# The View from my window.....

One of the difficulties about writing an article for a magazine which is not going to be published for a little while is the problem of whatever is going to happen next.

As I write, the weather is on the change. It has been gloriously hot, and sitting in the garden in the shade has been the order of the day, and yet I know from the weather forecast that that is about to change with a vengeance.



Similarly, last week things were relatively quiet in the Middle East, but this week literally all hell has broken out, and by the time you read this who knows what will have happened. We clergy are supposed to come up with something clever and wise on such occasions, but for me my main reaction has been of horror and sadness about man's inhumanity to man. Whatever colour or creed we belong to it seems impossible that human beings can be so cruel and barbaric, and yet they can. Over the centuries, time after time war has broken out between different nations and people and lest we forget, the war in Ukraine is still raging, even though it has gone out of the headlines.

Of course, November is the month for remembering. All our villages will be holding remembrance services, and there will be great solemnity and reminders of the war dead of two world wars. We promised that we will remember them, and we will. Just last week I took a funeral service for a 92 year old man who served in the Korean war, and I remember him coming home, all those years ago, battle scarred and weary. Most of us had family members who served in the last war, and every year when I speak to the children who gather round the war memorials, I try to help them and encourage them by saying that we and they must all try to make the world a better place, so that it won't happen again; and yet fighting goes on, and the atrocities continue.

So what can we do? The most important thing is to pray for peace. It is an imperative. Whoever you pray to, it doesn't matter but we must pray for peace. Somehow we have to understand that in order that this world continues we must learn to live alongside one another. Whether Jew or Hindu or Muslim or Christian or none of these we have to reach out to each other. Ownership of land does not matter. Love matters. My understanding is that all the great faiths agree on that and I, as a Christian believe that that's what Jesus came to show us. The rest is icing on the cake. So, as we go into this season of remembering, I hope that we will all take time to think, and reflect. My father didn't put his life at risk in the RAF, in order that there would be more wars. My father wanted and dreamed of a peaceful life for his children, and your children. I will not blame anyone; my prayer today is for peace.

# <u>Monthly Parish Meeting – DRAFT Minutes Pending</u> offical approval at next meeting

Councillors met for the Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday the 20<sup>th</sup> of September 2023 at 7.30pm at the Bulkington Village Hall

**Present:** Philip Oakey (Chair), Alison Howard Evans, Alex Breach, Andrew Grabham, Carla Haslam, Tamara Reay, Eden Speller

Choose Chair and sign documents: Councillor Philip Oakey was voted in as Chair, proposed by Andrew Graham, seconded by Julie Anderson-Hill, with no objections. Andrew Grabham was elected as Vice Chair with a unanimous vote. The new Chair and Vice Chair both signed the declaration of Acceptance of Office.

1: Apologies for absence: Julie Anderson-Hill

2: To Record: There were no changes to the Register of Interests
Declaration of Interest in Agenda Items: Alex expressed his interest in Agenda
Item 6.

# 3: To Receive a report from Tamara Reay

- Wiltshire council has relaunched its tree warden scheme, to champion tree planting in the area. Wiltshire council is keen for villages to work with land owners and members of the community to plant trees.
- Wiltshire Council has secured another 10 million for a highways preventative program of resurfacing roads. The funds will be spent over a 2 year window, with the work commencing in the spring once the weather is more favorable.
- Wiltshire Council have established that 30% of what goes into landfill skips could be recycled. To help reduce this, the Household Recycling Centre at Hopton will be leading with a trial system consisting of a pre-sort area for refuse where Recycling Centre users will have the opportunity to sort through their rubbish and receive guidance.

Wessex water is doing work in Devizes to replace Victorian sewers – they are currently in the first phase and there is a plan in place to try and minimize the impact on journeys and local businesses. Please plan ahead when travelling into Devizes and continue to use these local businesses to support them.

