Maureen's Ramblings.....

I rarely watch Songs of Praise on the BBC, as it is not on at a convenient time for me. But I caught it a few weeks ago and found myself singing along – joining about 1 million viewers who watch each week. I also like singing hymns (or many of them!!) Even in an age as secular as ours, its spiritual life battered by apathy, materialism and lack of robust debate about the nature of faith in our 21st Century world, the great hymns of our Christian tradition have the ability to rouse us, lift our spirits and bring us together.

I have to admit that I rarely watch football much either, but did watch a recent big match on the TV where the fans, in all their post-modern diversity, led by a brass band, sang with passion and enthusiasm the hymn "Abide with me" written by a Victorian clergyman! But look at the words – how come a game that is so clearly an affirmation of the life of the body sing a hymn which is a meditation on death?

"Abide with me, fast falls the eventide. The darkness deepens Lord, with me abide. When other helpers fail and comforts flee help of the helpless, oh, abide with me. Swift to its close ebbs out life's little day, earth's joys grow dim, its glories pass away Change and decay in all around I see O Thou who changest not, abide with me I fear no foe, with Thee at hand to bless; ills have no weight, and tears no bitterness. Where is death's sting? Where, grave, thy victory? I triumph still, if Thou abide with me

Hold Thou Thy cross before my closing eyes. Shine through the gloom and point me to the skies.

Heaven's morning breaks, and earth's vain shadows flee; in life, in death, O Lord, abide with me".

Henry Lyte wrote this prayer in 1847 just months before he died of tuberculosis. The tune was written by William Monk, weeks after the tragic death of his three-year old daughter. In both words and music they are seeking the help, comfort, strength and courage of God to face what the future holds. It is a prayer that I have used when facing my own struggles and walking alongside others in theirs.

But what does this ritual mean for the football crowds, looking down on a football pitch instead of a grave? Maybe hymn singing is about community and belonging; when the identities of the opposing teams and all of life's other rivalries and tensions, are temporarily subordinated to an assertion of a shared humanity. And maybe, just maybe, the words will be remembered by individuals walking through their own darkness and loneliness and their own journeys of change, loss and grief. This hymn, like so many, point us to God – a God it might be hard to conceive or believe in; a God who might seem far away when we are in darkness. But a God who can stir up hope in us for that day when "heaven's morning breaks and earth's vain shadows flee". We always sing hymns in the five churches of the Wellsprings Benefice. Why not come along and join us?!

Monthly Parish Meeting – Shortened Draft Minutes PENDING OFFICAL APPROVAL AT NEXT MEETING Held Wednesday the 18th of January 2023 at 7.30pm in the Bulkington Village Hall.

- 2. To Record: No changes to the Register of Interests received.

 No declaration of Interest in agenda items received.
- 3. To Receive a report from Tamara Reay:

Wiltshire Council budget proposals for 2023/24: Wiltshire Council published its Budget proposals for 2023/24 and the next two financial years last week. More information about these can be found at https://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/news/budget-proposals-2023-24

Election charges: Parish Councils will now have to pay for their own elections, a factor Councillors need to consider when budgeting for the year.

2 Pound Bus Fare: Wiltshire bus users can now travel on most routes in the county for just £2 or less for a single fare until 31st March. The fare price reduction has been funded by the Government, and is aimed at getting more people to use buses across the country during current cost of living challenges.

Alternative fuel allowance: a £200 one off payment for people off the gas grid will be paid directly into people's electricity account in February as a one off payment. Weather: During the recent bad weather, our teams have been gritting and dealing with floodwater as a priority; it is anticipated that next week their priority will return to filling potholes. To report potholes, people should go to www.wiltshire.gov.uk/mywilts

Salt bucket: Councillors asked Tamara about funding options for an additional salt bucket at the other end of the village. Tamara said that this would not be funded by Wiltshire Council and that it would need to be paid for and arranged by the village. Ideverde Contract: Councillors questioned whether Wiltshire Councils' contract with Ideverde covers any areas in Bulkington, to avoid doubling up with our new grass management company.

