

#### ANNE SALTER

We are sad to report that Anne Salter died on November 23<sup>rd</sup>, aged 93. As well as having a long career in nursing, she had been a life-long stalwart of village life, deeply involved in the Girl Guides, the Methodist Chapel and a long and active spell on the Parish Council. It was good to see her extended family and friends from the village at a quiet ceremony in Bromham Methodist Chapel.

# LYE FIELD - RIGHT OF WAY DISPUTE

As a number of you in the village will know, for many years, the Trustees of the Lye Field have been fighting a legal battle over a right of way dispute with the owner (Mr J MacDonald)

of the field on the northern boundary of the Lye Field.

The matter was to go before the courts at the end of Jan 2024, however, I am very happy to report that a settlement has finally been reached between the two parties. The matter could have been resolved in our favour through the courts, but we have been advised by our legal team that going to court always has some risk – however strong our case – and the costs would have increased dramatically. A settlement was the best solution.

Under the terms of the settlement, the 1967 right of way will be removed from the Land Registry, thereby eliminating any chance that a road can be laid on the eastern side of the Lye Field, into Mr MacDonald's field to the north. This is the outcome that the Trustees have been fighting for since Mr MacDonald first instigated legal proceedings back in 2018 and will greatly diminish any chance Mr

MacDonald (or any property developers) will have of building houses in the field.

Sadly, to get to this point, the Trustees have had to incur enormous legal expense and the Lye Field reserves have been badly impacted. The full extent of the damage will not be known for some months.

This has been a long and stressful battle for all those concerned with the case. I would like to thank all the Trustees and Lye Field Committee members who have supported me over the last 5 years and a special mention must go to Sir Mathew Thorpe and Frankie Goddard for their guidance and expertise in dealing with the legal issues arising from this difficult case.

# **CHURCH NEWS**



The Rev'd Gerry Lynch will be inducted and licensed as the new Team Rector of the Wellsprings Benefice by the Bishop of Ramsbury on Tuesday 30th January 2024 at 7 pm in St Mary's, Potterne. Here's his first letter to Spotlight readers:

This time of year is full of contradictions. Driving across Salisbury Plain the other night, I was delighted to notice a definite streak of twilight on the horizon at 6 o'clock. The first brave flowers have started pushing their way out, especially the snowdrops. Yet it can still be bitterly cold. Even when things are at their bleakest, there are signs of new life, of the cycle of nature turning from retreat back towards growth again.

We should be grateful for these seasonal signs of hope at a time when the global situation is more worrying than at any time since my 1980s boyhood. I'm sure many of you, like me, often find yourselves grimacing when you hear the news. We've been in a succession of economic and political crises, domestic and global, since 2008, and they seem to be getting worse. The Post Office scandal shows terrible deterioration in the calibre and integrity of senior people both in our public services and the private sector alike. These political and economic crises reflect a deeper cultural crisis.

Life, as we all know, can't consist only of good times. The world has its golden ages and times of trouble, and so do our own lives. Yet the message sold to us by advertising and marketing is so often that life can always be good, that we can distract ourselves from our problems with the click of a button on the right website (and the accompanying deduction of a few quid from our bank account). Things will feel better, advertising screams at us, after a new conservatory, a jumbo fastfood meal, or a twenty quid flutter on United's next match.

Last month, the novelist and essayist Paul Kingsnorth, to my mind one of the most interesting British thinkers our times, said that we lived at a time of "feast without fasting", because our economy depended on "endless, consumer-driven, growth". This is, he said, like taking a child to a sweet shop and allowing them to eat anything they want. It isn't as much fun as they thought, and they just end up sick.

In the Church's year, the antidote to too much feasting is the season of Lent, which starts this year on Wednesday 14 February. Some people say Lent should be about the extra good deeds you do rather than what you give up. Well, extra good deeds are always great, but perhaps like me you already feel there aren't enough hours in the day. In any case, it does us all good to give up a few luxuries for a while. Apart from anything else, giving things up for a month and a half means one appreciates them all the more when Lent ends at Easter – just the right time of year for feasting, with the weather getting warmer and a riot of flowers and bowers all around us. I hope the world will feel in a better state by them – but, realistically, I don't think it will.

