Christian Aid Week Sunday May 14th. – Saturday May 20th 2023

Christian Aid, with 70 years' experience, works to bring an end to poverty in 37 countries, helping people in Africa, Asia and the Middle East as well as Latin America and the Caribbean, addressing the root causes as well as the effects of poverty. They work with 475 local, national & international partner organizations; some are Christian, some Muslim, Jewish or Hindu – some are of no religious persuasion at all. Christian Aid's primary concern is that partners are good at what they do. The work is inspired by Christian values of faith, charity, hope and truth. Put simply 'aid' is what Christian Aid does, 'Christian' is why they do it."

Christian Aid makes best use of monies collected by allocating funds from a central budget to partners according to need. A close relationship is maintained with partners to learn more about the problems in their areas, to offer support and check that money is spent wisely. Over a quarter of the money collected is spent on emergencies but, the key area is long term development.

Spending nearly half of the income on projects such as education and health as well as ways to improve people's resilience to shocks and disasters, like stronger houses in earthquake zones. The remainder is divided between campaigning and fundraising. No money is given to governments.

The rise in the cost of living here and the continuing War in Ukraine, for which many of you have contributed, suggests this is not a good time to be asking for donations. But the global changes in weather which we have already experienced with hotter summers and warmer winters with periods of drought and heavy rain are much worse in many of the poorer parts of the world. In Northern Kenya and other parts of eastern Africa for example, where they are pastoralists there has been no significant rainfall for 4 years. Many cattle have died as a result and people only survive on food aid. Mass starvation is feared, without help, like the famine of 1984 in Ethiopia. This has led to considerable mental illness, especially amongst the men since they are traditionally the bread winners and can no longer provide for their families. Suicides have increased whilst others seek solace in alcohol. Parts of India and Pakistan and other areas of Asia have had cyclonic weather causing widespread flooding with houses being swept away. Christian Aid have also been in Turkey and Syria recently helping with the earthquake damage.

Asking for more money seems hard when you may have probably contributed recently to one of the many Ukraine appeals and are likely to have little to spare due to the sharp rise in the cost of living. But those in the Wellsprings Benefice have always been generous to Christian Aid so I hope you will feel able to support Christian Aid Week once again. As usual, for your convenience, a Christian Aid envelope is inside this May edition of Spotlight; please keep it safely. The collectors will call during the week of 14th – 20th May. It helps them considerably and is more convenient to you if the donation is ready when they call. I appreciate it is a nuisance but if you pay income tax, please complete the Gift Aid slip too, it increases your amount to Christian Aid by 25% at no extra cost to yourself. If you miss your collector for any reason, please hand your envelope in at the Village Shop in Seend or to Liz Futter, Mill Lane, Bulkington or to me at Whites Farm, Seend Cleeve, whichever is the easiest. CHURCH NEWS

The days are getting longer and lighter, spring is here, the sun is shining and it's getting warmer.



As the sun shines through my windows into the dark corners of the house, it prompts me to start thinking about spring cleaning. Looking around the different rooms, I have decided that it's time to put a bit of extra effort into making everything in our house clean and in order.

And so I begin – I know that I am going to turn my house upside down as I clean out the cupboards, take things apart, clean and scrub everywhere. I am going to reach into every dark corner of my house in order to make it presentable, fresh, and new, getting rid of junk and rubbish in the process.

I wonder how many of you still do a thorough spring clean of your homes, or perhaps you may find it all just a bit too much.

We may find it helpful to make a decluttering plan. Mess can affect our mood, but it's not always easy to get rid of things or know where to begin. Why not start by identifying your cluttered hotspots and visualising how you'd like them to look. Break it down into small areas, perhaps even taking "before" photos so you can monitor your progress. Once you get going, put everything into designated bags for recycling, rubbish, selling and donating.

Monthly Parish Meeting – Draft Minutes PENDING OFFICAL APPROVAL AT NEXT MEETING

Held Wednesday the 15th of March 2023 at 7.30pm in the Bulkington Village Hall. Councillors: Amy Powell (Chair), Alex Breach, Alison Howard-Evans and Julie Anderson-Hill

Agenda Item

1 Apologies for absence: Andrew Grabham, Carla Haslam and Tamara Reay gave their apologies, their apologies were accepted in the meeting.