Refuse: Wiltshire Council has announced some changes to the way Recycling and refuse centres are run. They plan to restrict residents from driving to household recycling centres outside their area.

4. Local Police Report: PCSO James attended our Parish Council Meeting—answering questions about local crime stats. And listening to the reports of break-ins in the area. The Police are investigating the break-ins on 12th January using CCTV footage and villager descriptions and reports. The advice to stay safe is to lock doors, don't leave keys in the car, remove valuables and report everything straight away. Police are supporting us by patrolling through the village at night. PCSO James highlighted the importance of reporting all break-ins and suspicious activity—as the police force is understaffed they are working off the data gathered through reports and will spend more time in the town centre unless something happens in the smaller villages. It only takes a moment to make a report online: https://www.wiltshire.police.uk/ro/report/

In an emergency, or if you need urgent police assistance, you should always dial 999. You can also report suspicious activity by contacting the police on 0800 789 321. The police advise that an active Neighbourhood watch scheme is also a good deterrent to crime. If there is any appetite for re-instating the scheme in Bulkington and there are volunteers to run it, the Parish Council can assist in you in forming a group.

- 5. Open Forum: Bike stand. Clerk to keep researching costs and funding options.
- 6. Local Planning Updates: None known.
- 7. Minute Approval: The December minutes were approved.
- 8. Finance: Clerk November—£325 Clerk December—£325 Mark Goddard and Son Grounds maintenance—£288

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) on planning application 18/09278/FULL—Leaze Farm, Mill Lane, Bulkington, SN10 1SP. Bulkington PC received £1,029.22 This is the 15% entitlement of the CIL liability which became payable when the Development did not adhere to the CIL legislation. This money becomes part of the parish council's funds, but must be spent within five years and on a community project, this can include a bench, speed signs, or any community project the PC are involved with. The accounts must show how the CIL funds have been spent and Wiltshire Council will require a copy of end of year accounts.

- 11. parish Stewards: Outstanding jobs to be sent to The Clerk prior to next visit. Stewards are currently focusing on weather related damage such as potholes.
- 12. LHFIG requests: 3 Village requests were discussed at the local Highways and Footway Improvement group meeting on 17th January. The request for 2 dropped kurbs and white road markings at the Mill Lane end of the village were supported. White Road Markings: The request was for a pavement to be marked out on the road to allow villagers to pass more safely to the far end of the village in the Poulshot and Seend direction. The group raised concern over villagers potentially feeling safe when the white markings do not actually keep them safe and that residents will park over the white lines, concealing them in part. Councillors discussed the pros and cons and agreed that white markings on the road would draw drivers attention to possible pedestrians and that it would increase safety. All present agreed to proceed.

Dropped Curbs: The pavements on Northfields and Chestnut Drive have limited accessibility due to lack of dropped curbs. The LHFIG group agreed that improving accessibility in the village would benefit all villagers and visitors.

Cost: All LHFIG requests result in a 25% cost for the Parish. The group roughly estimated the works of all three projects totalling around £3k. This would result in a £750 cost to the village. Councillors approved this cost and agreed that it could be paid for using the recently received CIL money. (see agenda item 8) Next Steps: Following confirmation from the PC, Gareth Rogers will proceed with a checklist of circumstance, checking the classification of the road, speed, right of way, materials of foot paths, vehicle flows and other factors before confirming costs and definite go ahead.

- 13. Ticketed Summer Party: The Coronation of HM King Charles III is on Sat 6th May. Initial planning of a party on 13th May was discussed. Volunteers needed to make this event possible. Contact parish council of Clerk Hannah.
- 14 Recruitment: We are currently recruiting for one Councillor to join the team. If you would like to put yourself forward, please contact our Clerk Hannah.

