Pam Muller

Pam Muller who has died aged 91, spent much of her life in Seend Cleeve. She and husband Gerald fostered two young lads, so with their own son, Colin, the three boys enjoyed life in Perrys Lane, where the entire attic contained Gerald's model train layout. Despite her husband's deteriorating mental health, she stuck loyally to him as her marriage vows were utterly sacred. Pam was ordained as a Lay Reader, taking services. She was a passionate member of the Mothers' Union and loved gardening. Pam had a wonderful sense of fun. After Gerald died the little dog Georgie Girl and she were great company for each other.

Pam moved to Melksham, and from her retirement flat ran her own weekly Home Group, and organised a monthly Songs of Praise Service. At St Michael's church she always sought out any new person sitting alone and said 'Do you mind if I sit here next to you'? She published two books of her faith inspired poems, to be sold for the benefit of St Michael's, The books have been sent to churches all over the world. She was a pocket rocket for sure.

Joyce Lillian Wiltshire - 25th February 1926 to Christmas Day 2023

Great grandmother to nine, grandmother to eight, and mother to four plus one. She was not mother to just her children - she was mother to all who knew her, even husband Stan called her mother.

Joyce was born in Bristol and lived her younger years in village of Shirehampton. She remembered opening her birthday cards on the morning of her 17th Birthday amongst which were her call up papers. A few days later she was off to Catterick to enlist as a WREN.

After training she was sent to work in Southmead Hospital Blood Bank. Stan was in the Wiltshire Regiment as a dispatch rider for the Medical Corps; part of his job was to collect blood from Southmead. He couldn't stand the sight of blood and would faint at the sight of it, so Joyce used to put the bottles of blood in brown paper bags for him, and that is how they met.

They were married in 1948. Stan had been stationed in India and returned laden with Indian Silk for Joyce's Wedding Dress and Parachute silk for the Bridesmaids' dresses all made by Joyce. The marriage lasted nearly 70 years and produced four children; John, Graham, Linda and Margaret. Linda sadly passed away at a day old and the biggest regret of Joyce's life was that she never got to hold her daughter. Joyce's younger sister tragically died young so Joyce and Stan became guardians of Stephen. Joyce was a very special lady.

CHURCH NEWS



The View from my Window.

I have probably said it before but did you know that the old English word for Lent is spring? I think that puts a different complexion on things. The word "Lent" makes you think of giving up things, which might be a bit depressing, whereas the word "spring", means exactly what it sounds like; springing into new life with places to go and people to see; more light, more warmth. The natural world is certainly

very much like the latter. The snowdrops in my village have been and gone now, but they defied all the odds when the whole earth was brown and dismal, and they popped up, in all sorts of unlikely places, underneath bits of scrubby hedgerow, lining the streams even when there had been so much water, they hung on ,as well as lining every roadside verge. They have been closely followed by celandines and primroses. What could be more beautiful, and who can resist their glory? Similarly the birds are twittering away and beginning to find nest material; hope, optimism; the future.

Coming back to the word Lent and what it represents in church circles; it is the period of 40 days leading up to the most important weekend in the church's year, Easter. It also reminds us of the time when Jesus went into the wilderness or desert for 40 days following his baptism, and in the bible it tells how he went there to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for 40 days.

Now I don't know about you, but when I go off on my own in the countryside be it up a mountain, or even somewhere desert like, the first thing that happens is that I notice things. I notice my surroundings. Gradually I forget that which I have left behind, as I look around and marvel at the wonderful planet that we inhabit even though it can be a bit scary sometimes. Have any of you been watching Simon Reeves' Wilderness programmes? Did you notice that rarely is the desert devoid of all life? There are usually little plants or insects, and certainly where Jesus would have gone, that would have been the case. He went into the wilderness, and whilst he was there he would have noticed these things, and would have decided where to sleep, and maybe where to make a fire. While he was there he had time to think about things, and to be tempted by his own thoughts, just as we are. In the bible it says tempted by the devil; some may say by evil thoughts, and the most paramount one was power. He knew he had the power to do all sorts of things, but in order for him to fulfil his purpose on earth, he had to have time to recognise and to resist the temptation of power. He couldn't have done that were he surrounded by people and other distractions. He had to be in a wilderness place by himself where he could face his own demons and then to be aware of the presence of the Almighty creator, and his creation, his Father God.

Why do I say all this? Because the same applies to us. Whether we are world leaders, church leaders, political leaders or leaders in our own communities or citizens who follow, nevertheless Lent teaches us think about things, to examine ourselves, maybe to ponder, maybe to give up chocolate, but also to take up things; maybe to resolve to act in a certain way. My Lenten resolution is to try to put aside selfish thoughts (of which I have many) and to notice something beautiful every day on my walk, and to thank God. What is yours?

Have a very happy Easter when it comes.