**4: Local Police Report:** Awaiting August/September update.

Our PCSOs have highlighted the importance of reporting all break-ins and suspicious activity - as the police force is understaffed they are working off the data gathered through reports and will spend more time in the town centres unless something happens in the smaller villages.

- In an emergency, or if you need urgent police assistance, you should always dial 999. You can also report suspicious activity by contacting the police in confidence on 0800 789 321.
- The police advise that an active Neighbourhood Watch scheme is also a good deterrent to crime. If there is any appetite for re-instating the Neighbourhood watch scheme in Bulkington and there are active volunteers to run it, the Parish Council can assist you in forming a group.

# 5: Open Forum: Eden Speller

- Tree Planting: In our July meeting, Eden Speller's proposal from the Woodland Creation Funding was discussed and he attended the Parish Council meeting to discuss this in person. Eden took the councillors through a presentation outlining some of the Councils options regarding obtaining funding for tree planting. Once planted, the funding includes 15 years of maintenance payments.
- The below options were discussed:

Acquisition/lease of Wiltshire Council land in Mill Lane

Planting of verge/hedgerow trees to create a 'gateway avenue' into the village Planting of 'parkland trees' in the Rec (can be incorporated in hedge-line and appropriate locations in field so not to reduce/impact upon the amenity)

- Eden advised the Councillors to have a think about the options and decide how and if to take the project forward.
- Next steps would be that Eden would get a representative from Wiltshire council to evaluate the sites and finalise a plan that councillors feel is best suited for the parish. The paper work and bureaucracy would be completed by Wiltshire Council and the Woodland Creation Funding team. The Parish Council team would then be given funding and some guidance on the purchase, planting and care for the trees. Planting would ideally take place before March to work with the trees dormant season.

#### 9: Recreational Ground:

- Area Board funding has now arrived in the Rec Ground accounts
- The ROSPA inspection is due to take place in September, the report is expected in October
- The £5984.71 including VAT approved under agenda item 8 will be spent on a new play house with seating and a trim trail. The old playhouse will remain on the playing field but has had its doors removed to make it less of a hazard for children's fingers. There is currently a 6-8 week lead time on orders.
- A village tidy up session was suggested for some garden work in the rec on the 14<sup>th</sup> of October 11-2pm. All welcome, refreshments provided, please bring any garden equipment you have.
- The Rec Committee is working on proposals for a swing replacement, basket swing and accessible gate to present at next meeting as well as woodland funding suggestions.

**10: Parish Steward:** Outstanding jobs to be sent to The Clerk prior to next visit. The last scheduled visit was September 11<sup>th</sup> and the next visit is scheduled for the 9<sup>th</sup> of October. Councillors raised that grass verges across the village along the Highstreet need doing. Councillors requested a sweeper attend the village as they are concerned that historic curbstones will otherwise be damaged. A sweeper early autumn could also help with flood prevention before all the leaves come down and block drains.

11: Recruitment: We are currently recruiting for one Councillor to join the team, if you would like to put yourself forward, please email our Clerk Hannah.

**12:** Emergency Team updates: Alison has updated the Emergency Plan and invited comments from Councillors. Councillors praised Alison's work. If you are willing to be a named person in the emergency plan please contact our Clerk.

13: Defibrillator: Philip updated that the handover from Simon Downey is now complete. The team would like to thank Simon for looking after it while on the council and for completing the repairs before handing over. Simon has purchased the replacement parts required for the Defibrillator and has installed them prior to the handover. Philip plans to keep a log and to monitor the Defibrillator regularly.

**14: Fireworks:** Traditionally Bulkington hosts a large Fireworks display event – councillors discussed the viability of a 2023 event. It was agreed that due to lack of volunteers it is not possible to run the event this year. All voiced the desire to hold an event next year and for the planning to be started in Spring.

The Parish Council are looking for volunteers for the 2024 event for help with cooking, clear up, ticket collection, marshalling and fire lighting. Without volunteers this event will not be able to go ahead.