SEEND PARISH COUNCIL

January PC meeting

Attendance - 10 Councillors

Councillor Dickinson The Chairman requested a minute's silence in memory of Councillor Carol Dickinson who sadly passed away 19th January 2023. Her funeral will take place on Wednesday 1st March at West Wiltshire Crematorium, Semington at 2pm. There will be an online link available for those unable to attend in person.

Local Council Matters

Cllr Reay provided the following updates on local matters:

Wiltshire Council Budget

The Council's budget for 2023-24 and draft budget for the next two years is available online via Wiltshire Council's website. (https://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/news/budget-proposals-2023-24) The budget will be presented to the Full Council for approval on 21st February. In summary it proposes an increase of 2.99% with an additional 2% included for Adult Social Care.

Parish Council (four-yearly cycle) Election costs

Previously Wiltshire Council covered this cost, however from 2025 all Parish Councils will need to make a provision for this expense. It was noted the Parish Council had not been formally made aware of this policy change until 9th January. The guidelines as to the level of provision councils should make is vague.

Alternative Fuel Payments

Parishioners who heat their homes using oil or gas bottles and are effectively off-grid (i.e. they are not connected to the gas national transmission network) are entitled to a government payment to help alleviate the cost of living crisis. Payments will be made in the first instance via the property's Electricity supplier.

School Travel Plan

No further update has been received from the school. Tamara Reay agreed to contact the school.

Matters Arising

Damaged Stile in Row Lane

The Chairman has arranged to meet the landowner on site with a representative of the Seend Footpath Working Group to review the options for the stile's repair or replacement.

Bradley Lane

A report from Wiltshire Council regarding the options for upgrading the surface of Bradley Lane has not been forthcoming. The Clerk to chase Wiltshire Council with assistance from Tamara Reay.

WALC

At the meeting 18th January WALC members noted insufficient evidence had been provided to support an increase in annual membership, hence fees will remain at the current level. Concern was expressed at the number of vacant posts and shortage of experienced Clerks.

Bradley Lane Fence

Sir Mathew Thorpe will arrange for Andy Waylen to repair the fence

Local Highways & Footpath Infrastructure Group (LHFIG)

The Clerk attended the LHFIG meeting on 17th January 2023. The minutes issued after this meeting did not fully reflect what was discussed and agreed. The Clerk to write to LHFIG and copy Tamara Reay.

Inmarsh High Friction Surface

LHFIG invoiced (£750) for the new High Friction Surface.

The Stocks

Although the Parish Council agreed to fully fund the additional signage/road markings in this vicinity, unfortunately due to Ringways contract terminating on 31st March 2023, Wiltshire Council has had to renegotiate a priority list of work that is to be completed by this date. This has been further hampered due to bad weather resulting in staff being diverted away from this work to deal with flooding issues and salt spreading. It was reluctantly accepted that this work would be rescheduled 'early' in next financial year.

Broad Lane

Due to the overspill of general scrap and dumping of other items adjacent to Cherry Tree Farm, the Clerk is to request a visit from Wiltshire Council to inspect the eastern end of Broad Lane with a view to establishing how best to clear the area.

Bell Crossroads

The recent accident at the Bell Crossroads was noted along with the need to progress a solution. Although the Parish Council stated that it would be willing to fund 50% of the cost up to a maximum of £5,000, Wiltshire Council stated it will have to be moved to next financial year as Highways does not currently have available resources.

LHFIG suggested the work at the Bell crossroads and the Stocks could be combined to make it more efficient.

Bollands Hill

LHFIG acknowledged the situation on Bollands Hill and will forward our survey to a new team who are charged with undertaking a Freight Travel Plan Review across the county. As this issue is impacting other parishes, LHFIG are considering involving Tamara Reay and other councillors to take a wider view.

Rusty Lane

LHFIG agreed to investigate the outstanding invoice for the repair of Rusty Lane.

Seend Cleeve

It has been noted that raw sewage has flowed into an open road drain adjacent to the new housing development and pumping station at Seend Cleeve. The Clerk to write to Wessex Water and the Canal and River Trust. Tamara Reay to be copied to allow information to be passed to the appropriate department within Wiltshire Council to monitor the situation.