January PC meeting

Attendance - 7 Councillors, Cllr Reay, 2 Parishioners & The Clerk

Local Council Matters

Cllr Reay provided the following update:

Bell Crossroads / **Bollands Hill:** Cllr Tamara Reay attended a meeting with Wiltshire Highways and the Parish Council to review traffic management at these locations on Tuesday 5th December. There was an agreed list of actions including:

A public statement from Wiltshire Highways

Formal confirmation that the locations discussed exceed the intervention level required for approval of a Local Safety Scheme.

A decision as to whether LHFIG will continue to lead this work

Wiltshire Highways published a statement on 30th January 2024 confirming that site selection for 2024/25 Cluster Site List had commenced with the Bell Crossroads included on the basis of the criteria. However, Highways need to complete the analysis to determine how it ranks within the overall countywide list of sites. If this location is prioritised for actions through the Council's Local Safety Scheme Programme, it will be instigated separately to the LHFIG. Highways advised further measures may be implemented in the short-term including refurbishment of the junction's road markings.

2024/25 budget proposals published: Wiltshire Council's proposed budget for 2024/25 is £486m, with more than half being spent on adult and children's social care services. Wiltshire Council has also allocated an extra £10m over the next two years towards filling potholes and a road resurfacing programme. The budget also proposes an additional £1m investment for extra gully cleaning work and reactive pothole filling.

Spout Lane Parking: A resident of Spout Lane explained the current parking situation. It was noted that company vehicles are parked in the lane overnight which have been linked to those living on canal boats. The net result is that local residents have effectively lost their parking facilities. Cllr Reay advised the Parish Council to contact the Head of Parking Operations at Wiltshire Council.

Local Highways & Footpath Infrastructure Group (LHFIG): LHFIG stated the project will need to be managed by Wiltshire Highways and have taken an action to transition this project away from LHFIG.

The Parish Council is proposing a logical approach that creates a roadmap with incremental steps with the following objectives:

- The Bell crossroads junction is made more visible to drivers approaching from either Bell Hill and Bollands Hill
- Traffic on Bell Hill and Bollands Hill is calmed to reduce vehicle speeds and minimise the risk of a junction overshoot
- Associated measures to reduce the volume of HGV's on Bollands Hill
 Traffic calming around the Bollands Hill Canal bridge to protect the increased volume of horse riders and pedestrians crossing in this area

Speedwatch: The Community Speedwatch team has been out 2-3 times a week and the team has noticed a general reduction in vehicle speeds. The Team would like to purchase a Speed Indicator Device (SID). The team agreed to identify suitable models and prices.

The meeting will take place from 6.30pm at Needham House, Victoria Road, Devizes, SN10 1FA.

Annual Parish Council Meeting & Annual Parish Meeting: The Annual Parish Council Meeting and Annual Parish Meetings will take place on Tuesday 7th May 2024.

Adoption of Rusty Lane: The current owner of the southern section of Rusty Lane which runs from A361 High Street to a point beyond the junction with Bradley Lane has indicated they would like to offer it as a Gift to the Parish Council. The Lane is of key importance to a number of individuals, farms and village organisations. Potential maintenance costs and insurance requirements were discussed along with the possibility of adopting the Lane.

Precept: The Precept budget meeting took place on 9th January with five Councillors from the Precept budget committee. The Parish Council agreed the Precept would be increased by 0.7% (£148) from £21,086 to £21,234

Finance:

Seend Parish Council voted to grant the sum of £5,500.00 towards the cost of a new mower for the Lye Field.

Bank Reconciliation to end of October 2023, circulated to Councillors, came to: £46,885.95

Wiltshire and Swindon PCC Philip Wilkinson

After a period of public consultation, I presented my final proposal for the policing precept of your council tax to the Police & Crime Panel. Wiltshire Police is facing increased financial pressures as we strive to deliver the necessary service improvements required, which led to the panel supporting my decision to increase the precept by 5.2%, an extra £1.09 a month or £13 a year for the average Band D property.

The decision to increase the precept has been a difficult but necessary one. The public voted in favour of the rise, with 85% of respondents to my recent Policing, Priorities and ££s survey saying they wanted to see more investment in policing.

Whilst key improvements have been delivered over past 12 months, including a fourfold improvement in positive outcomes for Rape and Serious Sexual Offences and Wiltshire Police becoming one of the top performing forces nationally in disrupting county lines per head in capita, there is still much to do to make Wiltshire safer as crime and policing demand becomes ever more complex. Even by putting the precept up by £13 a year, we still need to make savings of £2.4m to cover the funding gap. We remain one of the worst funded force areas in the country, but I will continue to lobby the government for fairer funding.

CHRISTMAS HANGOVERS: With January too often providing little in the way of competition in the village it was encouraging to see the "Last Tree Standing" contest revived for this leap year. The committee duly scoured the parish throughout January and early February and come the 7th of this month Beech House was the runaway winner, all others having fallen by the wayside, been planted in a wintery garden, (always on reflection a mistake), or collected for composting by the Christmas tree recycling department. Just to answer one complainant the rules do not require entries to still bear any greenery or needles, a Mother Hubbard still qualifies. Better luck next year to anonymous of Perry's Lane, that's Seend Cleeve not Tundbridge Wells.