2 To Record: No changes to the Register of Interests received No declaration of Interest in Agenda Items received

3 To Receive a report from Tamara Reay: Tamara gave her apologies for the meeting and sent her report to the councilors. The report was distributed and discussed. Tamara's Report:

"Ask The Leader" event - will take place at Devizes Library on Tuesday 28 March, from 6pm to 7.30pm. Residents will be able to meet Cllr Richard Clewer, Leader of Wiltshire Council, share their concerns about local issues and ask questions on a wide variety of council services and projects.

Council Tax online - Wiltshire Council is launching a new, updated portal to enable residents to manage their council tax online and go paperless. This will enable people to check their council tax account and make payments, view their bill, set up and amend a direct debit and notify the council of any changes. They can also opt out of receiving a paper bill through the post. To use this new facility, you need to visit Managing your council tax online and enter their tax reference number.

Wiltshire Council is supporting the local administration of national Government schemes that aim to help people who haven't yet received any automatic financial assistance from energy support schemes.

Most households get a £400 discount on their energy bills. However, in some cases, people do not get the discount automatically; for example, if they pay for energy through a landlord, housing manager or site owner, or live in a park home, houseboat or off the electricity grid. The Government's Energy Bills Support Scheme (EBSS AF) Alternative Funding is now in place to help these people. The EBSS AF is providing support of £400 for energy bills for households in England, Scotland, and Wales without a direct relationship to a domestic electricity supplier. The scheme is now open to all eligible households until 31 May 2023. Anyone eligible for EBSS AF will need to fill out a short online form via the www.gov.uk website. The form can be found by searching—"Apply for energy bill support if you do not get it automatically" into the search bar on www.gov.uk. Applications are made directly to the Government, not to or via Wiltshire Council. For those who do not have online access, they can apply via a contact centre on 08081 753287 where a representative will guide them through the application process.

The EBSS AF is separate to the Alternative Fuels Payment (AFP) which is for people that use alternative fuels for heating. People should have received the £200 Alternative Fuels Payment (AFP) if both the following are true:

Their household is not connected to the mains gas grid or they use alternative fuels as their main form of heating.

People are eligible for this payment if the main way they heat their home uses: tank or bottled gas, liquid petroleum gas (LPG), oil, wood, or solid fuel.

Most homes that are eligible for this payment should have received it in the last few weeks as a credit on their electricity bills.

Councillors discussed an expanding property in Keevil near the sewerage site.

4 Local Police Report: The local police report for Melksham Rural South (Semington, Seend, Seend Cleeve, Great Hinton, Keevil, Bulkington, Steeple Ashton and Poulshot) reports that, for January, no offences outside of the normal average ranges occurred. The area saw 16 offences in total, most of which were one-off occurrences. Due to the recent burglary series, the area will remain on the Police priority list this month while the night time offendings are still being investigated.

5 Open Forum: No new matters raised by the community.

6 Local Planning Updates:

7 Minute Approval: Approval of the last Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting in February with minor adjustments made.

8 Finance: Clerk February £325

Defib contribution to The Well 2023 £30. Defib contribution to The Well 2022 £30 Contribution to electricity used by Defib for The Well to be paid every March..

Total approved in meeting: £385

Total in account: £ 9,308.35

9 Newsletter: Councilors discussed the next Newsletter and agreed that all working files will be sent to the Clerk to complete so that the finished Newsletter can be included in the submission for Best Kept Village as this fulfills some of the judging criteria. The submission deadline is the 21st of April. It was agreed that the newsletter will mention Council tax online from Tamara's report along with a reminder about the upcoming Coronation event in May. It was also agreed to include a plea to villagers not to park blocking pavements as this really affects pedestrian access.

10 Recreational Ground: Carla sent an update on progress made by the Rec Committee:

The Oak Blokes are booked to begin work on the Bulkington Recreation Ground in the week commencing 26th of June 2023. The works will cost £7500. 00 and will include: To install Pathway from existing gate to new Pergola area (approx. where the little white springy horse currently is) To install Hard standing area, using same material as pathway, underneath Pergola.

Removal of existing timber play apparatus including swing and make good any holes. The play apparatus being removed has not passed the ROSPA tests for some time and are no longer considered safe to use. Installation of new pergola.

Please note that the Rec. Ground will need to be closed for the duration of the works to keep children safe.

The Rec. Committee have submitted an Area Board Grant application for £3K to replace some of the equipment being removed in the June works. If the application is successful; the £3k will be added to the existing £2.5k the rec. committee have in the account and will be used for replacing the removed apparatus with new, safe equipment. The current quote for this is £6k so £500 will need to be raised. Any volunteers for fundraising please contact Carla Haslam or our Clerk Hannah with and ideas. The replacement works will only be able to be completed once the funding has been secured and money raised. The Oak Bloke works and the equipment replacement mentioned above will be funded through Rec. Ground funds and grants. Councillors discussed changing the gate latch to the Rec. Ground to allow access for mobility scooters and wheelchairs.