# NEWS FROM WILTSHIRE COUNCIL

Flooding issues are a priority for Wiltshire Council

Thankfully parishes across Devizes Rural West avoided the worst of Storm Henk. Brilliant team work by residents in Potterne to keep drains clear of debris meant that properties in Coxhill Lane and Duck Street remained dry this time. I am aware of other property flooding issues in Whistley Road (Potterne), Erlestoke, Marston and Worton, and of highways flooding issues across the area. Over the next few months I will continue to work with Wiltshire Council's Flooding team to secure further improvements. The Council is investing an extra £1.5m into flood prevention.

Following Storm Henk, affected homeowners and businesses can apply for Government grant funding. There are several different types of support, depending on the damage and the type of property affected, including Property Flood Resilience Repair Grant Scheme, Farming Recovery Fund, Council Tax Relief and Business Rates Discount. www.wiltshire.gov.uk/civil-emergencies-flooding. Homeowners and businesses that have been affected by flooding from Storm Henk should email stormhenksupport@wiltshire.gov.uk.

You may see Parish Stewards at work across the area – they are responsible for specific aspects of general maintenance. Many villages also have wonderful volunteers who arrange litter picking, leaf clearing, cutting back vegetation and generally keeping our villages looking good. This benefits everyone and without this work our communities would be much less pleasant places to live.

Keeping our verges clear of weeds and drains clear of leaves and other blockages is a significant task and when you consider the vast amount of highway, both urban and rural in Wiltshire, you will understand that this is not a task that can only fall to the local authority or volunteer groups to undertake.

You may already have a scheme in your area where you have 'Adopted a drain'. Put simply, if we could all make sure that the drains close to our homes, and where we walk in our villages are clear of leaves and any accumulated debris, excess water would flow better and keep pavements and the surrounding area free of standing water. This also applies to weeds at the edge of the road or pavement, where build-up of weeds can prevent rainwater flowing to the nearest drain.

If you do have a blocked drain that you cannot clear, please report it on the MyWilts App.

Please consider keeping the verges and drains near to your home clear of fallen leaves and debris. We can all do our bit to help keep the water moving. Thank you.

Wiltshire and Swindon

Wiltshire Police and Crime Commissioner Philip Wilkinson is urging residents to have their say on the policing budget as he considers an average increase of 5.2% - an extra £1.09 a month for a Band D property.

Launched in December by the PCC, the Policing, Priorities and £s survey seeks the views of residents and stakeholders as he develops the budget for policing and commissioned services for the next financial year (2024/25). The survey runs from Tuesday 5 December 2023 until Monday 29 January 2024.

As part of the survey, respondents are asked whether their household would be prepared to invest more in policing through the police precept element of their council tax. This, alongside a grant from the government, accounts for the entire budget for policing in the county. As it stands, due to the national police funding formula, Wiltshire Police is the second lowest funded police force in the country per head of capita.

The Home Office funding settlement sees a real terms increase of just 1.9%  $(\pounds 1.5m)$  once nationally agreed pay increases and pension changes have been accounted for and now Mr Wilkinson is considering an annual increase of £13 for the average Band D property to continue making improvements within the force.

Even if a £13 per year, per Band D property, increase is agreed, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner and Wiltshire Police will still need to make savings of £2.4m to cover the funding gap in 2024-25, as set out in the Mid Term Financial Strategy (MTFS).

Despite the cost efficiency savings required, Mr Wilkinson and the Chief Constable have agreed to ringfence police officer, PCSO and Crime and Communications Centre staff numbers.

With significant investment this year in new training facilities in Wiltshire Police and the procurement of two mobile police stations should enable neighbourhood policing teams to get out and about and engage more within communities.

Road Safety has also benefitted from investment this year, with more speed enforcement officers jobs created, and specialist Speed Indication Devices (SIDs) being installed around the county to identify speeding 'hot spots' and provide deterrence.

Mr Wilkinson said: "We've seen some significant achievements in the past year that should be reassuring to our communities, including a fourfold improvement in positive outcomes for Rape and Serious Sexual Offences and Wiltshire Police becoming the top performing force nationally in disrupting county lines per head in capita. Whilst key improvements have been delivered over past 12 months, there is still much to do to make Wiltshire safer as crime and policing demand becomes ever more complex. We need to continue to invest in key areas to maintain the improvements that we are now seeing across the board.Wiltshire Police is facing increased financial pressures as we strive to deliver the necessary service improvements required but I am acutely aware the impact any increase could have on our communities at an already challenging time. Both the Chief Constable and I are committed to delivering a policing service which meets an ever-changing crime picture and is fit for the future. I am asking for the public to continue to use their voice and have their say."