Speedwatch

Two volunteers have signed-up to undertake the on-line training to use the speed camera equipment and carry out roadside traffic surveys. It was noted that volunteers prefer practical (hands-on) training rather than the simulated on-line training course.

The next LHFIG meeting is scheduled for 8th April 2023. The Chairman and Clerk to attend.

Devizes Area Board

Pamela Akerman and John Williams attended the Area board meeting on 5th December and had previously updated the Councillors regarding the key information from the meeting. The meeting focussed on antisocial behaviour that had been reoccurring in Devizes and the action being taken by Wiltshire police in conjunction with the Town Council. The most relevant item for Seend parishioners was the opening of the new Health & Care Centre. It will deliver integrated primary and community care. All the community services currently delivered at Devizes hospital e.g. physiotherapy will gradually be transferred to the new centre.

Items of Correspondence - Best Kept Village Competition

CPRE have announced this year's competition and it was agreed Seend would once again take part. Judging will take place between 15th May and 13th June with a presentation for the major winners in September. The Clerk to diarise Facebook alerts prior to judging commencing.

Parish Council (four-yearly cycle) Election costs

Previously, Wiltshire County Council (WCC) has covered this cost. However, from 2025 the Parish Council will need to make a provision for this. To help local councils plan for this, WCC calculated the costs per council/ council ward for an uncontested election, using the actual number of uncontested elections in 2021was between £200 and £1,100. As Seend Parish is above average in its size, councillors recommended the Parish Council make a £250/year contribution to its reserves to provide £1000 to meet the cost of this four-yearly cycle.

The annual review of the Parish's recorded assets was agreed to be undertaken by John Williams with the assistance of the Clerk on a date to be agreed. An updated version of the existing Asset Register will be circulated to Councillors for approval at the February meeting.

Warm Spaces

Holy Cross Church has arranged the provision of a Warm Space at the Irene Usher Memorial Pavilion. The Pavilion will be open on the Second Thursday and Third Wednesday of each month January – April between 3pm and 5pm.

In advance of this meeting Councillors agreed to make a donation of £100 to support this initiative.

Items of Note

Defibrillator Support

The recent software upgrade failure causing the village defibrillators to display incorrect battery status resulted in all units having to be exchanged with the manufacturer. Mark Wood undertook the recovery and exchange of the village units for temporary loan replacements. Once the units had been upgraded to the new software, the loaned units were replaced with our units and returned to the manufacturer. The Parish Council wishes to express its thanks to Mark for undertaking what was a challenging task whilst ensuring maximum service availability of the Defibrillators.

Queens Green Canopy

Tree delivery is currently scheduled between 6th& 17th March 2023. All parishioners involved in this project have been informed.

Retrospective Planning

A number of Retrospective Planning applications being made after work has been undertaken without planning consent. The Parish Council is concerned and if numbers continue to increase, it will express its concern to Wiltshire Council.

Councillor Vacancy

Georgina A' Bear announced that after many years of being a Councillor she has decided to step down from the role. She has been the main instigator of the Neighbourhood Plan and Seend is one of the few parishes to have one. She will be sorely missed. The Chairman thanked her for her service and hard work, then presented her with a gift from the Parish Council as a token of our appreciation.

As a result of Georgina's retirement and the passing of Carol Dickinson, the Parish Council has two vacancies. Wiltshire council has been advised of the situation and formal vacancy notices will be issued in due course.

POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER PHILIP WILKINSON'S COLUMN My appeal by doct proposed a raise the amount of

My annual budget proposed a raise the amount of money you pay for the policing part of your council tax, known as the precept, by

6.2%. For an average Band D household, that equates to £15 a year or £1.25 a month.

It's been a difficult decision to make and that's why it was important we consulted you.