As agreed in September 2022, a new grass cutting contract with Mark Goddard & Sons Landscaping will be signed this month for the maintenance of the grass on the Rec Ground, the bus shelter and the war memorial. The contract is to start March 2023. The contract includes 12-14 cuts over the summer cutting season. £228 per month to cut all the playing field grass, the bus shelter and the war memorial area. It was agreed to include the War Memorial grass area and behind the bus shelter in the scope of work despite this in theory being covered by Wiltshire Council's contract with IdeVerde. Due to past unreliable service, the Parish Council has decided to outsource these areas to ensure consistency and quality.

- 11 Parish Steward: Outstanding jobs to be sent to The Clerk prior to next visit. Clerk to chase meeting about grass verges and contact steward. Clerk to advise Steward of Best Kept village dates.
- **12 LHFIG requests:** Bulkington currently has 3 Village requests for dropped kerbs and white road markings submitted to the LHFIG group, we are awaiting an update in the next LHFIG meeting on the 14th of April.
- **13 Coronation Picnic:** The Coronation of HM King Charles III will take place on Saturday 6th May, with Monday 8th being declared a holiday. It was decided that the village event will take place on the 13th of May between noon and 4pm. Villagers are invited to attend bringing picnic, blankets, flags, bunting etc. Team games like tug of war, rounder's, three legged race and so on will be played throughout the afternoon. This event will no longer be a ticketed event.

14 Best Kept Village Competition: The next year of this competition is coming up, the entry deadline is 21st April. Councillors agreed that Bulkington will be entering again; judging for the first (District) round will take place from 15th May to 13th June. Clerk to submit entry once the Newsletter is complete.

15 Recruitment: We are currently recruiting for one Councillor to join the team, if you would like to put yourself forward, please email our Clerk Hannah.

Keevil CofE Primary School - Latest News

This month a number of village children experienced their first trip away from parents and carers with an exciting residential school trip.

Year four children from Keevil Primary School headed off to the Brecon Beacons, staying in the Danywenallt Youth Hostel and undertaking activities led by staff from the National Parks Authority. The activities centred around the wildlife and geography of the National Park. This included a treasure hunt, survival challenges, and a tough 4.5 mile hike (learning navigation skills along the way). Head teacher Lindsay Hermon praised the children's resilience. "The children met all of the challenges thrown at them with an incredible spirit. Through taking part in activities outdoors that challenge them to move outside of their comfort zone, we find that the children develop real resilience and self-belief, which translates into increased self-esteem and better learning behaviours back in school.

Book share library In other news, the school would like to invite the local community to make use of the school book share library. The book share is the result of an 'up-cycle' project by the school. The old rabbit hutch has been refurbished and weather-proofed and is now positioned on the corner of Church Lane, behind the railings. We would be grateful if donated books are current novels in good condition and modern children's books. <u>March Parish Council Meeting</u> Attendance - 7 Councillors, 5 members of public **Local Council Matters**

Cllr Reay was unable to attend the meeting and sent the following report:

Opportunities for Wiltshire-based businesses to supply goods and services to Wiltshire Council. The Council is holding two workshops that will explain how the council buys what it needs, allowing local businesses to get greater access to sell their goods, works, and services and encouraging businesses to bid for Wiltshire Council contracts. These are scheduled for 20 & 27th April. For further information please contact the procurement team at Wiltshire Council

Funding for Council Housing upgrade

Wiltshire Council secured ~£3.6m of Government funding, which will help increase the energy efficiency of existing housing in the county. It will be spent on retrofitting up to 210 Wiltshire homes by March 2025, supporting the council's ambition for the county to be carbon neutral by 2030. In 2021, the council secured ~£550,000, which was used to improve 90 of its least energy efficient council homes. This additional funding will allow the council to support retrofits for owner occupied and privately rented homes that are not connected to mains gas and are EPC band D-G subject to household income levels.

£2 single bus fare promotion has been extended until 30 June.

The promotion, which began on 1 January, has been very popular in Wiltshire, one bus operator in the county seeing more than 70,000 reduced-fare trips in the first month. The extended fare price reduction, which is aimed at getting more people to use buses during the current cost of living challenges, means that Wiltshire bus users can travel on most routes in the county for just £2 or less for a single fare.