# 15: Remembrance day:

Councillors discussed plans for the 12<sup>th</sup> of November.

#### 16: AOB:

• The Bulkington.org.uk website domain name registration was purchased by the Parish Council in November 2013 but is due to expire on 19 November this year.

- Faded 30 sign by Breach farm has been reported and Wiltshire Council have scheduled the replacement
- Wiltshire Police HQ Neighbourhood watch AGM: Saturday 7th October 2023, 10.00am until midday.
- Request from Councillor for cost approvals for minor sums to be approved in between meetings via email. It was agreed to raise the Clerks pre–approved limit to £100 and that extraordinary sums spent in between meetings can be approved via email by councillors (for example if the defib needs urgent fixing).
- The work on the drop curbs that were planned for August 23 have been delayed
- Councillors discussed reviewing job roles as the next meeting.

December meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> December to be brought forward to 13<sup>th</sup> to avoid pre-Christmas rush.



# **September PC meeting**

Attendance - 8 Councillors, Cllr Reay, Clerk & 5 parishioners

#### **Local Council Matters**

Cllr Reay provided the following update:

**Highways** - Wiltshire Council has been able to provide an additional £10m over two years for highways preventative measures. Work is currently being planned ready for Spring 2024 and will focus on priority routes

Wiltshire's Local Plan - Wiltshire's Local Plan review goes live on 27<sup>th</sup> September. The Plan will shape our county until 2038 and is available via a portal on Wiltshire Council Website. Under the current plan Seend is currently treated as a 'large' village with the parish other settlements not included. Councillors agreed that Seend Parish should be treated as a whole in that the number of houses required for both Seend village and its Settlements (Seend Head, Seend Row, The Stocks, Seend Cleeve, Sells Green and Martinslade) should be added together to give a figure for the whole Parish.

Members of the Planning Subcommittee are to make a representation to Wiltshire Council.

**Tree Wardens Scheme -** Following a successful bid for almost £300,000 from a government fund, Wiltshire Council is re-launching the national Tree Warden scheme.

The Tree Warden Scheme is a national initiative led by the Tree Council, and Wiltshire Council is looking to recruit volunteer Tree Wardens in each Wiltshire town and parish area. Tree Wardens will work with Wiltshire Council Woodland Officers and act as local tree champions who help plant, promote and protect trees in appropriate locations in their local area.

Projects that Tree Wardens can be involved in may include:

Arranging local tree planting days

Watering and caring for local trees

Working with community groups to plant and care for street trees

Rejuvenating local woodlands

Raising funds and finding land for tree planting projects

Going into local schools to talk about the value of trees

#### **Matters Arising**

**On-Line Banking:** The Clerk has looked at options for the Council to move to online banking. Several local parishes have elected to move to Unity Trust as they are more focussed on the public sector and local councils. Atworth Parish Council has recently moved to Unity trust and are really pleased with their service. The Clerk has been offered a demonstration. However, there is a monthly charge of £6.

Lloyds Treasurers accounts are to remain free (for now) and would require all signatories to sign up for Lloyds on-line banking. Signatories would require access to the Lloyds banking webpage from their own device. This to be an agenda item for the November meeting.

# **Local Highways & Footpath Infrastructure Group (LHFIG)**

**The Bell Crossroads / Bollands Hill:** Tamara Reay raised the need for a review of the junction layout and infrastructure at the Bell Crossroads along with a review of traffic management on Bollands Hill. A face-face meeting is being arranged with representatives of Wiltshire Highways and the Parish Council.

Tamara met with members of the Horse-Riding Community to see what steps could be taken by Wiltshire Council to help improve horse rider road safety.

**Bradley Lane & Rusty Lane:** Cllr Reay agreed to continue to chase the Rights-of-Way Team for an early engagement.

The next LHFIG meeting is confirmed as being Wednesday 18th October 2023.

#### **Planning Applications**

The Parish Council raised no objections to the following applications:

PL/2023/07372 - The Bell Inn, Seend - Variation of condition on PL/2022/07574 to allow for design changes.