Over 2,700 people responded to the survey. We also took it out across Swindon and Wiltshire to gather your feedback. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank you if you took the time to complete it 54% of people who responded said they would be

prepared to support a maximum rise but it's important to make clear why I asked you to support that option.

Without putting up the precept, Wiltshire Police would need to save over £4m in the next year. Even by increasing the precept, savings will be key but I'm confident this will happen at the same time as delivering a better service. We will put 32 extra police officers on the streets of Wiltshire, in addition to the new Uplift officers. We should have 1,189 police officers by the end of March this year – the highest number for quite some time.

I am constantly speaking to our local MPs and government ministers about the funding formula. We need a fairer system which provides our police force with the investment equal to forces similar to ours.

By raising the precept, we can show we are playing our part in funding our police force and this puts us in a stronger position.

With more officers on our streets and a better use of our existing funds, I hope you will see an improvement in the service you receive and see value for money in the measures I've taken to make Wiltshire a safer place to live and work.

March Nurture Nature Notes

In the recent very cold weather some readers have seen bumblebees collecting nectar from winter flowering plants, such as winter flowering honeysuckle, mahonia,



abelia grandiflora and of course - ivy. These will be the hardy British species prevalent at this time of year (February, March), probably the buff tailed bumblebee (bombus terrestris) or possibly the early bumblebee (bombus pratorum) with an orangy yellowish bum, quite common in gardens and parks in early spring.

There has been interest from readers in the super highways of hedges and trees for wildlife and it's still the season to plant native trees and hedges which are best suited to the climate and soils of the British Isles. By planting berry bearing species such as blackthorn and hawthorn, elderberry, spindleberry, vibernum, wild cherry, dog rose and whitebeam, all essential plants providing valuable nourishment to conserve wildlife, and will help stem the decline of species and attract fauna, and the resulting floral displays will brighten up your lives too. Web searches of local nurseries and garden centres will help you source the species you choose. A word of warning from a recent national newspaper article: "Trees left to die in rushed planting schemes". The reasons being lack of aftercare and management. Watering of newly planted stock is essential especially in long spells of hot weather, (dribble hoses are ideal), seasonal pruning to encourage growth will be needed and maybe some form of electric fencing protection (or hazel hurdles) should you be visited by local deer and grey squirrels which can be very destructive too. However you will get much pleasure from watching your whips or larger stock grow and bulk out over the seasons and years, as the old saying has it 'Big oaks from little acorns grow".

It's also frog and toad spawn time – don't you wish you'd dug that pond? One of the best features to attract a multitude of wildlife.

Avian flu is still very much a concern of seabirds especially. Wetland reserves are reporting fewer numbers of winter migrants such as geese, swans and ducks and divers. Our native birds are still under threat too, so continue to keep birdbaths and feeders very clean. After a very wet at times, and cold winter, by Valentine's Day snowdrops are at their best, and crocii are flowering too, most parts of the South had not had rain for four weeks. With the Spring Equinox (20th March) not so far away – who will be the first to hear a cuckoo this year? Can you remember when you last heard one? The writer can't. There is a website for following cuckoos' journeys from deepest Africa to our shores. Also spare thoughts for the lot of wildlife in Ukraine, in the earthquake affected areas of Turkey and Syria, in the flooded areas of the Antipodes and in all the regions of the world where current wildfires have destroyed wildlife and their habitats. In 1871 one of the last Great Bustards in Wiltshire, and more than likely in the whole of the British Isles was shot. The taxidermist did his stuff and Otis Tarda was displayed in Salisbury Museum. Quite a few readers will no doubt have visited the Great Bustard Centre at Wexland near Netheravon, established in 2004 to restore this once native species to the British List. One can follow the history on the GB Group's website. Initial failures with eggs and birds from the Russian Steppes. Better success from 2014 with Spanish stock, and now in this decade this once extinct magnificent bird is now restored to Salisbury Plain and other parts of Southern England as resident. A great conserva-The 'wingless' Otis Tarda tion success story.