Residents in Wiltshire continue to pay the lowest police precept across the South West and even if an increase is agreed with the Police and Crime Panel, this is unlikely to change.

The class had a wonderful time singing and engaging with the highly appreciative audience. The pupils presented each resident with a personalised card and individually crafted decoration.

Keevil Primary School pupils also collected a huge amount of staple provisions and Christmas treats, which they donated to The Storehouse Food Bank in Trowbridge. They also collected a large number of Christmas gifts that were donated to the local charity RUKSAK45218, which helped families in Wiltshire who can not afford to buy Christmas presents for their children.

We would like to express our thanks and gratitude to everyone who kindly donated to the two initiatives, particularly during these challenging times.

# SEEND TENNIS CLUB UPDATE

Seend Tennis Club has been an integral part of Seend and our surrounding villages, offering a place for recreation, camaraderie, and healthy activity. However, as we mark this significant milestone in 2024, we find that our facilities are in desperate need of resurfacing- a critical project that will not only elevate the experience for our village but also secure the future of the club.

#### NURTURE NATURE

Make what you will of COP28, the Conference of the Parties – however after COP27 it was transformational in mentioning finally the intention to cut emissions, so it transpired that it was better than



expected. In a last minute change to the final statement it declared a transitional move away from oil, coal and gas. However, we shall follow carefully to see if the biggest fossil fuel producers, China, Russia, India, the US, Saudi Arabia, South Africa and the Gulf States do start to move away from such, as fossil fuels are the biggest environmental atmospheric polluters. Will we be carbon neutral by 2030?

The BTO (British Trust for Ornithology) has reported that there have been changes to migrant bird patterns – due to habitat loss and climate irregularities. So far this year there appear to be fewer winter migrants such as fieldfares, redwings, bramblings in the area. Of course, there will be regional variations around the country. Conversely, there appears to be more migrational movement of blackbirds. Waxwings could appear should the weather harden in Scandinavia. They love rosehips, such as those on rosa Fellenberg. We haven't been alerted to local starling murmurations so far this winter. Roosting areas do change, of course, however, this might be a sign of the decline of this hardy species.

Some folk have reported bumble bee activity even on cold days. There are such hardy bee species with yellow rears that visit nectar bearing flowering shrubs such as winter flowering honeysuckle, abelia and mahonia. Often bumble bees will fly into sheds, summerhouses etc when doors are open, and thereby they get trapped and die when such outbuildings are shut up, so please check for bumblebees first.

Seabirds especially are still suffering from avian 'flu, and our birds of gardens, fields and woods can be affected. So please keep feeders clean, water in bird baths changed daily, and if you haven't cleaned out and checked bird boxes for damage and repair, please try to do so by the end of the month.

If you know hedgehogs are hibernating in your garden please ensure they are safe from domestic pets. We had a terrier particularly interested in our hedgehog boxes so we had to fence them off with chicken wire, cutting a 15mm x 15mm (6" x 6") ground level opening for the sow and hoglets to use when born. It is encouraging to read that more parishes are earmarking areas for nurturing nature in their local plans, e.g. planting copses, managing wild flower meadows – so essential for pollination for food production. Worldwide pollinators are threatened as more and more land is lost to development and erosion due to changing climate patterns.

Some topical info – the Asiatic Black Bear, Yampil, rescued from the bombed zoo in Ukraine where most of the animals were killed by Russian bombing, has now arrived at the Five Sisters Zoo in West Lothian to continue his recovery. At the other end of the scale do try to watch two clips on the internet – 'Tidy Mouse in Shed' and 'Man Builds Entire Village For Mouse He Saw In His Sheffield Garden'. Children will be absorbed by these clips. We wondered how walnut halves appeared in unexpected locations around the garden!

Finally, a few words about the spectacular monogamous albatrosses, which lay a single egg every one or two years. The Bycatch kill off these magnificent birds – an estimated 100,000 a year from just high seas fishing fleets. So human activities are threatening to extinction some of the sub species of these majestic birds. No wonder David Attenborough is so concerned about how many species worldwide are declining, and have been ever more rapidly since the 1970s. It is up to us to stem these staggering declines in birds and mammals for the sake of our children and grandchildren. Happy New Conservation Year.
