#### PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

**Local Footpath Notice:** The Parish Council has received concerns from two landowners who own land between the footpath that links School Road to the Stile at Bollands Hill and the footpath linking Bollands Hill to Bradley Lane. Walkers are reminded they must stick to the footpaths and not take shortcuts from one footpath to the other without going all the way to the Stile on Bollands Hill.

Users of the footpath that links Bradley Lane to Rusty Lane have tended to walk to the west of the designated footpath route. Walkers are reminded that to avoid trespass they must follow the designated line of the footpath.

Dogs must be kept under control and on a lead when requested by the landowner. Dog waste must be collected and taken away.

Wiltshire Bobby Van Trust: On 2nd May 2017, WBVT, working in partnership with Wiltshire Police, launched a bespoke Online Safety Initiative – Stay Safe Online. The service is free to those people who are over 60 or 18+ with a registered disability. Trained Stay Safe Online Volunteers provide improved digital security awareness, scam prevention advice, support and reassurance; basic practical skills for checking and understanding digital privacy settings; and signpost people to future sources of advice and resources. The service offers one-to-one home visits and community group talks and is managed by a dedicated Stay Safe Online Coordinator

# Maureen's Ramblings.....

Looking in my diary for an idea for this month's Ramblings I see that it is Thanksgiving Day in Canada (9<sup>th</sup>) and I am leading an assembly at Keevil School (11<sup>th</sup>) on the theme of "Thankfulness". Yes! A good start for my reflections and a good reminder for those (many) times when I don't always feel thankful! The Theasurus gave me lots of words for thankfulness – to be contented, at ease, satisfied, grateful. Being grateful! I like that. But can I grateful when my life gets tinged with sadness, anxiety or pain?

And why be grateful? There's lots of research online showing that gratitude is strongly associated with greater happiness and helps people feel more positive emotions, relish good experiences, improve their health, deal with adversity, and build strong relationships. A study of couples found that individuals who took time to express gratitude for their partner not only felt more positive toward the other person but also more comfortable expressing concerns about their relationship. And, managers who remember to say "thank you" to people who work for them found that those employees feel motivated to work harder. I could go on.....!

I suppose that gratitude is a way for me to appreciate what I have instead of always reaching for something new in the hopes it will make me happier or thinking I can't feel satisfied until every physical and material need is met. Gratitude helps me refocus on what I have instead of what I lack. So what can I do to cultivate gratitude on a regular basis? I can be aware and maybe write a thank-you note expressing my appreciation of a person's impact on my life. And, once in a while, I can write one to myself! Maybe, each morning, find something to be thankful about. Well at least I'm breathing!! And, end the day with a review of all that has been good and to offer to God the things that are not so good. There was an old chorus I used to sing: "Count your blessings, name them one by one; count your blessings, see what God hath done". If I look, I can see so many good and beautiful things about my life. Maybe I should sit down and write them down so that I have a reminder to read when I am struggling to feel thankful.

The Bible encourages me to be thankful. "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; for his love endures forever!"; "Come, let us sing to the Lord! Let us come before his presence with thanksgiving"; "Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice!". And that lovely hymn: "Now thank we all our God, with heart and hands and voices, who wondrous things has done, in whom this world rejoices; who from our mothers' arms has blessed us on our way with countless gifts of love…". OK – I have shared some rambling thoughts with you – now I need to live them out!

# **Monthly Parish Meeting – DRAFT**

# Minutes Pending offical approval at next meeting

Councilors met for the Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> of July 2023 at 7.30pm at the Bulkington Village Hall

Present: Julie (Chair), Philip, Alison and Alex

Agenda Item

- 1) **Apologies for absence:** Carla Haslam, Andrew Grabham and Tamara Reay
- 2) To Record:
  - There were no changes to the Register of Interests
  - Declaration of Interest in Agenda Items: Alex expressed his interest in Agenda Item 6
  - New Councillor Philip Oakey was voted onto the team with a unanimous vote
  - Chair Julie signed declaration of Acceptance of Office
- 3) **To Receive a report:** Tamara Reay sent her report in advance of the meeting:

<u>Local Plan Review:</u> At Full Council on Tuesday 18 July, Wiltshire Council considered the review of the Wiltshire Local Plan, as this important document approaches the final stages. The Plan will set out the vision and framework for housing, infrastructure and land for employment growth for the next 15 years. Once adopted, all planning

applications will be determined against the Plan, making it the most important placeshaping document for Wiltshire.

