great for wildlife. A benefit of the energy crisis as local authorities and landowners cut down on expensive roadside maintenance, unless a danger to road users. Very few hirondines have been seen so far this year. However, it was pleasing to note that some householders have erected martin boxes under the eaves. The cold weather killed many garden birds last winter. Wrens are very susceptible to the cold and not many wrens have been seen, or heard this year. The writer has not seen one and a pair used to nest regularly in ivy on a fence. He remembers, when living in a thatched house with deep eaves, counting wrens going to roost in a gap in the thatch eave at dusk in winter. One year over twenty were counted roosting together for warmth. The tit species also suffered in the inclement December and January weather. A box used annually by great tits is not occupied this year. This could possibly be due to the box not having been cleaned out in November and a species of wild bee had taken over occupancy - the owner finding out the hard way when putting his hand in without gloves to clean out old nesting material and having to withdraw his hand quickly with half a dozen angry wild bees clinging to it.

I think readers will find it noticeable that the garden bird scenario has changed over the last few years, due to house and industrial building development on fields and green spaces nearby. Now, the corvid family, wood pigeons and grey squirrels are marauding

garden bird feeders, and are very much more prominent. This phenomenon is upsetting the balance of nature in gardens and there is more predation of nests and fledglings too. Garden bird feeders are not designed for corvids. A rook or crow with its beak like a hammer drill can easily get through even metal feeders. Recently the cock of a nesting pair of blackbirds, in defending its territory, had its leg severed by a rook, and fluttering away was never seen again. The hen blackbird valiantly kept feeding their nestlings for a couple of days until taken by a sparrow hawk and the hungry nestlings were then predated by a grey squirrel. Having written earlier that hirondines appear to be ever declining there are several local locations where swifts have nested for years, such as in church towers, but have not, and are not returning to these ancestral homes. The success of these migrations depends mainly on the weather. They prefer wet and warm weather for travelling which encourages the hatching of swarms of insects for survival on their passage. Scientists have estimated that a pair of birds can consume some 20,000 insects and arachnids in a day. All these three species however are in decline and in 2021 swifts were added to the Red List of our endangered birds having suffered a 60% decrease over the last quarter of a century. Scientists fear that in time none of these three beautiful migrants will return to these shores.

In other news this month, Year 5 & 6 Keevil School pupils visited the Science department at Clarendon School in Trowbridge. With the expert guidance of Courtney Hitchen, Diana Gullis and Cheryl Witt they learned about the circulatory system and got hands on with dissecting a heart! Needless to say, the children were both fascinated and curious. This is usually an activity children undertake in Year 10, so they were thrilled to be invited to Clarendon for this amazing opportunity.