PL/2023/07690 – 21 The Lye, Seend, Proposed Rear Extension.

PL/2023/07617 - Ridgeway, Row Lane, Seend - Replace septic tank with new sewage treatment plant in different location.

#### **Devizes Area Board**

Wiltshire police are making progress with local priorities including increasing police visibility in villages. Police are available to support community Speedwatch teams. PCC, Philip Wilkinson, reported they are doubling the team to support rural crime and focusing on hare coursing, burglaries and speed enforcement activities. Chief Constable, Catherine Roper, reported on progress with the three priorities as actions in response to Wiltshire police being placed in 'special measures' in 2022.

Seend Tennis Club was successful in its bid for an Area Board Grant to resurface the courts. Up to £5k was approved with £3k to be paid now, the remainder at the yearend if sufficient grant funding is available.

Then next Area Board meeting is 20<sup>th</sup> November at 6.30pm.

# **Items of Correspondence**

Church Wall: Len Murray gave a presentation regarding the collapse of the church wall and the need for its repair. Historic ownership of the wall is unclear and hence it is not insured by either the church or the owner of the adjoining property. This needs to be resolved before the church can consider contributing towards the rebuild. The church and the owner of the adjoining property to establish legal ownership and the associated responsibility of ongoing maintenance.

Local Rights of Way: Correspondence has been received from a local landowner regarding the use of the footpaths on his land. Costs associated with any move of rights of way are the responsibility of the land owner not the Parish Council.

The Parish Council agreed to place a notice in Spotlight regarding the importance of footpath users not deviating from the formal route of the footpath.

Wiltshire and Swindon Wiltshire's Police and Crime Commissioner, Philip Wilkinson, has joined with his counterparts in the south-west to lead a new campaign and bring together all police forces in the region to combat the involvement of Organised Crime Groups (OCGs) in rural crime.

Under the new initiative known as Operation Ragwort, the OCGs who target rural communities and are at the forefront of crimes such as burglary, the theft of farm

vehicles and equipment, poaching and hare coursing, will be the focus of a regional, co-ordinated, campaign led by the south-west region's Police and Crime Commissioners.

Mr Wilkinson said Ragwort - with mutual support and cooperation across the southwest - will provide an intelligence rich picture of the level of criminality enabling forces to better disrupt and apprehend those responsible, making Wiltshire safer for rural residents.

As the south-west's response to serious, organised, acquisitive crimes and rural crime, the operation will utilise and coordinate intelligence from our smallest communities through to local policing areas and across to other force areas and national and international borders.

The National Rural Crime Network has commissioned research into the link between rural crime and organised criminal gangs, and preliminary evidence suggests that rural crime is being used by gangs to fund other criminal activities including links to the international drugs trade.

With this in mind, Operation Ragwort hopes to build upon the successful partnership work in the south-west which is being done to disrupt the illegal drugs in the region, which was launched in 2021 as Operation Scorpion.

Assistant Chief Constable Mark Cooper is leading the operation: "Rural communities are all too often victims of opportunist theft yet, over recent years, there has been a distinct shift towards Organised Crime Groups moving in to steal high value items such as vehicles and electronics. By working across our borders in a clear and supportive way to share intelligence, Operation Ragwort provides the framework to make this happen and bring offenders to justice."

If you are fortunate enough to catch up with Gary Reason he will, over his favourite beverage, tell you all about his recent epic cycle from one end of America to the other in aid of Wiltshire Air Ambulance, some 2000 miles. Congratulations Gary!