TENNIS: Seend played their final match in the Chippenham and District Winter League mixed doubles on the 18th of February against the league leaders Freshford who had won every match this season so we were delighted to be able to hold them to a 4-4 draw thanks to the efforts of Liam Bergin and Harry Waylen and the outstanding power play of Scout Johnstone and the extraordinarily gifted Karin Dolak, who at just 11 years old, playing alongside Harry, went through the entire Winter season without losing a set. However, until the village courts are resurfaced they are now below standard for any league matches and becoming unsafe as Harry showed when he fell badly in Sunday's match. If we can raise the necessary £38,000 needed then work will start this summer. All contributions towards this target to the club secretary please. The summer league matches start in April when we will have to rely on private courts until the resurfacing of the village courts has been completed.

FOOTBALL: Having already won league Division 1, Seend have been focused on the three remaining cup competitions. On 27th January, in the A and B Cup, Seend came away with a 2-1 win over Semington. After a 2-0 victory over DI United in the Wiltshire FA Junior Cup, Seend came up against Bratton on the 3rd of February, unfortunately losing 2-0, but that still left the Knock Out Cup where Seend secured a massive 10-1 win over Bishops Cannings on the 17th of February, so there are still cups to play for and hopefully another trophy will be there at the end of the season alongside the Division 1 silverware.

Stop press: Seend are through to the semi finals beating Freshford 3-2 on 24th Feb.

SHORT MAT BOWLS: It was good to see Colin and the boys back in action this month although I was somewhat surprised as I had misunderstood Colin's kind post-card and had not expected the lads back so early in the year. With much talk of sin bins and blue cards maybe being introduced into the higher echelons of league football Colin, ever in the vanguard of a progressive approach to discipline, explained that he has already recommended that the same be brought into SMB this coming season so as to clamp down on any unruly behaviour particularly in the queue for the bar. NURTURE NATURE

It is good to view on some popular TV programmes about land use and the countryside recently emphasis being placed on how important hedges are for wildlife – for birds, bats, insects, a host of mammals and also providing shelter for livestock. Should one have old hedges that require rejuvenating and bulking up, or desire to plant new hedges, there is plenty of information on the internet, on the TV and on catch-ups. It's not too late to act, and with patience and perseverance you will have added further lengths of wildlife corridors.

Smaller areas can benefit too, such as your garden borders. Hedges don't blow down – fences do, as experienced by some in the recent gales. You can help to protect your fences by planting suitable hedging species as buffers, preferably deciduous ones. Leylandii are not user friendly for most species, except as roosting sites for some. I think we have all been quite shocked to learn recently that one in five migration species are facing extinction over the next few decades, and global migration corridors are being interrupted and partially destroyed due to uncontrolled population expansion –man's ignorance and over development thus threatening species such as the long annual migration of wildebeest in Africa. Monarch butterflies from Canada and north east North America migrate 3,000 miles to the forests of S W Mexico and S W America. Uncontrolled destruction of forests on all the populated continents is leading to tipping points which will adversely affect the world as we think we know it.

The wake up calls have been, and are being made. We need to respond. The Woodland Trust makes an excellent contribution to increasing tree numbers in the UK by arranging planting days for volunteers, schools, local organisations and others, so let's get planting. Remember when some of us older readers were growing up we were taught at our junior schools how important trees are, especially the world's rain forests, as they are the 'lungs of the earth'. We must do all we can to keep them so. Some of you will be surprised to learn that in the British Isles there are sites classified as rain forests. I won't spoil your fun, you can search for them on the internet. What a loss to our enjoyment of nature it would be if there were no woods and forests – "If you go down in the woods today, you're sure of a big surprise -If you go down in the woods today, you'd better go in disguise for every bear that ever there was will gather there for certain because today's the day the teddy bears have their picnic" .(John Walter Bratton 1907).

At Gleann Shildeag (in the north west highlands of Scotland) the WT and helpers are clearing the invasive undergrowth and are aiming to plant nearly 120,000 saplings – a mixture of native willow and birch, with some alder and oak - before the end of the month. When matured, this should give the red squirrel population a good boost, and many other species of wildlife too. Avian flu is still having a destructive effect on seabirds, the Great Skua (Bonxie) around the northern Scottish coasts and the gannet population on Grassholm Island west Wales are still being adversely affected. So, nearer to home it is imperative that bird baths and feeders are kept scrupulously clean. A mild mixture of warm water and washing up liquid will do the job. Although our seasons are not as they used to be, it is pleasing to see acres of woodland snowdrops, dancing daffodils (earlier than usual) and flowering shrubs and trees such as prunus, mahonia, winter flowering honeysuckle and abelia as spring nears.