It also identifies sites for housing and employment development until 2038. Following work to assess the number of homes needed, the number of planned homes in the Plan has been significantly reduced. When the Plan was consulted on in 2021, it proposed 45,630 homes over 20 years to 2036, but the updated Plan that Cabinet will consider proposes 36,740 homes, of which over 21,900 homes have already been built or are committed. The local plan update now requires 40% of all new housing on developments of 10 homes or more to be affordable. Greater flexibility has been added to rural exception sites to make it easier to provide affordable housing in villages where there is clearly identified demand, but those developments will still need to be proportionate to the size of a village. Bulkington is considered a small village in the Local Plan and so there is no specific new housing allocation for Bulkington.

The proposed Plan also sets out ambitious sustainability policies, as new developments will have to meet zero carbon standards, including energy generation such as solar panels. Biodiversity will improve too, as the policies set out a 20% net gain for all new developments, compared to the 10% legal requirement. All new developments must also have cycling and walking connections.

Also attached is a summary of rural housing numbers.

Solar Together: Wiltshire Council and Swindon Borough Council are working with iChoosr, independent experts in group-buying, to launch a second Solar Together scheme, following the success of the first in 2022. Since the first round of the scheme launched in May 2022, over 1,500 homeowners across Wiltshire and Swindon have installed over 8,500 solar panels and 720 storage batteries. Solar Together makes the switch to clean energy as hassle-free as possible. The scheme supports people by providing clear, objective information so that people can make a well-informed decision and receive expert guidance. The initiative offers solar panels with optional battery storage and electric vehicle charge points.

(The deadline for registrations in Wiltshire and Swindon was 11 August 2023.)

Local Cycling & Walking Plan: People in Wiltshire are being asked for their views on cycling and walking plans in Chippenham, Devizes and Trowbridge. The three Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plans (LCWIPs) set out proposals for cycling and walking networks in each town, and highlight how these networks will be improved and connected to make it easier and safer to walk and cycle in the towns.

The aim is to deliver infrastructure that will enable and encourage more trips to be made on foot or by bike, and help to improve air quality, reduce traffic congestion and cut carbon emissions. They will also be used to inform the planning process where relevant, and future funding from the Department for Transport for active travel schemes will be linked to the walking and cycling schemes. The council has already consulted on the draft county-wide Wiltshire LCWIPs and a Salisbury LCWIP.

In the future the council intends to develop LCWIPs for Amesbury, Bradford on Avon, Calne, Corsham, Malmesbury, Marlborough, Melksham, Royal Wootton Bassett,

Tidworth, Warminster and Westbury. *The consultation on these three LCWIPs ended on 31 July*). See: www.wiltshire.gov.uk/transport-town-cycle-networks.

**All About Potholes:** Potholes remain a key focus for Wiltshire Council's Highways Team - a webinar was held a few weeks ago which enabled people to find out how potholes are inspected, prioritised and filled throughout the county, as well as information on long-term maintenance schedules and resurfacing. 10) William Breach Playground: The works on the path and new pergola are now complete and the space has been reopened. The funds obtained through the Area Board Grant are due to come into the account this month and take up to 28 days to clear, the go ahead can then be given for the building of the new Trim Trail to be placed to the left of the path. # SEEND PARISH COUNCIL JULY PC MEETING

Attendance - 8 Councillors,

**Local Council Matters:** Cllr Reay provided the following update:

Local Plan Review: At Full Council on Tuesday 18 July, Wiltshire Council considered the review of the Wiltshire Local Plan as this important document approaches the final stages towards adoption. The Plan will set out the vision and framework for housing, infrastructure and land for employment growth for the next 15 years. Once adopted, all planning applications will be determined against the Plan, making it the most important place-shaping document for Wiltshire.