Defibrillator Support Jamie Halliday and Phil Springate agreed to take on the weekly checks of the Defibrillator at the Brewery.

Row Lane Stile The land owner has repaired the stile and it has been used.

Items for Discussion from Members of the Parish

Surface Water in Seend High Street

An on-site survey was arranged overnight 28th March. Following this visit, arrangements were made to carry out an excavation in the highway to try to trace the source. The excavation, required permission of the Council Highways department for a road closure. The Clerk to write to Highways, Wessex Water and Cllr Reay to expedite matters.

Local Highways & Footpath Infrastructure Group (LHFIG) Seend Cleeve Northern Extension of 30mph speed limit

The extension of the existing 30mph speed envelope NE from Seend Cleeve to include the new affordable housing development (11 Dwellings) needs to be implemented before new residents arrive at the beginning of September. The Clerk to liaise with Cllr Reay to see if this item can be prioritised.

Bollands Hill Freight Assessment and Priority Mechanism (FAPM)

LHFIG responded to the Council's request for vehicle restrictions on Bollands Hill referring to the two alternative routes for large vehicles via either the A365 Sells Green and Seend or Melksham, A350 / A361. It was noted many of the larger vehicles were the same vehicles that were seen travelling through Worton, hence it might be appropriate for LHFIG to review both locations as a combined project.

The reply also detailed the Freight Assessment and Priority Mechanism (FAPM) process in some detail including the fact Bollands Hill has not been included in this process since 2016. For Bollands Hill to be considered for vehicle restrictions Highways would require a comprehensive study and survey.

Given the strength of opinion from local residents and recent damage to private property along this road, Councillors agreed this issue should remain on LHFIG's agenda. The Chairman/Clerk to request this at the next LHFIG meeting.

The Stocks Advanced Direction Signage (ADS)

The proposed Stocks upgrade comprises deployment of:

- A junction warning sign with a supplementary "reduce speed now" plate.
- A new nameplate

These signs will be placed east of the junction to Seend Cleeve. The Clerk to advise LHFIG that the Council supports their deployment and will fund the cost up to a maximum of £2,000 as detailed in their report.

Broad Lane, - The occupants of Cherry Tree Farm volunteered to remove items left on the verge in the vicinity of the farm and repair some potholes. Concerns were raised regarding the use and general state of the lane, verges and access to adjoining land. The Clerk to see if a meeting could be arranged with Wiltshire Council.

Rusty Lane- It was noted the new surface does not reach the lower end of Rusty Lane adjacent to the Canal. The path is puddled and muddy. The Clerk to request the Wiltshire Council Rights of Way and Countryside Team to revisit this part of the Lane with a view to extending the new surface to the end of the Lane.

Bradley Lane—Wiltshire Council Rights of Way Team have advised that they can assist with the surface upgrade of Bradley Lane. The expected cost is likely to be between £4-£5k. It was agreed the Parish Council would fund up to £5k towards the upgrade. The Clerk to advise the Wiltshire Council Rights of Way and Countryside Team.

Speedwatch Two volunteers have completed the necessary training. However, to operate the Speedwatch campaign, five trained volunteers are required. Training at Trowbridge Police Station has been suspended. On-Line Training has not proved to be an acceptable alternative solution hence the campaign will be delayed until a workable training scheme can be deployed.

The next LHFIG meeting is 18th April 2023. The Chairman and Clerk to attend. **Planning Applications** The Parish Council raised no objections to the following. **PL/2023/01320** - Elm Cottage, Seend Hill - Single storey extension to rear/side of property

PL/2023/01695 - Dormer Cottage, Seend Cleeve, Erection of garden room, associated facilities & raised deck area.

Devizes Area Board Pamela Akerman had previously circulated notes from the last meeting 6th March 2023. The key points are summarised below.

There is an ambition for Wiltshire to become carbon neutral by 2030. 45% of carbon emissions are from vehicle transport. To reduce this figure, it was proposed that residents could be encouraged to avoid unnecessary travel (e.g., working from home), change their mode of local travel (e.g., more cycling and bus use) and move towards more sustainable modes (e.g., electric vehicles). School travel contributes an additional 45% traffic in rush hour hence there is a need to focus on school travel plans such as 'Walking Buses' that have been implemented in some local communities.

Devizes Station Network Rail is undertaking a study with Wiltshire Council and other local partners, to investigate the infrastructure requirements of a potential station which is expected to be issued this spring.