SHORT MAT BOWLS: Whilst cricket is going to feature in the Olympics in 2028 for the first time since the Paris Olympics of 1900 when Great Britain beat France in the final by 158 runs, sadly SMB did not make it through as one of the additional sports for the Los Angeles games. I am hopeful that the Olympic committee will look more kindly on Colin and the boys in 2036 and indeed with that positive approach Colin tells me that the training programme he has devised will be even more intense over the next decade. #### **NURTURE NATURE**

Remember, Remember the Birds in November, Cock Robin, Blackbird, Charlie Chaff, Great Tit, Doddy Dunnock - they all need feeding to see them through Winter. 'Gunpowder, Treason and Plot' – not a very good comparison perhaps, but the latter 'plot' could maybe refer to the felling of the iconic Sycamore Gap Tree standing sentinel above the Whin Sill escarpment along Hadrian's Wall in Northumberland. Reminder of Sheksangara's name in 'As You Like It' and Thomas Hardy's D



Shakespeare's poem in 'As You Like It' and Thomas Hardy's Dorset novel 'Under the Greenwood Tree' flash into the memory. No longer will courtship rituals and promises of marriages be made under its protective branches. Gone is the shade for walkers resting along the Way, a site for family picnics and a backdrop for family photographs. This tree, this historic landmark was believed to be 300 years old and there are plans to replace it.

It should ring a bell of alarm in our own parishes and provide an opportunity to do a survey of the trees in our area to ensure that such treasures of nature are properly protected with TPOs (Tree Preservation Orders). Since 1972 the Woodland Trust has planted over fifty five million trees in our countryside and saved and protected nearly 1200 acres of threatened woods. It is now the season to plant young trees. Plant a tree in your garden or neighbourhood to remember someone dearly departed, or an important family event, Larger estate owners could consider planting oaks. Due to changing climate patterns and associated reasons (e.g. the Oak Lace Bug is one) oaks are in decline in our counties. The good old English Oak is host to nearly 400 insects of one species or another, a wonderful food source for birds and bats.

By the way, still keep a sharp lookout for the devastating Asian Hornet, which has reached our shores (first reported in 2004) and is causing damage in parts of Europe. It reportedly can kill people (very rarely), wipe out bee colonies and ruin fruit harvests. It has a distinctive orange head, a yellow striped abdomen and is smaller than our native hornet. Sightings and nests should be reported to DEFRA.

From now on look out for the mesmerizing display of starling murmurations just before they drop down to their roosts – there will be local information on the internet. Thousands and thousands of birds moving as one as if choreographed for a spectacular modern ballet. On 21<sup>st</sup> September in a speech addressing the French Parliament in Paris King Charles repeated his warnings about the catastrophic destruction of Nature worldwide. As well as focusing on our loss and decline of habitats and species it is a reminder that it is happening worldwide as human populations grow and expand across the Globe, natural disasters increase, temperatures rise, wild fires proliferate, storms, floods, mudslides and earthquakes obliterate and sun spot activity increases. All these and other factors adversely affect patterns of bird migrations – the 'super highways' in the sky. These are age old routes navigated by hundreds of millions of birds annually between non breeding and breeding areas of the world. One of these routes is the East-Asian Australian flyway. It is estimated that 50 million water birds of over 600 species use this route connecting 37

However, it is also one of the most endangered of the migratory routes used by several globally threatened, high profile migrating birds, such as the Spoon Billed Sandpiper (the Spoonie). An added danger for all migrating species are the many armed conflicts in at least five continents. No doubt some learned institutions will be researching the effects of such wars on animal populations of all kinds.



Some readers have remarked again on not hearing a cuckoo this year. Find out more on <a href="www.bto.org/cuckoo-clocks">www.bto.org/cuckoo-clocks</a>. The BTO reports that there have been changes in migrant bird patterns, due to habitat loss and climate irregularities.

Finally, a reminder that most animal species can be adversely affected by fireworks, so please ensure they are not endangered by such. Hedgehogs appear to have had a good year judging by the number of reported sightings from readers. So, another PLEA, check for hedgehogs in your bonfire piles in daylight before lighting them. Remember, Remember the Fifth of November, Gunpowder, Treason and HEDGEHOGS!

Let us all cooperate and stand together to support conservation and our endangered environments.