It also identifies sites for housing and employment development until 2038. Following work to assess the number of homes needed, the number of planned homes in the Plan has been significantly reduced. When the Plan was consulted on in 2021, it proposed 45,630 homes over 20 years to 2036, but the updated Plan proposes 36,740 homes, of which over 21,900 homes have already been built or are committed. The proposed Plan also sets out ambitious sustainability policies, as new developments will have to meet zero carbon standards, including energy generation such as solar panels. Biodiversity will improve as the policies set out a 20% net gain for all new developments, compared to the 10% legal requirement. All new developments must also have cycling and walking connections.

Under the new Wiltshire Local Plan, Seend is classed as a large village and as such may be potentially tasked to provide an additional 23 houses by 2038. Cllr Reay has offered to review/unpick the Plan to which the Parish Council agreed. As Phil Springate is the Neighbourhood Plan Coordinator, he agreed to be the primary contact for this.

Local Cycling & Walking Plan: People in Wiltshire are being asked for their views on cycling and walking plans in Chippenham, Devizes and Trowbridge. The three Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plans (LCWIPs) set out proposals for cycling and walking networks in each town, and highlight how these networks will be improved and connected to make it easier and safer to walk and cycle in the towns. The aim of the LCWIPs is to deliver infrastructure that will enable and encourage more trips to be made on foot or by bike, and help to improve air quality, reduce traffic congestion and cut carbon emissions. They will also be used to inform the planning process where relevant, and future funding from the Department for Transport for active travel schemes will be linked to the walking and cycling schemes in each area.

#### **Matters Arising**

**Tennis Club:** It was noted the Tennis Club is a private members organisation and therefore the Parish Council is unable to make a donation towards the repair of the facilities. However, should the club be able to offer some free open sessions available to the whole community, the Parish Council would review its position.

**Damage to Swing Bridge by Giles Wood:** Phil Springate contacted Sargent Gemma Rutter regarding the damage to the Bridge. This is being treated as a criminal act and the police are investigating.

# **Local Highways & Footpath Infrastructure Group (LHFIG)**

**Bollands Hill :** The Parish Council was saddened to hear about the fatal accident that occurred on Sunday 9<sup>th</sup> July. The Parish Council would like to express its sorrow and sympathy to the families of both parties. The Parish Council understands that the accident is subject to a full investigation by Wiltshire Police, and a Coroner's Inquest.

**The Bell Crossroads:** LHFIG are scheduling the imminent deployment of additional signage/infrastructure.

The Stocks Advanced Direction Signage (ADS): New signage has been deployed at The Stocks.

**Bradley Lane & Rusty Lane:** Cllr Reay has identified a new contact point for the Parish Council and the Clerk has forwarded the Parish Council's request for the upgrade works. The next LHFIG meeting is confirmed as being *Wednesday* 18<sup>th</sup> October 2023. The Chairman to attend.

The Local Plan sets out the vision and framework for housing, infrastructure and land for employment growth for the next 15 years. All planning applications will be determined against the plan, making it the most important place-shaping document for Wiltshire.

The consultation begins on Wednesday 27 September and ends at 23:59 on Wednesday 22 November. From a housing perspective Seend is currently being treated as a large village with the other settlements such as Sells Green being treated separately. Councillors agreed that from a housing perspective, Seend Parish should be treated as a whole in that the number of houses required for both Seend village and its settlements (Seend Head, Seend Row, The Stocks, Seend Cleeve, Sells Green and Martinslade) should be added together to give

a figure for the whole Parish. The Clerk to place Local Plan Consultation posters on the parish notice boards.

**Recycling Centre Pilots :** It is estimated that  $\sim 30\%$  of items being placed in Residual Waste could be recycled. Devizes & Warminster Recycling Centres are piloting a trail whereby vehicles unloading waste are inspected to check that recycling is being deposited in the correct containers.