Electric charging points There is only one point installed in Devizes and unfortunately it is not working. Devizes needs to plan for more charging points of sufficient capacity for new technologies.

The next Devizes Area Board meeting will take place on 19th June 2023

Items of Correspondence—Get to know your Village Day

The Community Centre is considering a "Getting to know your community evening" to encourage people to become involved with and support local village groups. Councillors agreed they would like to support this event. The Clerk to reply to the organiser.

Items for Note—Queens Green Canopy update

Parishioners have planted over 300 trees around the parish. A big thank you goes to all those involved especially Georgina A'Bear who agreed to act as the local collection point for the deliveries.

Councillor Vacancies A Vacancy can only be advertised <u>after</u> an existing Councillor has stood down. Wiltshire Council has to be notified of the Vacancy and they issue a formal notice that has to be displayed within the Parish for a period of 21 days. During this period if ten or more parishioners wish to request an election, they have to inform the Returning Officer at Wiltshire Council by the deadline given on the vacancy notice <u>not</u> the Clerk. The Returning Officer will advise the Parish Council if an election has been requested. If not, the Parish Council can fill the vacancy through co-option. The Parish Council has one vacancy advertisement outstanding and is awaiting confirmation from the Wiltshire Council Elections officer that it can proceed with a co-option after 30th March 2022.

Anita Heatley has formally announced her retirement. Wiltshire Council has advised that her vacancy will be advertised after her departure on 25th April 2023.

Wiltshire and Swindon My office is once again looking to help fund voluntary groups, organisations and charities that tackle major issues like anti-social behaviour, drug and alcohol related crimes and supporting young people.

Another example is Warminster and Westbury youth clubs which were forced to close during the lockdowns. The grant enabled the clubs to cover the costs of reopening in line with guidelines and to ensure they were Covid-safe.

NURTURE NATURE

Some of you early birds might listen to the Tweet of the Day at two minutes to six – just before the news. The Whitethroat's repetitive sweet toned



song can be heard from the hedgerows in the summer months, it can easily be confused with the Lesser Whitethroat. In 1969 this species, which winters in tropical and semi tropical Africa, also in Arabia and Pakistan, suffered a catastrophic collapse, which scientists have now connected to the start of warnings of changing climate patterns, i.e. that the planet was noticeably warming. The Whitethroat has made something of a recovery since then, so listen out for it on your walks.

Have readers noticed a sharp decline in the under appreciated wasp species populations, which play an important part in the insect world of the British Isles? So please don't swat them, leave them be and they won't hurt you unless threatened. Regarding our garden birds which appear to be ever more in decline according to recent surveys, please keep your moggies inside at sunset to protect foraging parent birds and fledglings and bats (eighteen species in the UK), another threatened species. And don't let your moggies out until well after dawn, as again this is a very vulnerable time for birds and their young.

We need trees, and trees now need our help more than ever before. Some of you will have noticed the devastation to our native ash trees as they have been widely felled in an



attempt to prevent the spread of ash dieback disease. Thanks to the Woodland Trust and the PC those of you who ordered tree whips for planting will now have them. However, they will need tender care and nurturing to get them established.

Anyone seen any hirundines yet, or heard a cuckoo?

Still keep feeding sites and bird baths clean to protect against avian flu.

<u>House Martins</u>: These lovely migrant birds fly from Africa to nest in the British Isles, many in our area. They spend a long time making their mud nests under the eaves of houses. Please be tolerant of their building habits. The birds do not cause too much mess and they become distressed if all their hard work is destroyed. If house martins cannot raise their broods, yet another species will be endangered.

<u>Swallows</u>: These beautiful birds always return to their old nest sites, so please ensure access to them. If, for reasons of security, access has to be shut, swallows will fly through small openings in order to reach their traditional nesting sites.

<u>Swifts</u>: Their nesting sites, some of which are centuries old, are fast disappearing, due to development and property maintenance. They require an access tunnel of at least 18" long with a small entrance hole; please don't block them off. Swifts are believed to spend as much as nine months to a year on the wing, and they are known to nap whilst flying.

Swift sightings can be reported to Bradford-on-Avon Swift Group at <u>climatechampions@gmail.com</u>, or <u>www.swift-conservation.org</u>.

Note: These birds are all, of course, protected species – it is a criminal offence to disturb or destroy their nest sites and environments. There was the distressing sight a few years ago when an active house martin nest had been wired over, preventing the juveniles from flying out, and they perished inside the wire.