**Wessex Water:** Major water pipe replacement commences in Devizes from 4<sup>th</sup> September for 6 months. It is expected there will be increased local traffic diverting through adjacent villages to avoid Devizes.

#### **Matters Arising**

Canal & River Trust (CRT) Removal of Dog Waste Bins: The CRT has removed dog waste bins from the Kennet & Avon Canal. It was noted two waste bins (Seend Cleeve & Spout Lane) were adjacent to CRT Waste Collection facilities so dog waste could be placed in those bins. The Clerk advised CRT that if these bins were removed then it was likely that dog waste could end up in their waste facilities. CRT did not raise an objection. The bin at Bollands Hill Lock does not have an adjacent CRT waste facility. However, there is a Wiltshire Council litter bin adjacent to the bridge on the road at Bollands Hill. A Councillor raised this issue along with the apparent lack of vessel licence enforcement with our local MP (Danny Kruger). Cllr Reay requested a copy of the Canal & River Trust correspondence on these issues.

# **Local Highways & Footpath Infrastructure Group (LHFIG)**

The Bell Crossroads / Bollands Hill: Dropped curbs and pedestrian marker posts have been installed across Bell Hill and Bollands Hill. Three accidents were recorded at this junction between 29<sup>th</sup> July & 4<sup>th</sup> August along with a fatality on Bollands Hill 9<sup>th</sup> July and Coach Collision 14<sup>th</sup> July. The Clerk has written to Tamara Reay expressing the need for a further review of the junction layout and infrastructure at the Bell Crossroads along with a review of traffic management on Bollands Hill. Cllr Reay agreed to pursue this within Wiltshire Council.

**Bradley Lane & Rusty Lane:** The Parish Council is keen to progress the work on surface upgrades and completion. Cllr Reay agreed to continue to chase the department involved with this project for an early engagement.

The next LHFIG meeting is confirmed as being Wednesday 18<sup>th</sup> October 2023.

#### **Items of Correspondence**

**RBL Wreath:** Jamie Halliday agreed to lay the Royal British Legion wreath at the War Memorial Remembrance Service on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> November.

**Turnpike on A361 Keevil/Bulkington Junction:** The owners of the disused Keevil Turnpike building applied for Planning Permission for a worker's dwelling at Woodhouse Farm, for the reasons listed with that application PL/2023/05095. The Parish Council agreed the owners should work with Wiltshire Council to demolish it and create a safer road junction.

**Seend Tennis Club:** The Tennis Club will make the new courts available to non-members who are Parish residents on a limited basis during daylight. The Parish Council therefore agreed it could make a donation of £3000.00 towards the repair of the courts.

**Parish Council Co-option:** A parishioner has contacted the Parish Council about the number of Councillors who currently serve on Seend Parish Council. The parishioner indicated they would like to see a change to the number of Councillors and enquired as to how Councillors are co-opted. A reply was sent saying that the number of Councillors is set by Wiltshire Council along with the electoral process for filling a casual vacancy.

Bollands Hill Hedges: Given the recent fatality in the vicinity of Bollands Hill, the Parish Council contacted Wiltshire Highways and from a road safety perspective asked if the mobile team with appropriate traffic management could undertake the work. The request was declined and Wiltshire Highways wrote to the landowners advising them of their responsibilities. One of the land owners contacted a Councillor, who having raised this issue of the hedge overgrowth at the previous meeting was concerned about a potential conflict of interest. Following discussion, Councillors agreed that as residents had not been given advice as to how the work should be undertaken there was no conflict of interest.

**War Memorial:** Correspondence has been received by the Parish Council confirming the War Memorial has been added to the List of Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest. The building is now listed at Grade II.

Allotment Review: The Parish Council needs to review the allotment rents on an annual basis. Rents were last changed in November 2019. The Parish Council currently charges £65 for Double plot, £35 for a Single and £17.50 for ½ plot. The Parish Council agreed the price of a single plot be increased by £2.50. (Other plot sizes will be proportionally adjusted) for tenancy renewals commencing 1<sup>st</sup> October 2024.

Finance: Bank Reconciliation to end of April 2023 came to: £38,109.91

# **NEWS FROM WILTSHIRE COUNCIL**

£10m extra to improve our roads: Residents and Parish Councils across Devizes Rural West tell me regularly that the maintenance of our roads is one of the top priorities. I'm really pleased therefore that an extra £10m has been secured for preventative highways work. The extra funding, which is on top of the £14m the council will spend this financial year on highways maintenance, is being funded through the council's capital funding programme. The additional money will be spent on preventative maintenance and a road resurfacing programme including small, local repairs to the highways; verge repairs on rural roads and materials support to volunteers working on public rights of way. Work on potholes will continue, with £2m of existing funds and the government's £3.6m additional grant. The preventative investment will reduce the number of potholes forming on the road network, mitigate the risk of further deterioration; improve road safety across the county for all road users; improve customer satisfaction and reduce the number of highway defect reports to the council, which will save officer time by reducing the number of ad-hoc inspections required and expensive reactive works.

This funding allocation has been made following the first formal update of the 2023/24 financial year. At the end of the first quarter there is a forecast overspend of around £0.3m which equates to less than 0.1% of the budget. More than £26m of savings were identified to be made during 2023/24 and, at the end of the first quarter, more than £6.2m has already been achieved (around 24%) with a further £15.7m on track to be delivered (around 60%). This ensures that the council can deliver core services such as children's and adult social care, and focus on the local issues such as roads. By contrast, the list of local authorities up and down the country which are at risk of bankruptcy, is growing. The programme of additional highways work will begin with identifying the roads due to be resurfaced and give Area Boards the opportunity to comment before the work programme begins in earnest from April 2024 until the end of 2025. Meanwhile please do continue to use My Wilts to report concerns.

# **NURTURE NATURE**

Forests and woodlands are the roots of our nation, and we need to cherish and protect them and increase their acreage more than ever. A recent report stated that the UK was well down in the list of countries supporting nature. This comes as quite a shock to many of us. Cats and their impact on our native birds – the University of Exeter is conducting excellent research on the impact of cat predation on songbird numbers, which will assist cat owners to reduce their moggies' hunting behaviour with simple solutions. Such actions will help to save tens of thousands of songbirds across the landscape of the British Isles, and in our gardens and wild spaces. (For further info see www.songbird-survival.org.uk). Readers – be early birds yourselves and listen to Tweet of the Day just before the 6 a.m. News on Radio 4. You will learn a lot of interesting information about our birds and species around the world generally. Autumn is the best time of year to plant trees and shrubs. Some of the bee magnet plants are abelia grandiflora, the sarcococcas, honeysuckles, including the winter flowering Lonicera fragrantissima, mahonias and sedums. As a follow up to an earlier article on swifts – developers, house builders and house owners can provide help to halt the sharp decline of this extraordinary species by incorporating 'swift bricks' into new builds/extensions etc. Details can be found on the Internet. A few years ago one house holder had just made the final touches to a swift brick he had installed in the side of his house at a suitable height and aspect, and had hardly reached the ground off the ladder when an adult swift swept into this artificial nesting site and successfully bred. What a joy! One can also get nest boxes for house martins to be attached under the eaves of houses and other buildings. There are also swallow nests available for erecting in barns, stables and outhouses, even lean-tos. For further information on hirundinidae see April editions. A recent reader response to hedgehog sightings and diets is that it's best not to feed mealworms. So a trawl of the scientific research is on the menu. Proprietary hedgehog food and dog and cat food are recommended by hedgehog sanctuaries. However, it's wise not to leave food out overnight as this could encourage unwanted vermin. Another interesting response about birds and chimneys and flues was that on clearing out a blocked off fireplace during a house renovation the number of dead birds found at the bottom was staggering. So please consider having cowls fitted to your chimney pots and flues – cowls with sufficient close meshed wire around them to prevent birds from accessing stacks and flues, which should they succeed – will almost certainly lead to their demise. We are again in the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness and spiders' webs are works of art. Please try not to destroy them or kill spiders in the house by vacuuming etc as they do so much good.


